Stage Set For Victory Loan Here

ORGANIZATION OF WOODSTOCK OF CARLETON COUNTY COMPLETED

Organization of the Town of Woodstock and Carleton County unit in preparation for the opening of the Third Victory Loan on Monday has been completed, J. F. VanBuskirk, county organizer, said today.

The town of Woodstock has been zoned off into 14 canvassing districts with two men in each district. It was decided at a recent meeting of the canvassers, called by E. W. May, county chairman, that the town salesmen would forego their commissions and contribute the sum to a war charity to be named later.

The town committee is headed by two captains, C. R. DeWitt and Cecil Stewart, who will be assisted by the following canvassers: J. H. DeWitt, W. J. Diblee, Mayor E. R. Jones, Vernon Simms, C. J. The quota for the town is \$175,000. As the sum of \$204,300 was raised in the last loan in Woodstock, those in charge are confident that the goal can be reached this time providing that everyone does his bit.

The quota for the county has been set at \$500,000 which has been broken up as follows: Aberdeen, \$60,000.00; Brighton and Hartland, \$55,000.00; Kent, \$40,000.00; Peel, \$15,000.00; Northampton, \$10,000.00; Richmond, \$20,000.00; Simonds, \$15,000.00; Wakefield, \$40,000.00; Wicklow, \$20,000.00; Wilmet, \$30,000.00. REPORT IS GIVEN ON LOCAL SALVAGE COLLECTION

EFFORTS ARE HIGHLY SUCCESSFUL F. O. TROY STATES

Woodstock's town-wide salvage collection on September 26th was highly successful. F. O. Troy local director reported today. Inability to obtain all four trucks asked for when plans for the drive were made slowed down collections considerably and some few localities were not covered. Some others failed to put their salvage out to the side-walk and so were missed.

A little more co-operation is asked for on the part of citizens. It is not much trouble to gather your own salvage and place it in a box or carton on the sidewalk. The men and boys who donate their time to do the dirty work and those who give their trucks and gas free, are making a much greater contribution.

Rags, rubber, metal and scrap iron were collected with more to come in. The collection was not as heavy as on previous occasions but considerable salvage arrived at the warehouse. It is difficult to estimate the value of this material at this time but it is felt that nearly \$150 will be realized from the one day drive.

Salvage committee officials announced today that for the benefit of those persons missing, collectors with trucks will be out Wednesday, Thursday and Friday of this week.

One truck will be in use and collecting at this time will be done by Mr. F. O. Troy personally who is spending his annual vacation collecting and sorting salvage.

R. C. A. F. LOOKING FOR TRAINED WOMEN

PATRIOTIC YOUNG WOMEN ARE ASKED TO COME FORWARD

On Page Eight of today's edition the Royal Canadian Air Force are advertising for Clerk Stenographers and Photographers for the Women's Division. Here again are to be found openings for patriotic young women, who would like to contribute more directly to the cause for which Canada is fighting.

The work such women do is valuable. In their trades they are usually found to be more competent than the men they replace. Their accuracy in little things and their patience with detail are womanly qualities that tend to be of great service.

Moreover, once again it may be said, such airwomen release airmen for service as aircrew. It has been found by experience in the R. C. A. F. that service life frequently fits a man for aircrew duties who, on enlistment, was found fit only for ground. This is true medically, and mentally as well. Service life appears to sharpen these lads and make them healthier. Male Clerk Stenographers and Photographers, therefore, remuster to aircrew as soon as an airwoman is trained to replace them.

Clerk (Stenographers) must be able to take dictation at 100 words per minute and type 40 words per minute. They must be good, clear penwomen and be able to transcribe clear, concise English from rough notes. Must be familiar with filing systems and general office procedure. A trade test will be given at the Recruiting Centre.

Photographers must have had practical experience in the following phases of photography: Cameras, Filters, Lenses, Printing and Developing. Preference will be given to those who have been employed in the trade.

Young women who are interested are requested to write to the R. C. A. F. Recruiting Centre in Moncton today. They are assured of prompt and courteous attention.

The October sitting of the Carleton County Circuit Court will open here on Tuesday. The only criminal case to come before the court is that of J. M. Bent, D. M. Fairbrother both of Saint John and Everett M. Boyd, Peel who were accused of breaking and entering J. B. Lockwood's jewelry store on the night of September 21st and who were sent up for trial by Sitting Magistrate C. M. Aughterson. C. J. Jones, K. C., will conduct the prosecution and F. C. Squires the defence.

There will be at least one important civil case to come before the court. Charles Shaw is bringing suit against Addie DeLong for \$7598.70, damages he claims arose from an automobile accident near Lakeville, Nov. 17th, 1941. D. R.
