



CROP REPORT

vest. Cutting of early grains is proceeding, with favourable results indicated. Haying is about completed, with the cut well above average and of good quality. Pastures are in very good condition. Canning crops are heavy. Fodder corn gives promise of a satisfactory yield. Potatoes and other roots are doing well. Tobacco plants are progressing favourably. Orchards are in good condition. Early apples are a good crop. A heavy yield of later varieties is anticipated. Small fruits are plentiful. Lower St. Lawrence AND LAKE ST. JOHN DISTRICT — Crops continue to make good progress under favourable conditions and the outlook is promising. Grains are ripening rapidly and a satisfactory yield is anticipated. The hay crop is above average. Pastures are in good condition. Potatoes and other roots are growing well and a satisfactory yield is in prospect. Small fruits are plentiful.

PROVINCE OF ONTARIO

Threshing of fall wheat is general, with average yield estimated at 31.7 bushels per acre compared with 26.6 bushels in 1941. Harvesting of spring grains is well advanced, with good average yields in prospect. Pasture generally is in good condition. Sugar beets show satisfactory promise, corn and root crops are progressing favourably. Tomatoes are developing well and good yields are anticipated. A fairly satisfactory crop of good quality peaches is coming on the market, but below average yields are indicated for apples, pears and plums. Harvesting of tobacco is well under way; although recent growth has been good, the poundage will be slightly below average.

MARITIME PROVINCES

Cutting of early grains has commenced with satisfactory yields indicated. Later varieties are making rapid growth. The hay crop is above average. Pastures on the whole are in very good condition. Potatoes are progressing well, but disease has appeared in some districts and may reduce the ultimate yield. Digging of early varieties has commenced with varying results. The blueberry crop is below average. Apples are sizing and colouring well, but the crop will be well below normal.

PROVINCE OF BRITISH COLUMBIA

All grains are maturing rapidly and cutting is now under way in most areas, with indication of good yields of wheat, timothy and second crop alfalfa. Roots and vegetables are plentiful. Potatoes are a large crop, except in the Fraser Valley where they have been damaged by blight. Onions have been attacked by a strange disease which will cut down the yield. Field tomatoes are colouring and sizing well. Cannery peas are a good crop. Good vegetable seed crops are in prospect. Apples and peaches are ripening quickly. The estimated yields of tree fruits remain unchanged at: apples and peaches, 85 per cent of average; pears, 80 per cent; prunes and plums, 50 per cent. Codling moth is under control and damage from pests is less than in recent years. Pasture is plentiful and abundant for irrigation purposes is available.

soluble iron salt or the administration of a dose of a similar solution to each pig once weekly are two methods of preventing this disease.

The following method tried for the last three years at the Dominion Experimental Station, Kapuskasing Ont., also has proved effective.

About two hundred pigs are raised to weaning age annually. Every year, especially among the winter litters, some of the pigs have to be treated against anaemia.

In the last three years some earth sods taken from a field free of pig's worms, were stored in the fall and made available to the brood sow and the young pigs during the winter months. Not a single case of anaemia has been noticed since.

A sod 1 foot square is given every third day to the brood sow, previous to farrowing, and every day after. The young pigs at two or three days of age, start to root and nibble at these sods. Where soils are deficient in iron, it will be necessary to fortify the sods with iron. This can be done either by springling reduced iron or sulphate of iron dry on the sods as they are stored or wetting them with four tablespoonfuls of a solution of iron (6 oz. ferrous sulphate to one gal. water) just before they are given to the pigs.

This is an easy and cheap way of preventing many losses in young pigs which neither the conscientious swine breeder nor the nation can afford to have in either war or peace.

field for seed is far-reaching. A well-fertilized and prepared field with sufficient drainage is more likely to produce good grain, and it is possible to make a further selection. Sometimes all parts of the field are not uniform. On certain parts, the grain may appear to have grown more than the average and to be better filled. Only those parts which produce the best grain should be harvested, discarding the grain from dead furrows and low-lying places. In that case, it is desirable to have a man follow the reaper or binder to separate the sheaves. The grain intended for seed should be threshed separately in a clean thresher and stored by itself in a bin in the granary.

In well-kept vegetable gardens, flower gardens or nurseries, as a rule, there is little damage or serious injury done by white grubs. When old sod is ploughed to establish a new garden area, the shallow ploughing, multiple-fencing control will render the soil safe for planting susceptible crops, or infestation may be prevented by the use of sulphur dust.

Permanent Ration Cards Issued

The distribution of 453,377 ration books in New Brunswick to be used when purchasing tea, coffee and sugar commenced on Monday, August 24, and before September 8 every resident of the province will have a book, it was announced here today by J. Eric Cormier, provincial officer, ration division of the New Brunswick regional office of the Wartime Prices and Trade Board.

Each book contains five series of coupons in as many different colors. The first three series consist of one sheet (13 coupons) each, and the other two, of two sheets (26 coupons) each. The first sheet, red in color, is for sugar and is so marked. The second, "Spare A", is for tea or coffee. The others are included by way of precaution, in case there

HARVESTING POTATOES

In harvesting potatoes, where the soil is well-drained and conditions are fairly ideal for the crop, digging can be deferred until quite late in the autumn; but where the land is on the heavy side and inclined to be wet, digging should be done before the autumn rains set in, states the Wartime Production Series Special Pamphlet on "Potato Culture", No. 40. Where the crop has been free from blight, it has been found that the digging can be done to advantage during late September or early October. At any rate, digging should be done before the ground freezes during the nights.

If late blight has been present, digging had better be deferred until should be need of further coupon rationing before the expiration of six months.

the latest possible date. Diseased tubers can then be easily detected and left in the field. Early digging of a diseased crop and piling on the field of placing in storage cellars encourages the spread of the disease to healthy tubers. The pamphlet may be obtained free on application from Publicity and Extension Division, Dominion Department of Agriculture, Ottawa.
