FREDERICTON W. V. C. LADIES VISIT WOODSTOCK AND DEMONSTRATE WORK

Tell Local Ladies Of Corps

MISS DORIS HANSON, PRESIDENT OF LOCAL CORPS URGES CO-OPERATION

Mrs. T. C. Barker, captain of the Fredericton Women's Volunteer Corps and eight of the members of the group were present in the Town Hall Woodstock, Tuesday evening when they spoke to a large gathering of Woodstock women and demonstrated part of their work.

Miss Doris Hanson, president of the Woodstock Women's Volunteer Corps introduced the speakers and spoke briefly. Miss Hanson outlined the work already begun by the local society which she said had organized to assist their country and town in any way in their power. Educational work was already started, she said. First Aid and Home Nursing courses were organized and about to begin. She urged all present to enlist for some branch of study as it was important for all Canadian women to learn to defend themselves in these dangerous times.

Mrs. Barker the next speaker declared: "We are fighting ruthless enemies, foes who do not hesitate to bomb and machine gun women and little children. With submarines on the Atlantic coast and in the St. Lawrence and surrounded as we are by timber lands we are indeed in a vulnerable position." Mrs. Barker said that firefighting was taken up by the Fredericton Corps as it was an important work not covered by other societies. The capital corps has taken lectures in gas, incendiary bombs, first aid and shelter work and in addition has assisted the Fredericton Police clinic and studied firefighting and map reading.

Sgt. Isabel Lyons, general duty officer told of the help given A. R. P. officials in blackouts when members of the corps were called upon.

WOODSTOCK BOYS GET PRISON SENTENCE HERE

JUVENILE IS SENT TO INDUSTRIAL HOME IN SAINT JOHN

Clayton Segee, Leon Dickinson and Jason Miller three Woodstock youths charged with robbery with violence, were sentenced by Magistrate C. M. Augherton in the police court last week. Segee and Dickinson were each given two years in Dorchester penitentiary and Jason Miller two years in the Boys' Industrial Home in Saint John.

The robbery took place last Friday shortly after midnight when the three were showing Sanford Cameron, a young man of Centerville, N. B., who had been working in the woods at Canterbury, the way to the Aberdeen Hotel where he wished to spend the night. While going down an alley leading to Queen street they fell ruthlessly upon him, bearing him down and taking from him the sum of about \$25.

Although they attempted to smother him his cries for help were heard, but before anyone arrived at the scene the boys had fled. However they were soon rounded up and lodged in the police cells.

WOODSTOCK LADY IS ELECTED PRESIDENT OF NEW BRUNSWICK SOCIETY

The September meeting of the Woodstock Subdivision of the Catholic Women's League was held at St. Gertrude's rectory on the evening of September 15 with the president, Mrs. R. G. Thompson in the chair. On behalf of the members, Mrs. Thompson welcomed the new Diocesan President, Miss Grace L. Caughlin, M. A., and expressed appreciation of the honor which has come to the local subdivision through the election of one of its members to the highest office in the Saint John Diocesan Council of the Catholic Women's League of Canada.

Reports were given by Mrs. L. A. Moore, Convener of War Work, and Miss Loretta Burns, Convener of Lay Retreats. Mrs. Moore told of the work which had been done during the summer months—sewing, quilting, jelly making, etc., and announced arrangements for the resumption of the weekly meetings at the rectory for the purpose of continuing the war work. Miss Burns reported the attendance of four members at one of the lay retreats conducted at Torriburn, where the Diocesan Retreat House is situated.

Miss Caughlin gave an interesting report of the business transacted at the Diocesan Convention, held at the Admiral Beatty Hotel, during the latter part of August. She made special mention of the addresses given by His Excellency, Most Reverend P. A. Bray, C. J. M., Bishop of Saint John; by Very Rev. J. Keough, Pastor of St. Peter's Church, Saint John, North, and by Mrs. Frederick R. Taylor, Chairman of the Women's Advisory Committee, Wartime Prices and Control Board. Miss Caughlin stated that Bishop Bray made a special appeal for more and more activity among women in war work saying that patriotism is a virtue and a Christian duty, and that because religion is the inspiration of patriotism, the latter is all the more sacred and profound.

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Sessions To Conclude Thursday

JURYMAN IS WARNED AT AN INDICATION OF DRUNKENNESS

A warning to a juryman at an indication of drunkenness featured the September sitting of the Carleton County Court which opened on Tuesday morning before Judge M. L. Hayward and which is expected to continue in session all day to-day.

Two criminal cases were presented to the grand jury, true bills being found in both of them. An appeal by Mrs. Margaret Rogers from a decision in the magistrate's court is being heard to-day. F. C. Squires is the appellant and D. R. Bishop the respondent. The civil case of Mrs. Maude E. Parker, executrix of the estate of W. Newcombe Parker vs. Vernet Tracey is also to come up to-day. F. C. Squires is appearing for the plaintiff and D. R. Bishop for the defendant.

The first criminal case, the King vs. Pat Harris, who was accused of theft of tools from an American automobile was heard Tuesday afternoon. He conducted his own defence and was found guilty.

Hearing of the case of the King vs. Arnold Blaney charged with assaulting a Royal Canadian Mounted Policeman was begun Tuesday and continued until Thursday. D. R. Bishop conducted the case for the crown and F. C. Squires for the defendant. On Wednesday the court was delayed as it was indicated to the judge that one of the jurors was drunk. The judge remarked on the opening of court that he was satisfied.

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SCRAP IRON MAKES TANKS AND GUNS

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Judge Hayward States Remarks Of Clergyman Not Opinion Of Baptists Generally

At the opening of the Carleton County Court, in his address to the Grand Jury, His Honor M. L. Hayward made the following remarks:

Gentlemen of the Grand Jury, it is customary and has been the rule for a long time that a Judge, in charging the Grand Jury, in addition to referring to the particular criminal matters which are to go before them, often makes some references to matters of great public concern and, of course, at the present time the one matter of great public concern is the war in which we are engaged and its outcome. I am not going to waste your time this morning by making any particular remarks in reference to the war. There is nothing I can say which would be of any great value or have any great effect. There is one matter, however, to which I feel constrained to refer. At the last Convention of Baptist Body for the Maritime Provinces, a few weeks ago, the Rev. Dr. J. B. McLaurin delivered an address upon the fall of Singapore, which is reported in the Maritime Baptist of

Sept. 9th, 1942. I am not going to read it in full, but in the course of his address the Rev. Doctor felt called upon to say:

The fall of Singapore reveals to the Christian Church that the day of national and racial pride is doomed to pass, and that the day of universal brotherhood is dawning. One reason that bulwark fell was racial pride. The white race there in that citadel, filled with racial pride was certain nothing could happen. We were at Singapore to lord it over others—to dominate the souls of other men—to live our selfish lives. We had lost our grip on God and the eternal verities. Singapore is gone. The only members of the white race in Singapore and Hong Kong who came through with any lustre and glory are the missionaries of the Cross of Christ. They have kept the faith and have carried on."
