ADOPT-A-BABY WEEK IS OPENED

Adopt-a-baby Week opened Saturday.

First conducted in 1935 in the interest of the orphans in New Brunswick institutions, this special effort has brought home life and the fostering care of father and mother to 800 children.

Saturday it started for the eighth time, strong in hope and confidence that the record of the preceding years will be duplicated; better still, exceeded.

This article opens the columns of this newspaper to the effort. Sunday from all pulpits in New Brunswick came an appeal for the little ones.

Articles in city and provincial press have prepared the minds of those in position to adopt a child for the plea to be emphasized between now and next Monday. They will be asked to consider the position of the child whose start in life

is in, an institution: who has been bereft of parents; who, were it not that lonely hearts in childless homes are touched, might look to spend years before that chance in life would come that is their reasonable right.

They will hear, no doubt, of the blessings that have been showered on homes that have taken a little one for adoption; of the growth of affection that comes with the adoption of a child; of the happiness of foster parents in development of body and mind and soul of the babe they take as their own; of the entirely new life their charity has opened to themselves.

That all this is true beyond doubt is the evidence of the letters that have come to the institutions year after year, expressive of early and constant returns that have come "since we took little Mary to be one of ourselves."

As has been the fact since Adopt-a-Baby Week was inaugurated, it is again in charge of a committee of which L. Urban Pierce, president of the Knights of Columbus Home Finding Association, is chairman; and H. Usher Miller, secretary of the N. B. Protestant Orphans' Home, is secretary. With the Protestant and Catholic orphanages in the special effort of this week are associated the institutions of the children's Aid Society in Saint John, Moncton and Fredericton.
