OTTAWA C.Y.O. HEARS NAVY MINISTER

After a dark and rainy week the third Sunday of May dawned with bright and welcomed sunshine. It was the Sunday honored by the society of the Children of Mary, by participation of Holy Communion in a body, and afterwards a breakfast in the C. Y. O. Club rooms in connection with St. Patrick's Church. The guest speaker for the occasion was Hon. Angus MacDonald, Navy Minister for Canada, who addressed over two hundred patrons.

Seated at the head table with Mr. MacDonald were Canon Prudhomme, Rev. W. Roddy, chaplain; Rev. Father Doucet, Matthew Bagan, chairman, and Mrs. Bagan; Andrew Forgarty, president of C. Y. O., and other officers. After grace was offered by Canon Prudhomme, the chairman introduced Mr. MacDonald, who described at length his recent visit to England. His impression of the people, in spite of the strain and nervous tension they have undergone, was their healthy and vigorous attitude; they are still confident and full of fight as never before. He described his meeting with Lord Beaverbrook, as "somewhat hectic," and his interview with Prime Minister Churchill, as one which he will long remember.

He stated there were 12,000 Naval officers from all parts of the Empire—50 from Canada and could see no trace of discontent or disillusion in the Navy, Army or Air Force. In his opinion they are better than "we were 25 years ago." He added that while we must give praise to them, we have to reserve praise for the people who have stood up under such terrific strain. Referring to the food situation he said that although shipping is tied up somewhat, nobody will ever go hungry in England. Quoting Mr. Churchill he urged everyone to "bear yourselves as though this war will last a thousand years, this is my important hour".

The strength of Nazism came from unity, he said, and stressed the fact that young men and young women must bind themselves together and save the world Democracy is not dead.

A vote of thanks to the speaker was moved by Andrew Fogarty, seconded by Miss Mary McDonald, vice president of the C. Y. O., after which an informal reception was held.

Highest Wholesale Prices For Creamery Butter

NEW SCHEDULE BECAME EFFECTIVE HERE ON SATURDAY

A schedule of maximum wholesale prices for creamery butter in the Maritime Provinces, effective Saturday, was announced tonight by the Wartime Prices and Trade Board.

Prices of first-grade creamery butter solids under the schedule range from 35 3/8 cents a pound in May to October this year up to 38 7/8 cents in March and April, 1943.

"In all cases, the maximum for primus and rolls is a cent a pound higher than for solids, and unsalted butter also is subject to a one-cent differential," the board's announcement said.

The schedule of maximum prices is one of several amendments to the board's order May 1 fixing maximum wholesale prices for creamery butter delivered at Quebec City, Montreal, Toronto or Vancouver, and for Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta.

At that time, specific prices were not set for Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island and New Brunswick. Because the Maritimes ship in most of their butter, the market has been governed by prices in the exporting province and by the usual freight differentials.

Wholesale price is defined for purposes of the schedule as the price on sale by the manufacturer—in other words, at the creamery.

Sales of creamery butter not affected by the new schedule will still be governed by the May 1 order providing that from May to October in each year maximum prices will be those "lawfully established" before May 1, 1942. After June 1 this year, sale of butter in packages of less than a pound will be prohibited.

For British Columbia, Ontario and Quebec the prices are the same as previously fixed for Quebec City, Montreal, Toronto and Vancouver, beginning at 35 cents, May to October, and ranging up to 38 1/2 cents in March and April. For the western provinces the schedule is also as before, ranging from 33 1/4 to 36 3/4 cents.
