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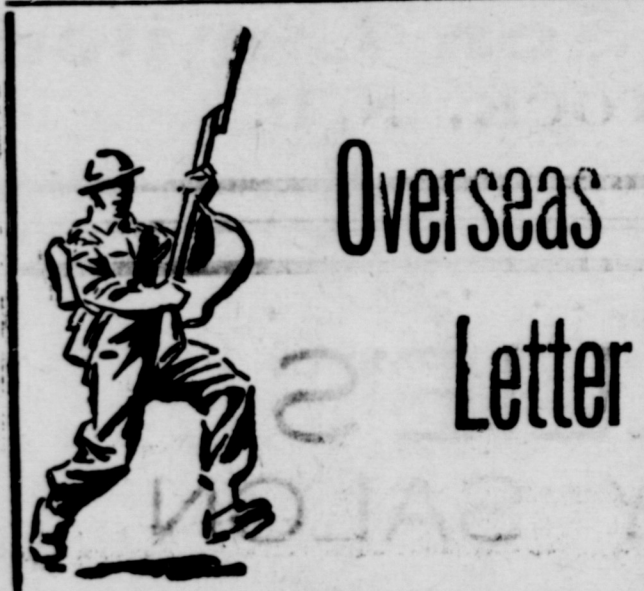

Overseas Letter

Mrs. J. E. Wilson, of Woodstock, N. B. has recently received a letter from her son, Rev. G. Manter Wilson now in Shanghai, China. The letter was brought by missionary friends who returned on the "Gripsholm"; mailed the last of August, but not released by the "Censors" till in October. The following paragraph contains a few quotations which may be of general interest, though written June 28th.

"The Japanese have been very kind to us. We were escorted out of Yangchow on June 9, and given a special launch all to ourselves. The military took us down the Grand Canal to Chingkiang, placed us in a vacant hospital building and supplied us with Chinese food. On the 12th, other groups from the Interior joined us and we were brought to Shanghai having a whole railroad coach to ourselves. Now 350 are quartered in this once palatial Club. The American Residence Association, equipped it with borrowed coats; 75 of us men are sleeping in the bowling alley. There are clouds of mosquitoes just like in our good New Brunswick woods on a fishing trip. I'm fortunate in having with me my big net; many have only a head net which is not adequate. We have shower-baths here; in these days every little blessing seems so valuable. The old currency is discounted 50 per cent, and before long will be nearly out of circulation. The currency of the new government is C. R. B. that means Central Reserve Bank. No money is allowed to those being repatriated except military Yen (Japanese) which is in circulation in all this area, the National Yen being different. There is a Federal Reserve in the North, and Hong Kong money in the South; all these with different rates, changing daily. Prices are crazy; no gasoline, so bicycles sell from \$4000 to \$10000. People turn in their cars as first payments on bicycles. One dollar U. S. brings from 10 to 22 times as much as at home. We have seen English papers for the first time since Dec. 8. The Maritimes seem just perfect for being safe, sheltered, and sensible." Mr. Wilson is not planning on returning unless the Japanese order all foreigners to leave. The friends said he was well when they embarked on the steamer to return to U. S.

V. O. N. Board Report

To the EXECUTIVE COUNCIL of the VICTORIAN ORDER OF NURSES FOR CANADA and to the LOCAL BRANCH at WOODSTOCK, NEW BRUNSWICK.

Miss Winnifred Dawson, National Office Supervisor, Victorian Order of Nurses for Canada, visited and supervised the Woodstock Branch on September 22nd to 27th, 1942 and the following report is submitted.

The officers of the Branch for the year 1942 are as follows:

Honorary President, C. J. Jones, Esq., K. C., President, Miss Grace Caughlin, 1st Vice President, R. W. Maxwell, Esq., 2nd Vice President, C. J. Breneol, Esq., 3rd Vice President, Mrs. J. L. Stone, Secretary-Treasurer, R. W. Maxwell, Esq., Representative to the Board of Governors, C. J. Jones, Esq., K. C.

Well attended Board meetings are held regularly on the second Thursday of the month at 7.30 p. m. in the office.

Recently both the treasurer, Mr. Dick, and the secretary, Mr. Baldwin, have been transferred from Woodstock. Their resignations have been regretfully accepted. Mr. Maxwell has kindly consented to fill both positions for the remainder of the year.

The Annual Tag Day and Canvass in October has been well organized and those responsible deserve much credit. The nursing work receives excellent publicity and additional help become interested and respond to this opportunity to give financial support which makes it possible to continue the service on a satisfactory basis.

Staff
Miss Carolyn Curry, nurse-in-charge for the past year and a half is conducting the service capably and has the respect and good-will of the doctors, Board members and citizens.

Better arrangements have been made with regard to the employment of a relief nurse so that Miss Curry may have more regular off-duty time and may be assisted on very busy days.

Work
The number of patients served during the eight months remained practically the same but the visits made on their behalf were reduced as compared with a similar period in 1941. The reduction is largely due to a decrease of 251 maternity visits. Visits to medical cases increased.

Fees
The collections received from patients for general nursing care and from the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company for service to its policyholders have increased by \$20.00 in the eight months as compared with the same period in 1941.

Special Activities
Less time has been spent on the school nursing this year and fewer home-school visits made but Miss Curry hopes to accomplish more this autumn.

The Baby Conference held weekly is well conducted and the mothers bring their children by appointment. This method of regulating the attendance is approved. The attendance ranges from 6 to 17.

Transportation
Transportation is provided by a Chevrolet car purchased in January 1941 and kept in good condition.

Office
It was recommended that an additional file be provided and the present plans to have one made by the pupils at the Vocational school.

Finances
The service is financed by fees from patients and from the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company for nursing care to its policyholders, a
