NEW REGULATIONS REGARDING THE SALE OF INTOXICATING LIQUOR

Under authority of Section 3 of The Intoxicating Liquor Act and Regulation 10 of the Regulations Made Thereunder, former Regulations relating to the quantity of sale are herewith suspended and the following will be in force:

ALCOHOL—In all stores in the cities of Saint John, Moncton and Fredericton, and in the towns of Woodstock, St. Stephen, St. George, St. Andrews, Newcastle and Chatham sale only on prescription of a Registered Doctor of Medicine. In all other stores of the Province in quantities as directed by the Commissioner.

SPIRITS—other than Alcohol—The sale of one bottle per day to any one person is permitted, except on a specific order of the Commissioner or his authorization.

WINE—Not more than two bottles per day may be sold to any one person, or not more than one container of gallon size in any one day, except on a specific order of the Commissioner or his authorization.

BEER—Not more than one dozen quarts or the equivalent thereof may be sold to any one person in one day. Except for officially reorganized canteens, no order in excess of the above amounts shall be sold unless the order is first approved by the Commissioner or a person authorized by him.

CANTEENS—All orders for canteens contiguous to the cities of Saint John, Moncton and Fredericton shall be filled by the Beer Warehouse located in the above named places. Orders by canteens in Pennfield, Sussex or other places where duly authorized canteens are established, and where the Board does not maintain a Beer Warehouse, may be filled as ordered by the Commissioner.

No change in the above Order shall be made except on authority by the Commissioner, or an official of the Board authorized by him.

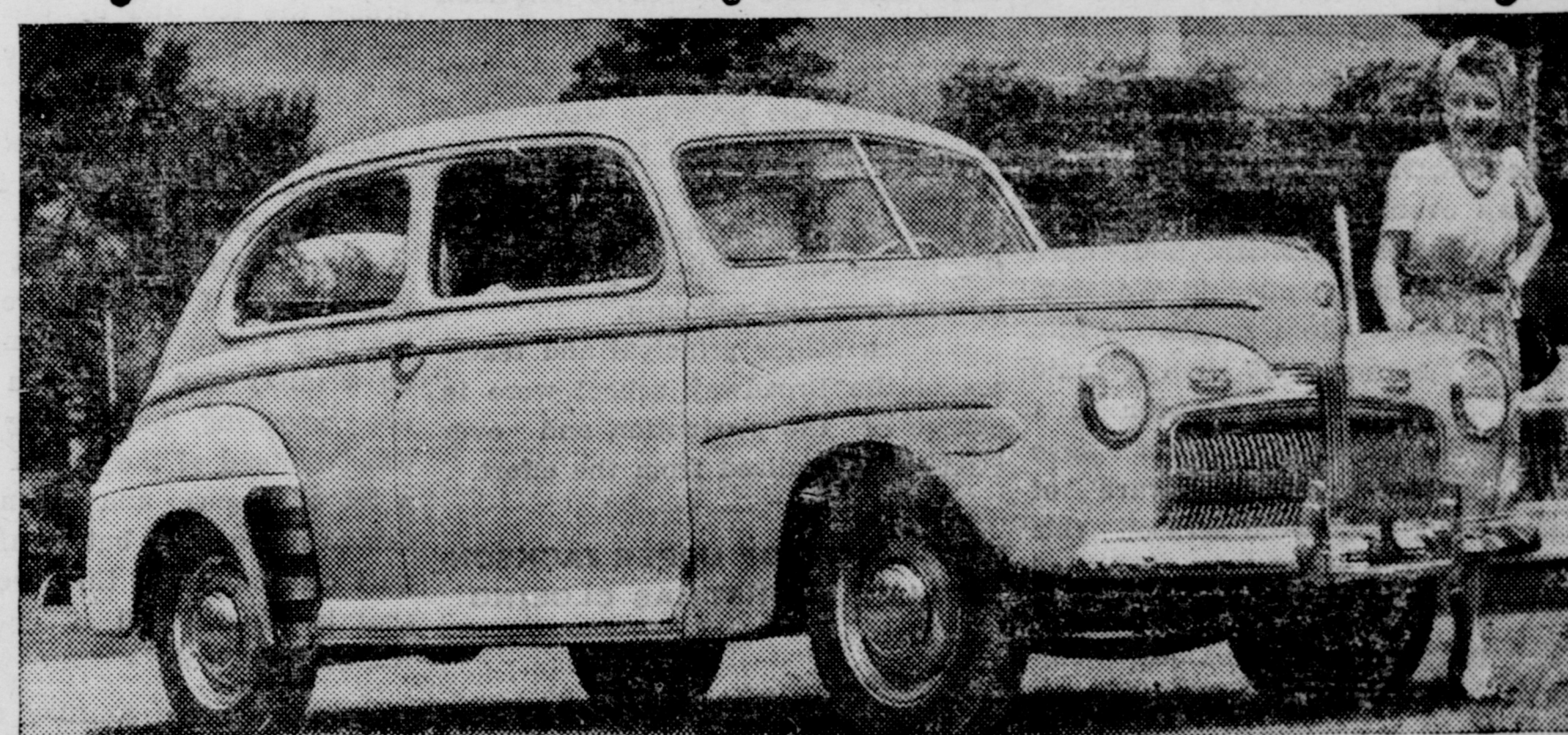
