WICKLOW IS FIRST PARISH TO SECURE ITS VICTORY LOAN QUOTA

County Has Special Session Of Carleton County Council Is Summoned Subscribed 50 Per Cent

OFFICIALS NOT UNDULY OPTIMISTIC OF SUCCESS AS HALF WAY MARK IS PASSED

Wicklow is the first parish in Carleton County to secure its quota in the Third Victory Loan drive. By Tuesday night Wicklow had subscribed \$21,050.105 per cent of its allotment. The parish is already flying its pennant, and was said this morning to be well on its way to another. The canvassers are G. W. Perry, M. L. A., and Councillor Vernet Tracey.

The County as a whole passed the fifty per cent mark Wednesday morning. Officials in charge of the drive, however, were not very complacent about the showing, and were of the opinion that a strenuous effort on the part of the canvassers and a favorable reception from the citizens were essential if the objective is to be reached.

One family has set a fine example, that of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Carter. Mr. and Mrs. Carter had already bought bonds, and they have received instructions from their three children overseas, William, Robert, and Nursing Sister Doris, that they wanted to invest as well. As a result all five have now secured their bonds.

E. W. Mair, Chairman, Carleton County Third Victory Loan, stated today that while the County had reached the half way mark in their drive for \$460,000, the minimum quota, there was no reason to be enthusiastic or complacent about the results so far.

Half of our allotted time to secure the above amount has also passed, and while subscriptions have increased by approximately 50 per cent over the previous loan at this same time, the amount in dollars is (Continued on Page Eight.)

RELATIVES HERE RECEIVE WORD SGT. McCARRON IS PRISONER IN HONG KONG

Mrs. Hugh Johnston and Mrs. Leo Culbert, Newburg, have received word that their brother, Sgt. Maurice McCarron, is a prisoner of war. Sergeant McCarron is well known in Carleton County, having frequently visited his sisters here. His home is in Harvey, Albert County. Sgt. McCarron enlisted about two years ago and went to Hong Kong about a year ago with the Royal Rifles of Canada. He was captured at Hong Kong by the Japanese.

Prayers of thanksgiving for his escape from death were offered during Sunday's service at St. Joseph's Church, Newburg, and on Monday at the request of the congregation, a mass was said by Rev. F. L. Carney.

A collection of \$700 was taken at the annual roll call service of the United Baptist Church on Wednesday evening. This will enable the mortgage on the church to be burned. PROMINENT C. P. R. OFFICIAL PASSES AT SUDBURY, ONT

W. C. GUTHRIE, FORMER SUPERINTENDENT, AT WOODSTOCK, RETIRED SINCE 1941

William C. Guthrie, for many years a prominent figure in Woodstock and New Brunswick, railway life, died on Monday at his home in Sudbury, Ont., where he had resided since his superannuation on July 1, 1941. While Mr. Guthrie had not been in the best of health for several months news of his death came as a great shock to a host of his friends in Carleton County. He was for fifteen years superintendent of the Canadian Pacific Railway here.

While in Woodstock Mr. Guthrie was a prominent member of the Woodstock Rotary Club. Joining the club in 1932 he served both as president and director. He was a member of the United Church of Canada, in which he had been an elder for 25 years. He has also been a member of the Blue Masonic Order since 1901, and a member of the Scottish Rite up to the 18th degree since 1903.

He is survived by his wife, one son William Guthrie with the accounting department of the C. P. R. in Winnipeg, two daughters, Mrs. Herbert Cavers, Sudbury, Ontario, and Miss Morna at home. Three grandchildren also survive.

Mr. Guthrie started work on the Canadian Pacific in 1889 as a young boy of 13, and was made a permanent section employee in April 1892 on the Lake Superior Division. He became Section Foreman in October 1895 and an Extra Gang Foreman in 1898. He was promoted to Roadmaster at Chapleau, Ont., in December 1903, and first became a Superintendent at Chapleau on December 1st, 1912, going to Schreiber as Superintendent on April 1st, 1920, and coming to Woodstock, N. B. in January 1st, 1926, where he remained until his retirement from active railroad work.

Municipal Home Plans To Be Made

INMATES AT PRESENT AT UPPER WOODSTOCK; ASSESSORS DISCUSS VALUATION

A special meeting of the Carleton County Council has been called to consider problems arising out of the destruction of the County Municipal Home by fire last week. The destruction of the home was a severe blow to the county, and the councillors are now faced with the problem of whether to rebuild, if possible, or whether some other solution will be worked out. At present the inmates are being cared for at a farm belonging to Daniel Lenehan at Upper Woodstock.

A meeting of the chairmen of the assessors was held in the county secretary's office on Tuesday afternoon to consider the assessment of the Parish of Aberdeen. Warden Gordon Sharpe presided. At the time of the last county valuation Aberdeen Parish refused to accept its assessment on the ground that it was inequitable. Tuesday's meeting was held to solve the difficulty.

Warden Sharpe stated after the meeting that no announcement could be made until the matter was laid before the County Council at its January session. It is understood, however, that a solution agreeable to all parties concerned has been reached.

MEMBERS COLLECT \$500 IN TOWN FOR SALVATION ARMY

A hundred dollars was voted to the Third Victory Loan at the monthly meeting of the Woodstock Women's Institute held in the Carleton County Vocational School Tuesday afternoon with Mrs. Percy Betts, President in the chair.

Reports received from members showed that approximately \$500 had been collected by institute members in Woodstock to help swell the funds of the recent Salvation Army drive.

Mrs. Harry Jones, War Work Convener, reported money sent in from Prisoners of War collection boxes, donations made to the Red Cross for sugar and \$10 to the Queen's Canadian fund. It was decided to hold a quilting in the near future. Plans were also made to sell 300 Victory Cook Books.

World News In Brief

Friday October 23rd:—Rommel is given supreme command of Axis Mediterranean forces. The German drive at Stalingrad is slackening. Canada limits travel by bus to 50 mile trips.

Saturday October 24th:—A second heavy R. A. F. raid on Italy is indicated, as Genoa and Turin are hit. The Russians are beating back heavy new assaults in Stalingrad. Mrs. F. D. Roosevelt is the guest of the King and Queen in Britain.

Monday October 26th:—The Allies strike in North Africa as the Eighth Army plunges through a gap in the Axis lines. Northern Italy suffers four smashing air blows. The Yanks smash Japanese assaults in the Solomons.

United States holdings in the Solomons by land, sea and air. Fresh reserves maintain Russian lines in Stalingrad. Armored forces are nearing clash in desert battle.

Wednesday, October 28th:—United States troops are waging a grim fight for the Guadalcanal airfield. The British Eighth Army is defending a salient into Rome's defenses in Egypt. Canada's Victory Loan Drive averages \$52,000,000 daily.

Thursday, Oct. 29. Headquarters announced that Allied Forces had won the first round of battle in Egypt. There was a lull in the Solomons fighting as the Japanese, following sharp repulses, organized for new attacks. On the Russian front the Germans gained slightly in two sectors, but were driven back in two others.
