



"We'll hold your place"

IN EVERY city, town and village throughout Canada today there are gaps where once were young men. They heard a call and put on navy blue, khaki, horizon blue, and they have gone, answering a call...

They are missed—missed not only in their homes but also in the business places which once they filled.

They have gone from every institution in Canada; but from none more than from the chartered banks. There is hardly a branch office from coast to coast which is not today the poorer—and the prouder—for those who thus laid down their pens.

But every branch manager, as he shook parting hands, had this consolation: he could say, "We'll hold your place. It will be waiting for you when you come back. That is a pledge."

There were 14,433 single and married men from 18 to 45 years of age employed by the Chartered Banks at the outbreak of war, 5,053—or 35% of them had joined the armed forces by October 31st, 1942; 1,243 others who joined bank staffs since war began have also enlisted.

Latest News of Wartime Prices and Trade Board

FINES ARE IMPOSED

Saint John, N. B., Nov. 20.—During the past week 59 persons in Canada were summoned to court and charged with infractions of the Wartime Prices and Trade Board's regulations. In addition 37 others were fined for infractions of the orders of the Controller of Supplies and the Oil Controller.

There were five such prosecutions completed in New Brunswick courts divided as follows: one involving an infraction of the Prices regulations; one for violations of the rental laws and three for contraventions of the orders of the Controller of Supplies.

Fines ranged as high as \$515.

PAPER BAGS

Ottawa, Nov. 19.—Effective immediately, paper bags used for various commercial purposes must be manufactured in fewer sizes and from prescribed weights of paper.

Candy and notion bags, millinery, laundry, wet wash, garment and curtain rod bags are covered by the order. Officials of the Prices Board said this regulation is designed to effect economies in the use of skilled labor.

FARM MACHINERY

Toronto, Nov. 20.—The 1943 output of new farm machinery in Canada will show a 25 per cent reduction over the 1940 output, according to H. H. Bloom, administrator of farm and construction machinery, of the Prices Board.

Addressing a meeting of farm implement manufacturers here recently, Mr. Bloom stated that only the most essential types of new farm machinery are being built. While the output of new farm equipment is being cut, he said, provision is being made for the manufacture of 150 per cent of the repair replacement parts distributed in 1940.

He urged farmers to check their present farm equipment and order the necessary parts as soon as possible in order that the machinery will be in good shape well in advance of the time it will be required.

RATION BOOKS

Saint John, N. B., Nov. 20.—Although effect since July 1, applications for ration books are being received from time to time at the office of the Wartime Prices and Trade Board here.

Commenting on this situation, J. Eric Cormier, the Board's ration officer in New Brunswick pointed out that in many cases no explanations are given when an application is made for a book.

A person requesting a ration book should state if an application has been made before and the address or any change in address must be given. This and other information useful in checking with the files should accompany the application, Mr. Cormier stated.

Steel Saving

Limitations placed on containers in the fruit and vegetable field alone in Canada have already saved 12,000 tons of steel which has been made available for war industries, according to an official of Wartime Prices and Trade Board.



Butter in Storage Must be Reduced

Ottawa, Nov. 19.—Butter held in storage must be reduced by the end of November by 25 per cent from the stocks held on Nov. 1 level.

This order of the Prices Board, designed to meet a "spotty" production shortage, is expected to place on the market 11,000,000 pounds of butter.

Coupled with this announcement was a statement by J. G. Taggart, food administrator of the Board, that there would be no coupon rationing of butter during the current season of low production.

"I cannot see the remotest possibility of butter rationing at any time in the near future. I can more or less guarantee that there will be absolutely no rationing of this commodity in the next six months," he stated.

The food administrator said that Canadians should curtail their consumption of butter by one ounce per week in order to meet a temporary shortage during the period of deficiency production from November to April. "The situation does not call for such a difficult, costly and intricate operation as coupon rationing," he asserted.

Bring The Sun To Children Via Vitamin D

When "Old Sol" shines brightly overhead in the summertime, and lightly clad children spend hours out of doors nature's marvellous chemistry allows them to manufacture their own supply of the sunshine Vitamin D.

Vitamin D is essential for babies and children, for without it they cannot develop strong bones. Children who do not get enough Vitamin D develop bow legs and other symptoms of rickets.

Nutrition Services points out that in cities, where the air is filled with smoke and dust, the ability of the sun's rays to provide Vitamin D cannot be relied upon, as the health giving rays cannot penetrate the smoke screen.

Adults too, probably need Vitamin D; expectant and nursing mothers certainly need it, for it helps to develop strong bones and teeth in the unborn baby and safeguards the mother's health.

Vitamin D, unfortunately, cannot be supplied in sufficient amounts from foods, but luckily fish liver oils supply it in abundance. That is why doctors prescribe cod, or some other form of fish liver oil for babies from the time they are a few weeks old. This should be continued through childhood and adolescence. It may be omitted during the summer months if children are out of doors in the country, but should be resumed when school days roll around.

Steam 35 minutes. Turn out to serve.
Apple Ice Cream
2 cups grated apple (4 medium apples)
1-2 cup milk
1 teaspoon gelatin
1-2 cup fine granulated sugar
3-4 cup evaporated milk or whipping cream

SUSIE'S LAYER CAKE

½ cup butter
1 cup sugar
3 eggs
2 cups flour
4 teaspoons Magic Baking Powder
¼ teaspoon salt
¾ cup milk

Cream butter and sugar; add well beaten eggs and beat again with butter and sugar till very light. Sift flour, baking powder and salt together and add to first mixture alternately with milk. Beat lightly for about 1 minute. Put into greased layer cake pans and bake 15 to 20 minutes.

2 tablespoons cold water. Soak the gelatin in cold water. Heat milk and dissolve the gelatin in it; cool. Grate the unpeeled apples. After grating a small amount of apple, measure and sprinkle with part of the sugar to prevent discoloration. Continue grating till two cups of apple are measured. Whip the cream. (If using evaporated milk chill until crystals begin to form, then whip.) Fold cream into the apple mixture. When the gelatin is partly set combine the two mixtures. Freeze in refrigerator or put in a mould, cover with buttered paper and tightly fitting cover and pack in a mixture of 6 parts ice to one part coarse salt. Let freeze 4-6 hours. Serves 6.
