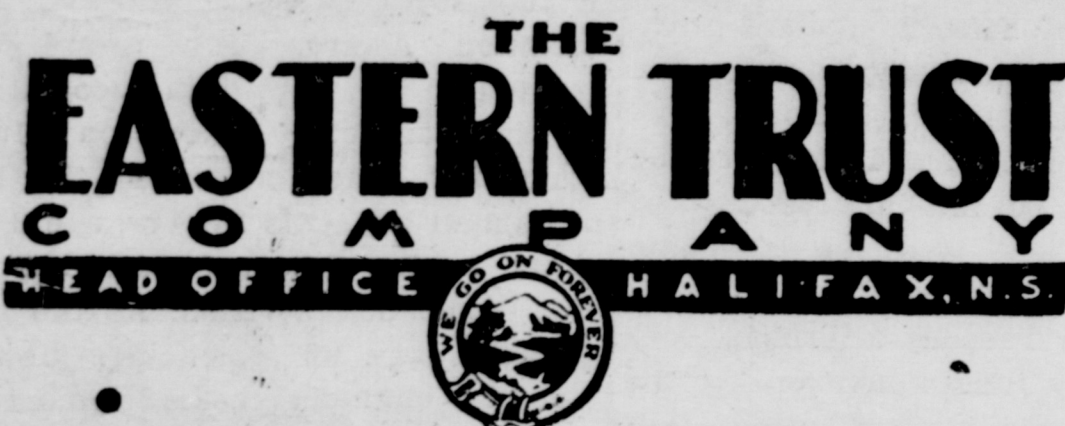

If bees are well prepared for the winter they should need no attention during the late winter and early spring. It is advisable, however, to examine the entrances of all outside wintered colonies to ensure that none of them is blocked with dead bees, otherwise those still living may perish by suffocation.

Careful Use Of Butter Means Enormous Saving

"The butter's spread too thick" may become a family by-word this winter.

J. G. Taggart, Food Administrator of the W.P.T.B. has asked every Canadian to reduce consumption of butter by one ounce a week in order that there be enough butter for everyone until spring, when production increases.

An ounce of butter is 2 table-spoons, which means that people are asked to save a little less than one teaspoonful a day. This will entail no hardship for anyone, but will result in a national saving of approximately hundreds of thousands of pounds of butter weekly.



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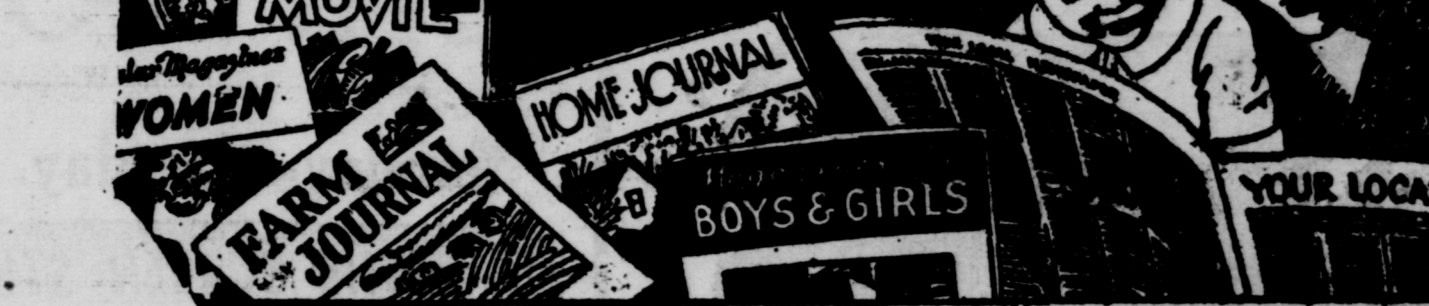
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
