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Canadian war industries supplied with most essential and urgently needed scrap materials. Without these salvaged materials Canadian war industries would be unable to sustain the vast increasing production of war equipment of all kinds to back up the Dominion's Armed Forces and the United Nations' Forces in this global war.

As of October 31, last, on the basis of the committee reports received and considering the provincial population, Manitoba leads the nine provinces in the total quantity of material salvaged. Ontario stands second on the list. Then in order comes British Columbia, Alberta, New Brunswick, Quebec, Saskatchewan, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island. New Brunswick, putting on a spurt, passed Quebec in the standing last month.

Still greater effort is necessary to increase the quantity of materials collected and more active cooperation is needed from the citizens of each community.

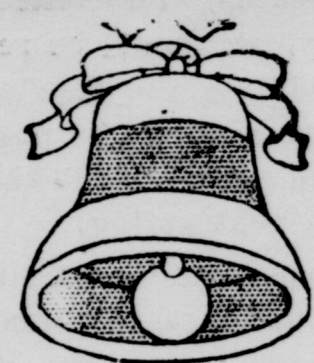
