CARLETON COUNTY OVERSUBSCRIBED SECOND VICTORY LOAN BY \$100,000

Total Was Received From 1540 Subscribers; One In 14 Bought Bonds

The County of Carleton once more has gone over the top. Although given a high objective of \$450,000, thought by many impossible to attain the allocation was exceeded by over \$100,000 and the sum of \$552,850.00 was realized.

The total of 1540 subscriptions was received from a population of 21,000, which means that one person in every 14 bought a bond. The average subscription was \$360. J. F. VanBuskirk, organizer had nothing but praise for the cooperation he had received from the committee in charge, the canvassers and the general public and he wishes to extend his thanks to one and all.

The cost of insuring the town trucks by a fleet policy was discussed at the Town Council meeting held in the Council Chamber of the town hall Friday evening with Mayor E. R. Jones presiding.

Coun. McBride and the Town Manager were asked to make enquiries and submit a report.

A deed to the lot of land between the Sentinel building and the Bank of Montreal was received from Godfrey Newman and R. Fraser Armstrong owners.

The Police Magistrate's report with fines amounting to \$41.50 was received. \$25. of the fines were imposed on Harry Brown, Sam Brown, Percy Hoyt and Earl McCourt for ill-treating pigs and the balance was made up from drunks.

The Town Manager read the Comparative Committee statement from January first of February 23. Of the total appropriation of \$110,966.79 in 1942, \$6,105.32 was expended whereas in 1941 with an appropriation of \$111,000.00 at this time, the expenditures was \$6,854.46.

In 1941 the uncollected taxes were \$101,420.14 whereas in 1942 they were for the same period \$101,194.40.

The tax arrears in 1941 amounted to \$39,747.86 as compared with \$40,825.43 in the present year.

The bank overdraft last year at this time was \$11,701.15 whereas it was \$6,778.97 at the end of February this year.

Must Comply To Carry On Business

WARTIME PRICES AND TRADES BOARD SETS DEADLINE AT MARCH 31ST.

Companies and individuals who are required to be licensed under the Wartime Prices and Trade Board, Order No. 73, and who do not apply for Licences before the deadline, March 31, cannot lawfully carry out business after that date.

In a statement issued recently by the Board it was pointed out that, while a great number of firms and individuals have complied promptly with the licensing regulations, there were still a number who had not done so.

It is a responsibility of each company and individual to determine whether or not a Licence is required. Application forms are available at all Post Offices. There is no fee for a Licence.
