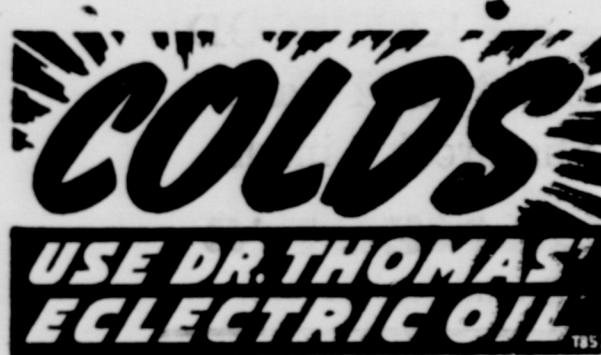




NOTICE OF SALE

Aircrew and Trade Duties of R.C.A.F.

Several announcements, of great interest to lads who desire training for aircrew duties and to skilled tradesmen who wish to bring their trade knowledge and dexterity to the tasks of the R. C. A. F., have recently been made by Air Force Headquarters. For the benefit of our readers, they are summarized here.

First of all, young men may now enlist in the R. C. A. F. at the age of seventeen and a half years. This is a concession on to the wish of many youths, often recent high school graduates, whose enlistment had formerly to be deferred because they had not yet reached the age of 18. The new regulations stipulates, however, that applicants under 18, must have the written consent of their parents.

Secondly, the highest age limit for aircrew has been reached so that unusually well-qualified men, exceptionally alert and intelligent, may now be accepted for aircrew training so long as they have not yet reached their 35th birthday.

Thirdly, there are vacancies now in several trades, mainly those having to do with maintenance work, which have been closed for quite a while.

It will be noted that the approach of King Winter has something to do with the appearance of these enlistment openings. During the spring and summer many of these tradesmen were posted overseas for maintenance work with the rapidly expanding Air Force Establishment there.

And always, of course, the training set-up of the Air Training plan is growing larger. Consequently, new enlisted personnel are needed for replacement.

Many of these maintenance trades carry with them immediate appointment to rank and trades grouping higher than standard.

For instance, Foremen of Works for the Works and Buildings Branch of the R. C. A. F. are needed. Well-qualified applicants in this trade often receive top trade's pay and the rank of sergeant upon acceptance into the service.

So, too it is with Chief Stationary Engineers. In a lesser degree it is the same with subordinate Stationary Engineers, Firemen 1st Class (Works & Buildings), and with Fitter Diesel and again with Fitters General who are known as Civilian life as plumbers and pipefitters.

Carpenters also are needed and Tractor Operators, Pumpman and Motorboat Crewman.

Merchant Fined For Overcharging

A Quebec City merchant paid a \$1000 fine and costs for selling meat, poultry and eggs at prices in excess of those permitted by law and 59 enforcement proceedings were taken against other infractors of the Wartime Prices and Trade Board regulations in various parts of Canada during the past week. In addition to these proceedings, court action was also instituted against eight persons for violations of the regulations of the Oil Controller and the Controller of Supplies.

While the \$1000 fine was the heaviest paid during the period the courts imposed many other severe fines ranging from \$100 to \$320 against those who were found guilty of attempting to "crack" the ceiling. In the week's review of the enforcement proceedings of the Board it was revealed that one Saint John merchant was found guilty and fined \$25 and costs for illegally increasing the price of candy.

Among the number of cases completed the report shows that 23 persons were prosecuted for violations of the price regulations, topping by one, the number brought before the courts for breaking the rental laws.

Examples of some of the cases and fines imposed follow:

A Toronto restaurant was fined \$200 and costs for illegally increasing the price of meals. A Montreal company was fined \$100 and costs for selling meats above the ceiling price while a diamond merchant of the same city was convicted for illegally increasing the price of diamonds by selling stocks of an inferior quality at higher-grade prices. Out at Vancouver a coal merchant paid a \$100 fine and costs for selling his products above the legal price.

For breaking the rental regulations, two Niagara Falls property owners were fined \$320 and costs and a landlord at Goderich, Ont., paid \$300 and costs for illegally increasing rents. Similar charges were preferred against a Hamilton real estate company and the court demanded a fine of \$100 and costs.

Only a few breaches of the rationing regulations were reported. At

Windsor, Ont., a householder was fined \$300 and costs for acquiring sugar by purchase voucher for preserving without declaring to the Board the amount of sugar on hand and handing in the necessary coupons. A sugar hoarder at Beechy, Sask., was fined \$100 and costs.

Stiff sentences were handed out by the courts for violations of the tire rationing and the gasoline rationing regulations and four prosecutions in each of these categories were completed.

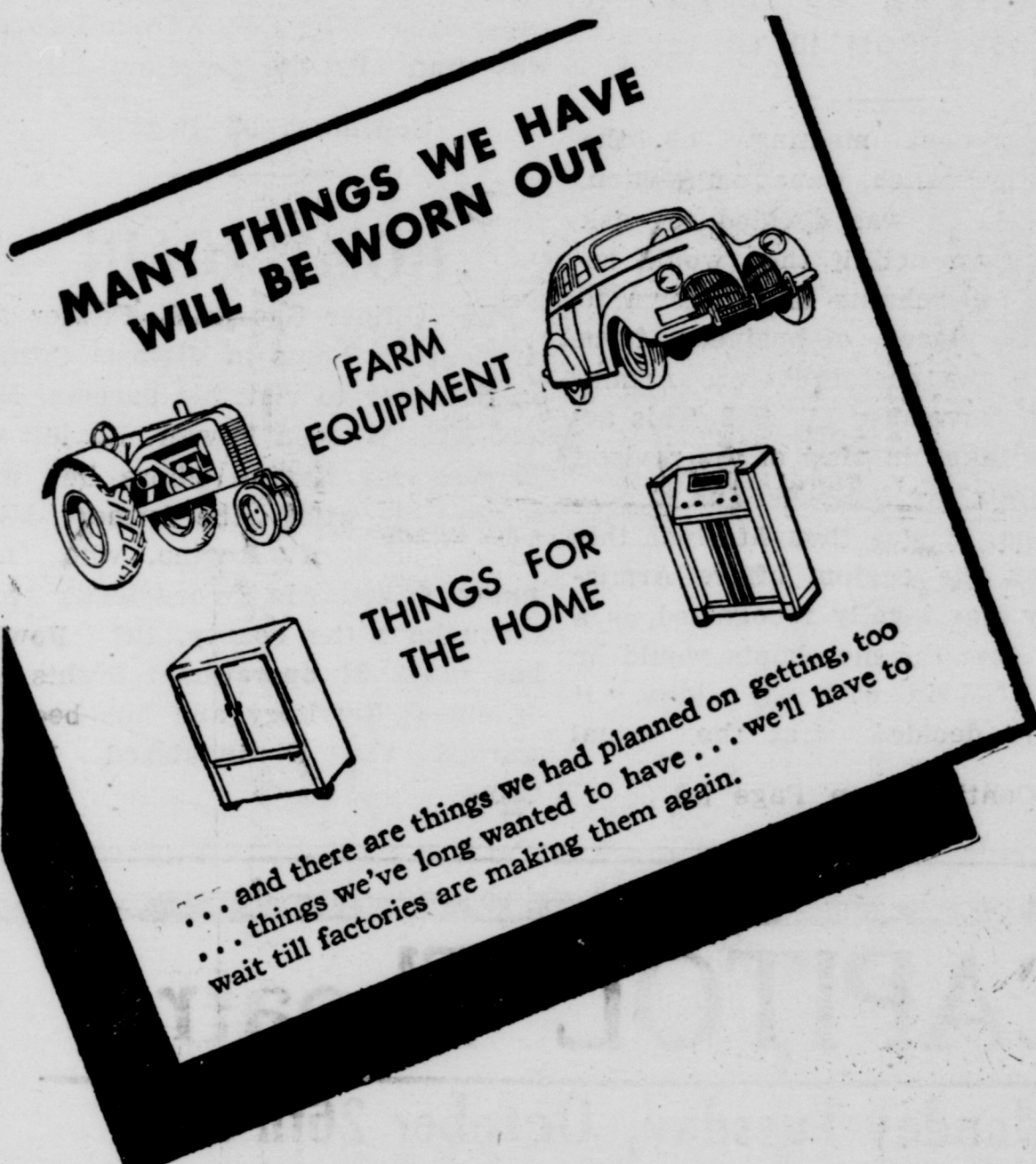
CLEAN CLOTHES

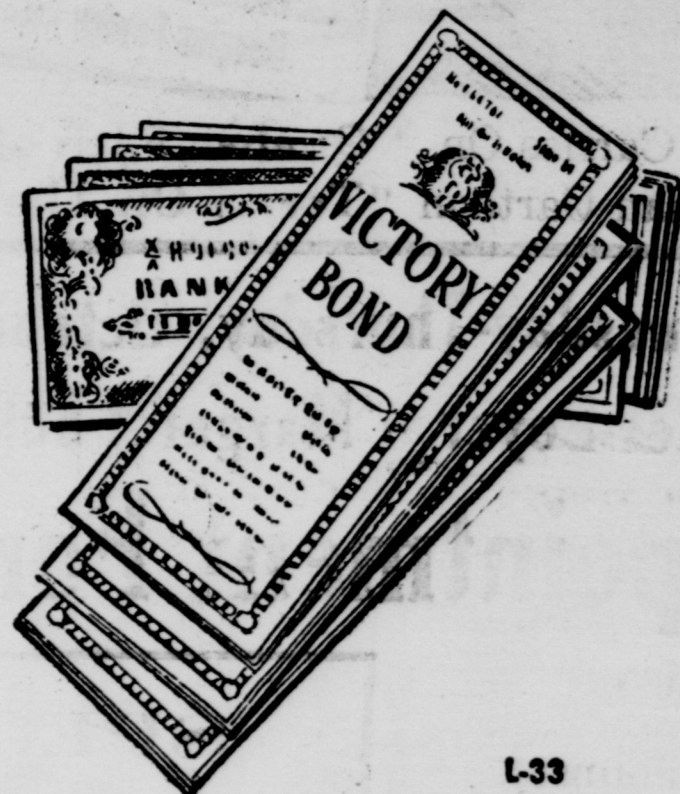
