ALLIED CHIEFS CONFER

The electrifying announcement on Monday evening at 8 o'clock that Prime Minister Churchill and Lord Beaverbrook had landed in Washington and were there in the White House came as a bomb shell to radio listeners. Having left London in a blacked out train with no one save a few cabinet ministers aware of their going they were safe on this side before the world knew they had even started.

The principal object of their journey is to co-ordinate the British and American war effort and to pave the way for other conferences which will include Russia, China, the Netherlands and the Dominions. Not only will military matters in connection with winning the war be discussed but financial and economic problems as well with the idea in mind of laying the basis of a permanent world peace.

Overseas Letter

Old Waverley Hotel,
Edinburgh, Scotland,
Dec. 1st, 1941.

Well, here I am in Edinburgh. As I wrote you before my stay here will be a short one. I only arrived tonight and I will have to be away on Monday morning at the latest. I caught the Flying Scotsman at King's Cross at 10 o'clock this morning and had a very comfortable trip up. I am learning the ropes here now, consequently I got on board about 9.30 and picked myself out a comfortable window seat in a nice smoking compartment. Later on, five British officers got on, but they all changed one at a time to other lines, and after we passed Newcastle I had the place to myself. Two were Air Force, two were Navy and the other two of us Army so it was a fair division. We were very proper and stuffy for the first couple of hours and then somebody offered somebody else a cigarette and that broke the ice and by the time we parted we were all quite comfortable and pally.

Unfortunately it was rather a dull day with a light mist so I couldn't see much of the country we were passing through. It is just two years to-day since I landed here, and on that day I also had a long rail ride on a misty day when you could not see anything, but along the west coast instead of the east. I have been a lot of places and seen a lot of things since then but I think I have only one more big thrill coming, and that is when I sail either into Halifax or Montreal.

It was a nice journey up. I had lunch and dinner on the train. The service and the food seemed better than it used to be, or maybe I am getting used to it now. It won't do me any good in any case for at the end of this week they are taking the restaurant car off the Edinburgh run.

Answers to all queries were delightfully vague. For example, if you ask the guard what time we would get to Edinburgh you would get some such answer as: "Oh, I expect we shall be long now." That seems to be a proper Scottish answer for I have found out already that if you ask the way anywhere you are told: "Aye, just ga along this street a wee bit further, ye canna miss it." Which seems to be a variant of the well known English: "You can't miss it," and equally fallacious, for you CAN miss it and you do.

I arrived here about 7 o'clock and the evening was pitch dark. I am registered in a very comfortable hotel which I came to, thinking it was the North British, which is one of Scotland's most famous hostels. This place is right in the shadow of Scott's monument and is really a nice hotel.

Shortly after my arrival I learned that this is a temperance hotel. I was afraid that I would be branded as a crank for staying here, but later on when I went into the lounge for coffee I found the place was full of officers so I guess it is all right.

Later this evening I confided to a friendly publican where I was staying. He scratched his head thoughtfully and said: "Och, aye, I dinna hold with this temperance business myself. It might be you was more comfort-table somewhere else. If ye want a small blond bit of stuff for yer elbow at all times, smilin' at ye and figurin' a' the while just the last shilling she can be makin' aff o' ye, then I think ye had better move. But if ye want a comfortable room, good meals and good service, then I think ye had better bide where ye are. And if ye want a wee dram wi' yer tea and

toast in the morn, then I doubt even that might be arranged." So I think I will e'en bide where I am.
After awhile the moon came up so I took a walk along Princess Street and had a look at the castle by moonlight. It is most imposing. I will try to get a close view of it tomorrow. It is now very late so I will close and go to bed.
