N. S. S. REGULATIONS THREATEN WOODS OPERATIONS

FARMERS MAY STILL WORK IN
BUSH, FISH OR TRAP IN
SLACK SEASON

Continued misunderstanding of
the National Selective Service Reg-
ulations by farmers and farm work-
ers in some sections of the country
is threatening to reduce woods op-
erations which are essential to
Canada's war effort, Honourable
Humphrey Mitchell, Federal Minis-
ter of Labour, says.

The regulations provide that a
farmer or farm worker may still
work in the bush or fish or trap
when farm work is slack just as he
has been in the habit of doing, with-
out obtaining permission. However,
the regulations prevent a farmer or
farm worker from leaving the farm
for another permanent job without
obtaining a permit from a National
Selective Service Officer.

Farmers and farm workers are en-
titled under the regulations to an
indefinite postponement of compul-
sory military service. This right
will not be interfered with, if a far-
mer does off-season work in the
bush.

Citizens Observe Rationing Of Tea, Coffee, Sugar

DUTY TO COUNTRY AND
TRIBUTE TO SAILORS OF
MERCHANT MARINES

The citizens of Carleton County
will observe in a loyal manner the
rationing of tea, coffee and sugar.
They will do this, realizing that it is
a matter of duty to their country
and in tribute to brave men of the
merchant marine who risk their lives
daily that these commodities
may be brought to Canadian shores
from distant lands. Such was the
comment of an official of the New
Brunswick Regional Office of the
War-time Prices and Trade Board
relative to the new rationings an-
nounced this week by Donald Gor-
don, Ottawa, chairman of the Board.

The rationing of tea, coffee and
sugar became effective on Tuesday,
May 26. The prescribed rationing of
tea is one-half the quantity each per-
son normally used; the coffee ration
is three-quarters of normal consump-
tion, while weekly rationing of sug-
ar has been reduced to one-half
pound per person. The honor system
used since sugar rationing started
last January will be maintained in
the new regulations.

Special regulations for hotels,
clubs, boarding-houses and similar
establishments to cover the ration-
ing of sugar, tea and coffee have
been prepared.

The provision in effect since last
February limiting sugar purchases
to two weeks' supply for each per-
son in a household and prohibition
further purchases so long as two
weeks' ration remain, is now applied
to tea and coffee.

The sugar order provides that on
and after July 1st no industrial user
shall use in any quarter more than
70 per cent of the quantity used by
him in the corresponding period of
1941. Provision is made in the sug-
ar order for housewives to receive
sufficient sugar to meet "reasonable
requirements" for household preserv-
ing, canning and the making of jams
and jellies.

Penalties for the contravention of
the tea, coffee and sugar orders
provide for up to \$5,000, or impris-
onment not exceeding two years,
or both fine and imprisonment.

Mr. Gordon, in his radio address
announcing the new restriction, de-
clared: "That it is increasingly diffi-
cult and dangerous to bridge suppli-
es of any kind from over the
seas. Ships and sailors' lives must
not be risked to bring in a single
pound of supplies from abroad
which we can do without".

Continuing, he stated that, "The
men who face the perils of the sea
to bring us tea, coffee, sugar and
other supplies cannot be expected
to bring us more supplies than are
absolutely necessary".

Mr. Gordon stated that the suc-
cess of the price ceiling policy thus
far had been due in large measure
to the enthusiastic and intelligent
co-operation of Canadian women.
The success of the first sugar ration-
ing order was a great tribute to the
spirit in which Canadian women
have responded to the appeal made
to them.

"Remember that you the women of
Canada, are the household buyers
of the Nation", Mr. Gordon stated.
"Each one of you is now a trusted
servant of the Crown, charged with
the responsibility for seeing to it
that the laws in regard to consump-
tion of sugar, tea and coffee are rig-
idly carried out".

SAVE BEAUTY GADGETS FOR FUTURE REFILLS

Cherish the lipstick containers
you have on hand, girls! These and
other such fancy devices as vani-
ties, mascara cases, rouge and pow-
der compacts are going to be mighty
scarce. So are cold cream jars
and bottles with metal and plastic
tops.

The supply of most cosmetics
themselves will probably be ade-
quate if women use no more than they
need, but the necessity for use of
nearly all kinds of metals in the
war effort requires that jars be
made only with paper, or other non-
permanent lids. Old containers that
can be used over and over again for
refills are now among the "musts"
on the personal salvage list.

NO SUGAR NEEDED TO CAN RHUBARB

There are various year-round
ways of stretching the sugar ration,
at the same time keeping monotony
out of the wartime menu.

Rhubarb, now at its tender best,
may be canned without sugar, and
in this form will take less to
sweeten when used in puddings and
pies next winter.

Here is the method recommended
by the Consumer Section, Dominion
Department of Agriculture:

Wash rhubarb thoroughly. Drain.
Cut stalks in one-inch pieces. Do
not peel. Place in preserving ket-
tle, covering with close-fitting lid.
Set over low heat, or in the oven,
until sufficient juice is extracted to
cover the rhubarb, which takes a-
bout 20 minutes. Pour into steriliz-
ed jars, adjust rubbers and tops.
Partially seal. Sterilize in a water
bath for 16 minutes, or in the oven
20 minutes at 250°F., then seal.

Strawberries, raspberries, blue-
berries, cherries, currants, plums
and rhubarb can be packed in jars,
—crushed until the juice overflows,
then sterilized. (A strong spoon
makes a good crusher). In steriliz-
ing allow five minutes longer than
the time required when syrup is ad-
ded. Fruit put down in this way
is excellent for pies and puddings.

Dogs in the County of Carleton.

You are required by law to purchase a Dog
License and Tag for the year 1942 for your dog
or dogs BEFORE JULY FIRST.

License and Tags can be secured from the Collector of Poor
and County Rates in your parish or from the Secretary
Treasurer's Office at the Court House, Woodstock.

Every owner or harbors of a dog or dogs who neglects to ob-
tain a tag and keep it securely fixed on his dog or who uses a
tag upon a dog other than that for which it was issued shall be
liable on summary conviction to a penalty not exceeding Ten
Dollars and costs of conviction and in addition to any penalty
or penalties, in default of payment the convicting Magistrate
may order such dog be destroyed.
