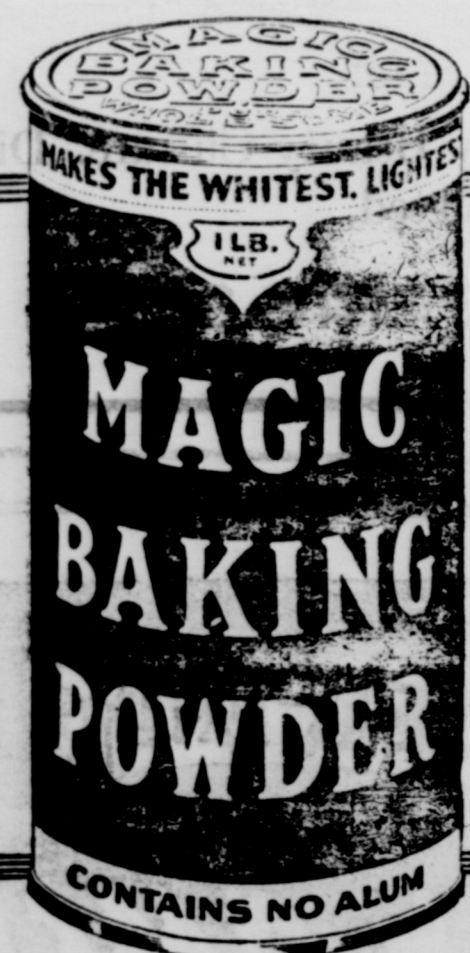

## Crop Report

Below will be found a brief synopsis of telegraphic reports received at the Head Office of the Bank of Montreal from its Branches. Our Managers have knowledge of each local situation and are in touch with crop conditions in all sections of the districts mentioned.

### GENERAL

Owing to inclement weather, harvesting in the Prairie Provinces made poor headway until the end of September, but since then ideal weather has permitted operations to proceed with little interruption. Scarcity of labour has also impeded progress and threshing is estimated to be only 35 per cent completed, as compared with 90 per cent a year ago. Frost and excessive autumn moisture have adversely affected grades, but have caused little reduction in yields. The sugar beet crop in Alberta and Manitoba is good and lifting has commenced. Feed is plentiful and pastures are in excellent condition. In the Province of Quebec, the harvest is nearing completion and, with few exceptions, yields are above average. Grain and fodder crops are mostly stored. Canning crops have given good results. Potatoes have been affected in many districts by rot and the yield will be light, but other roots are up to average. The tobacco harvest has been good. Apples promise heavy yields. Pasturage is in good condition. In Ontario, the harvesting of late crops is progressing favorably. Good average yields of corn, sugar beets, turnips and mangolds seem assured, with below-normal returns indicated for beans, late potatoes and apples.

Tobacco plants suffered some damage from frosts and the poundage is below average. In the Maritime Provinces, heavy rains have been fairly general in the past fortnight and have benefited remaining crops and pastures materially. Harvesting has proceeded normally with little damage reported, and yields generally are good. In British Columbia, an above-average crop of apples is being harvested, hay and fodder are plentiful, and there is a good supply of roots and vegetables. Grain yields are below average; threshing is nearing completion.

### PRAIRIE PROVINCES

**ALBERTA**—Although intermittent rains have caused delays, cutting is 85 per cent completed and threshing is becoming general. Outturns are high, but as a result of frost and excessive moisture the quality has suffered and grades will be lower than last year. Harvesting of a satisfactory crop of sugar beets has commenced.

**SASKATCHEWAN**—Due to wet weather, threshing is estimated to be only from 35 per cent to 40 per cent completed. Grades have suffered from excessive moisture and frost, and in some localities yields may be slightly lowered, but, with favourable weather for the next month, the 1942 crop is expected to set a record for the province both in yield per acre and total production. **MANITOBA**—Threshing is about 60 per cent completed, with wheat, oats and barley yielding well above average and meeting earlier expectations. Rye has returned average yields. The flax crop will be fair. Grades have not been seriously affected by wet weather. Lifting of a very good sugar beet crop is under way.

### PROVINCE OF QUEBEC

**EASTERN TOWNSHIPS AND OTTAWA VALLEY**—Threshing of grains is nearing completion and reports indicate better-than-average yields of good quality. Fodder corn is nearly all stored and was a heavy crop in most districts. Pastures are in good condition. Canning corn was exceptionally good. Some tomatoes suffered frost damage, but picking was practically completed and the crop is above average. Digging of potatoes is under way; rot is fairly widespread south of the St. Lawrence and yields are below normal. Other roots are average. Tobacco plants were damaged in some sections by early frost, but yield and quality were generally good. Winds did some damage to late apples, but the crop is heavy. **LOWER ST. LAWRENCE AND LAKE ST. 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well advanced and an average yield of good quality is reported. Cutting of an average crop of fodder corn has been practically completed. Roots generally are of good quality, but potatoes were affected by rot in some areas and yields are below average. Recent rains improved pastures which are in good condition.

### PROVINCE OF ONTARIO

Satisfactory crops of fodder and canning corn are being harvested, although some frost damage has occurred. Pulling of sugar beets has begun, with good average yields practically assured. Turnips and mangolds show good promise. Late potatoes have suffered from blight and rot, and the yield will be slightly below normal. Peaches and Pears give satisfactory returns, and a heavy crop of grapes is being marketed. Late apples will be light. Harvesting of Tobacco is completed, reports indicate that approximately 6,000,000 lbs. was lost by frosts, and the fine-cured yield has been estimated at 45,000,000 lbs. of good-quality leaf. Threshing of spring grains has been practically completed and fall ploughing is general in most sections. Seeding of fall wheat is well advanced; germination and growth of early-sown grain have been good.

### MARITIME PROVINCES

Threshing of grains is well advanced and the harvest has been completed in a number of districts; yields are up to average and the quality is good. Pastures which suffered from extended drought have shown improvement and are in fair-to-good condition. Recent rains have benefited late root crops. Digging of late potatoes is well advanced; the quality is excellent, there is little evidence of rot and yields are above average. A fairly good crop of early apples was obtained and later varieties, which are maturing rapidly, are being picked; size is better than expected and colouring is good.

### BRITISH COLUMBIA

Fodder crops are yielding well

and feed is abundant in all districts. A good crop of potatoes is being dug, except in the Fraser Valley. Where damage by blight has occurred, Tomato deliveries to canneries are somewhat below average in quantity and size. Field peas are not quite up to average. Picking of prunes, peaches and plums is completed, with indicated yields at 80 per cent, 115 per cent and 104 per cent of average respectively. McIntosh apples are practically harvested and picking of late varieties is under way. There has been some loss from wind damage. Pasturage, except on Vancouver Island, is above average for this

season of the year.

### GLASSVILLE W. I.
