Generous Forethought Created Our Library

The L. P. Fisher Public Library at Woodstock, N. B. owes its existence to the generous forethought of the late Lewis P. Fisher, K. C. and to the men he selected to carry out his wishes. It is not often that a donor has his plans carried out to a more successful conclusion than has been done in this case.

Their idea was so to build that not only would the library be an educational centre, but a beautiful building as well. With this end in view the executors determined to have the interior finished in mahogany. Though an extravagance at the time, it has proven an excellent investment. The library was opened on December 19th, 1914 and where a cheaper finish of shelves, tables and chairs would long ago have shown signs of deterioration, the mahogany is almost as good as when installed.

The books of the library were chosen with the same care bestowed on the building. Dr. Locke of Toronto Public Library made the first selection chose a fine collection of reference books.

The purchase of the W. O. Raymond collection by the executors of the Fisher estate soon after the library was opened has been amply justified. The valuable records of New Brunswick history have enhanced the value of our library. The scrapbooks and clippings of local interest could not be replaced.

Woodstock has a population of about 3500 of whom almost 2900 are borrowers.

During the development of our library the town has passed through some trying times as there is no doubt the library depends principally upon the town for its upkeep. In 1937 a society known as the Friends of the Library was organized

BUILDER OF ST. GERTRUDE'S CHURCH PASSES HERE ON TUESDAY

The death of Charles William Bowlin, one of Woodstock's most highly esteemed citizens, occurred on Tuesday night at six o'clock at his home here after a short illness. He was 69 years old.

Born in Oranmore, York County, the son of Michael and Nora Harrington Bowlin he spent his boyhood and early manhood there, coming to Woodstock with his wife, formerly Miss Annie Owens of Woodstock about thirty years ago. He was a contractor and builder and many buildings along the Upper St. John were constructed by him, among them St. Gertrude's Church at Woodstock. At the time of his death he was engaged in building the Woodstock Curling Rink.

He is survived by two brothers Harry and John Bowlin of North Devon; four sons Paul, with the 3rd Anti Tank Regt. in England, Donald with the Department of Transport at Glace Bay, Wilfred in Saint John and Eugene at home; two daughters, Miss Kathleen of the staff of the Composite High School at McAdam Junction and Miss Mary in the Equipment Depot of the R. C. A. F. at Moncton.

The funeral will be held Friday morning from St. Gertrude's Church. Interment will be made in Calvary Cemetery.

PRESIDENT OF RED CROSS IN LAST WAR; BURIED IN PARISH CHURCHYARD

Mrs. Grace J. Jones, wife of Hon. W. P. Jones, K. C., chairman of the Board of Public Utilities died at her home on Albert Street last Thursday morning following a short illness. The news of her death brought sorrow to a wide circle of friends not only in Woodstock but throughout the province where she will be remembered by them for her gracious personality and for her many fine qualities of heart and mind.

Mrs. Jones was formerly Miss Grace Jordan a daughter of the late Charles D. and Elizabeth MacRobert Jordan of Saint John. The family moved to Woodstock in 1884 and in 1888 she was married to Mr. Jones.

Mrs. Jones throughout her life took an active part in various women's activities particularly those relating to war work and charity. She was especially interested in the Woodstock Red Cross Society during the last war and for her services was made an honorary life member. A descendant of United Empire Loyalists she was a charter member of the United Empire Loyalist Society.

A member of St. Luke's Anglican church, she was active in the work of its societies. She once served as president of the Ladies' Guild and was for a time a member of the W. A.

Surviving are her husband, two sons, Charles J. Jones, K. C., and George Y. Jones, both of Woodstock; five daughters, Mrs. Harold H. Ritchie, Fredericton; Mrs. Fred C. A. E. RAYMOND GIVES PAPER ON HISTORY OF PARISH AT SOCIAL

Sunday's Services brought to a successful conclusion the observance of the 150th Anniversary of the Ordination of the Rev. Frederick Dibble, to be the first Rector of the Parish of Woodstock. Rev. Frederick Dibble was ordained Deacon by Bishop Inglis in Halifax, at 10 a. m. Oct. 23rd 1791. Exactly 150 years later, at 10 a. m. the observance of the Anniversary was commenced with Celebration of the Holy Communion in the Parish Church. The Rt. Rev. W. H. Moorehead, Bishop of Fredericton was the Celebrant, assisted by the Archdeacon of Fredericton and Rev. H. J. Best. Rev. D. T. Haviland, who is the grandson of Archdeacon Neales acted as Bishop's Chaplain. Rev. J. T. Abbott, himself a former Rector, now Rector of Trinity Church, Halifax preached. In recalling the history and ideals of the people of the past, he reminded the congregation that this anniversary observance would be of no value if it were a mere courteous gesture to the memory of the first Rector, but only if it were the occasion of a true re-dedication of ourselves to the high ideals which he and the other Loyalists embodied.
