## PUBLIC WARNED NOT TO HOLD DUPLICATE TEMPORARY RATION CARDS

### Duplicates Must Not Be Retained

MUST RETURN NOT ONLY CARD BUT ALL NUMBERED AND RATIONED COUPONS

Pointing out that it is a serious offence for any resident of Canada to retain a duplicate temporary ration card which must now be used in purchasing tea, coffee and sugar, J. Eric Cormier, provincial officer, rationing division of the New Brunswick Regional Office of the Wartime Price and Trade Board, has received more than one such card return it to the board's offices at Saint John, Moncton, Fredericton, Bathurst and Edmundston as quickly as possible.

While some duplicate cards have been returned we have found following a check-up of our filing system that there are still a number of duplicate cards which have not been forwarded to us. These duplicates should be sent without any further delay in order to facilitate the task of issuing the permanent ration books," Mr. Cormier declared.

The ration officer stated that in spite of the excellent work of the voluntary recorders who under considerable pressure turned out nearly half a million of these ration cards, it was inevitable that a certain number of duplicates were mailed, in some cases more than one duplication card had been sent in by the same person and in this way extra ration cards may have been issued.

"When the same person has received more than one temporary ration card he must not only return this card but all the numbered and lettered coupons attached to it. If coupons have been used then they must be replaced by coupons from the holder's valid card," Mr. Cormier stated.

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### Big Crowds Attend Annual Pilgrimage To St. Francis Shrine At Skiff Lake

VERY REV. DEAN C. J. McLAUGHLIN WELCOMED THE PILGRIMS AND TOOK A PUBLIC SERVICE FOR THE FIRST TIME SINCE HIS RECENT ILLNESS

The annual pilgrimage to the shrine of St. Francis of Assisi at Skiff Lake, Carleton County, drew large crowds Sunday, Aug. 9, just as in past years. The pilgrims walk began at 10.30 a. m. followed by mass and sermon.

Very Rev. Dean C. J. McLaughlin, who welcomed the pilgrims, took public services for the first time since his recent illness. He said one of the joys of the year for him was meeting the pilgrims.

Pilgrimages to many may seem new but they are as old as Christianity and the most expressive form of deep Christian piety. From the days of the Israelites, pilgrimages annually to the temple with our Lord himself a pilgrim, have been made all down through the centuries by religious people," he said.

"The world is ruled by ideals more than by ideas, and as leadership is needed today more than ever, we have enlisted under the leadership of the greatest leader and reformer since the days of Christ—St. Francis of Assisi—who entered upon his life work 700 years ago when the world was torn asunder as it is to-day by strife and plunder.

We see Nazism in all its destruction and fury but let us of the democratic nations, who profess Christianity, know that statistics show that Christianity has been slipping very noticeably for the past number of years among us.

At 6 p. m. Aug. 3rd, 1872 a young man just four months short of his twenty-first birthday and a young woman who had celebrated her seventeenth birthday stood before Rev. George A. Hartley at his home at Upper Woodstock and heard him say: "I now pronounce you man and wife, and whom God hath joined together let no man put asunder."

And so Moses L. Shaw of Lower Wakefield and Frances M. Brownlow of Lower Brighton, N. B., started on their married life. Through seventy long years, with all life's care and sorrows, its joys and pleasures they always remembered that above every cloud the sun was shining. Looking back over the years, their theme is not of the trials, bravely faced together but of pleasant memories of the true friends and neighbors among whom they lived, the greater number of whom have passed on to that "Better Land" where one day they again hope to greet them.

Although so old in years, their minds are clear and their interest in current news and doings is as keen as ever. They delight in recalling incidents and customs of their young days and of the great changes that have since then taken place. In their youth on Sunday mornings they used to dress up in their best homespun clothes then their parents or a neighbor would hitch his oxen to a cart or sled, all would get on board and go away to church sometimes seven or eight miles distant.

If going any great distance, the Saint John river was their highway either by canoe or by the river steamers which ran as far up the river as the mouth of the Tobique or farther. Amongst the steamers they mention were the Bonnie Doone, Highlander, Antelope, Gazelle, Water Witch, Anagusta and Tobique, vessels which ran on the river until the railways came and bridges were built which prevented their coming up the river farther than Woodstock. ### World News In Brief

Friday August 7th.

The Russians withdraw into the Caucasus but take Don Bend positions. Canadian-American super-Commando Force is formed at Helena Montana. Gandhi is forcing issues in India. The Japanese extend foot holds in Northern Australia.

Saturday August 8th.

The Germans are pressing the Russians as Nazi forces advance closer to Stalingrad. Gandhi sounds the call for action in his campaign against the British in India. United Nations representatives meet in Moscow.

Monday August 11th.

The Allies strike at the Japanese in the Solomons. United States Pacific fleet bombards Japanese in the Aleutians. Gandhi starts blood shed and rioting in India. Russians are forced back in the Caucasus.

Tuesday August 11th.

United States Marines supported

by warships and planes are fighting in the Solomon Islands where the Americans are striving to gain a foothold. Germans are menacing the Russian Black Sea Fleet as Russians destroy their oil wells. Rioting and striking are continuing in India.

Wednesday Aug. 12.

Germans driving southeastward in Caucasus are only 200 miles from the largest oil fields. Strong measures are urged to quell disorder in India. Jap positions in Aleutians are threatened. Battle continues between Japanese and British on Solomon Islands.

Thursday August 13th, 1942

London says Soviet resistance is stiffening on all fronts. United States marines are still holding three of the Solomon Islands. The upheaval in India is completely in hand. A British carrier is lost in the Mediterranean.
