GRANTS ARE ASKED FOR BY ORGANIZATIONS AT TOWN COUNCIL MEETING

V.O.N. And Band Need Assistance

CIVIC IMPROVEMENT COMMITTEE
WILL FUNCTION AGAIN
THIS YEAR

Two organizations were represented at the meeting of the Town Council Monday evening, when Mr. George Rogers, Bandmaster, gave a report on the band activities and expenditures for 1939 with the request that a grant be made to the band again this year. Mr. Rogers stated that the band had twenty-two members now, that five of the members had enlisted with the army; some bandmen from Houlton usually came over to assist at the concerts (ten of which were held last summer) but it was seldom any of the Houlton men were paid. Of course, our bandmen reciprocated by going to Houlton once in a while. A music class was conducted by the leader last year and some promising material is being obtained, but it requires a lot of work and patience. Owing to the fact that uniforms were absolutely necessary, the leader sacrificed the amount that should have gone to him as leader and the band had not purchased any new music, leaving them in a bad position as the people will be tired of hearing the same pieces again this year, as well as the bandmen losing interest. A place for storing music and instruments and for practicing is another big problem. Just now they are stored in the town hall but that

MEETING HELD YESTERDAY IN TOWN HALL; AIMS ARE OUTLINED

At a well attended meeting yesterday in the Town Hall, final preparations were made for the opening of the campaign to raise funds for the Canadian Legion War Service, Inc. Mrs. C. Troy President of the Ladies' Auxiliary, B. E. S. L. was in the chair and introduced the speakers.

It was explained by Major J. D. Winslow that the Legion Services were already at work at Aldershot and Saint John. The service of Capt. Plunkett had been secured to arrange for entertainment. It was brought to the attention of those present that a special program was to be heard over the air on Sunday, Feb. 11th, from 8.30 p. m. to 9 p. m. sponsored by the Legion War Services.

Districts have been assigned to special canvassers for the local drive, and they will be recruited from ladies of the Auxiliary B. E. S. L. and it is hoped of the I. O. D. E.

The following questionnaire will acquaint the public more familiarly with the aims of the Legion War Services, Inc.:

What is the Legion raising this money for?

To provide funds for carrying on educational personal and other service work with Canadians who have enlisted in the fighting forces.

What do you mean by Educational Service?

Men who have enlisted are civilians in khaki who have a serious job to do. In doing that job they should not develop the mental attitude "we are not coming back", but rather should continually think in terms of "when I go home", that they may be prepared to resume civilian life where they left off. In the hope of encouraging that outlook, it is felt that wherever possible, educational facilities and vocational training while they are on active service should be made available, to occupy their leisure and constantly remind them of the necessity of preparing for the future.

And what are Personal Services to the Troops?

This means advice, guidance and actual personal services to men who are far from home and worried or bothered about some problem of a domestic or business nature. Legion War Service can perform an invaluable service to thousands of Canadians through their Coast to Coast organization with 1100 branches in cities, towns and villages throughout Canada. As the war develops, questions of pensions, medical treatment and re-establishment will arise. For years the Legion has dealt with such problems and the accumulated experience of

Will Break In During Broadcasts

FOUR PARTIES TO HAVE TWELVE AND THREE QUARTER HOURS FREE TIME

Periodic interruption of regular CBC programme schedules will be necessary during the progress of the Dominion election until March 28, which will be the last date for political broadcasts.

The agreement just reached by the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation and the Canadian Association of Broadcasting Corporation and the Canadian Association of Broadcasters with representatives of the four political parties whereby twelve and three-quarters hours of free time on the national network will be divided among them will mean the cancellation of a corresponding amount of regular programme time.

Inasmuch as all political broadcasts will consist of talks, the regular talks have had to be postponed until after the election. Chief among these is the series on Co-operation, carried over the National network each Wednesday evening at 9.00 p. m. EST, by the CBC in co-operation with the Canadian Association for Adult Education. Five of these have already been broadcast. The sixth will be delivered next Wednesday, when Dr. M. M. Coady of St. Francis Xavier University, Antigonish, N. B., will tell what Co-operation has done for the fishermen and farmers of Eastern Nova Scotia.

The postponement of the remainder of the series on Co-operation has been rendered necessary in accordance with the statement of policy of the CBC with respect to controversial broadcasting published on July 8, 1939, which provides that on and after the commencement of a Dominion election campaign, non-party broadcasts of a controversial character, especially those on economic, social or political subjects, will be cancelled.

It is expected that the series on Co-operation, as well as others which may be interfered with, will be renewed immediately after the election.
