SEVERAL IMPORTANT MATTERS HEARD BEFORE COUNCIL AT MEETING FRIDAY

Approach To Carleton County Flyer Is Missing After Air Operations Island Is Discussed

COMMITTEE IS APPOINTED TO SEE MILITARY AUTHORITIES

The condition of the approach to Island Park was discussed at the monthly meeting of the town Council held in the Council Chamber Friday evening.

The town manager reported that about three weeks ago a truck had broken through the approach and a serious accident had been narrowly averted. He had investigated the bridge thoroughly that morning and found the planking and stringers in bad shape. He recommended repairing the approach temporarily and had approached Haydens who had some suitable lumber on hand. He estimated that it would require in the vicinity of 17,000 board feet to repair the approach a cost of approximately \$800.00.

On motion of Coun. McBride seconded by Coun. Neal it was decided to make temporary repairs at once.

It was the opinion of the council that, before major repairs were made a committee composed of Mayor E. R. Jones, Coun. Douglas McBride and the Town Manager go to Saint John this week to learn if possible from the military authorities their plans regarding Island Park.

The Town Manager also reported that trouble was being experienced in the sewer on Lower Main Street. It was decided to have the sewer repaired at once.

He also reported that a motor had been put out of commission at the pumping station during the recent electrical storm. The bolt of lightning jumped the lightning arrester and went down into the

Graduated From W.H.S. In 1937

SGT. WINSTON J. DICKINSON WAS WIRELESS AIR GUNNER

A cable from Ottawa received by Mr. and Mrs. Leslie P. Dickinson July 6 said their son, Sgt. Winston J. Dickinson, R. C. A. F., was missing in action in air operations June 29.

Sgt. Dickinson enlisted in Moncton in June 1940 and trained in Montreal, Quebec, and Picton, Ontario, where he was graduated as wireless air gunner and received a sergeant's stripes. In October he embarked for England and for a time was stationed at Hastings. Recently he had had intensive training as bomb aimer. He enjoyed his duties and on leave visited many places of historic interest. He wrote in his last letter home of being in air raids over Essen and Cologne, which he described as colossal.

Sgt. Dickinson was graduated from the Woodstock High School in 1937, and from the Provincial Normal School with a Superior Baccalaureate the following year. For three years he made his home with Mr. and Mrs. Geo. Carpenter, Union Corner. He attended Mt. Allison University, taking courses through the year to supplement his work.

His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Leslie P. Dickinson, now reside in Houlton, Me., and he has one brother, Dana A., at home, and a sister, Muriel C. Dickinson, a teacher in New Brunswick schools.

ARRESTED WITH BEAVER SKINS

PAPER SALVAGE

POSSIBLE SHORTAGE ON OLD NEWSPAPER AVERTED

F. Orval Troy, local Director of Salvage, following the receipt of circular this week in regard to waste paper salvage, in part reads as follows:

"The response to the various National Salvage appeals for the salvage of all types of waste paper has been very gratifying, so much so that the possibility of a shortage on old newspaper has now been eliminated.

There are still some grades of waste paper, however, which are very urgently needed such as brown wrapping paper and bags, corrugated boxes and containers, paper boxes, ledger papers and all kinds of office waste, letters, envelopes, etc., and we now ask that you more particularly concentrate on the collection of these other types of waste paper and suggest that you use newspapers for your household wrapping needs and that you preserve bags, boxes, etc., as enumerated above for salvage purposes."
