Twenty-Five Years Ago. From the Sentinel Files October 19th 1917.

Forty-Five Years Ago. From the Sentinel Files, October 16th, 1897.

TESTED RECIPES

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the fruit mixture last and mix thoroughly. Pat out on a lightly floured board making five stripes 1 1/2 inches wide 3/4 inch thick and 12 inches long. Score the strips in individual pieces before baking on a greased cookie sheet at 400 degrees for 18-20 minutes. Pack bars whole; if using at home allow to cool before breaking into pieces.

Light Christmas Cake

1 1/2 cups butter
2 cups fine granulated sugar
6 eggs
2 cups blanched sultana raisins
3/4 cups chopped citron peel
2 cups chopped red glace cherries
4 cups flour
1 1/2 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon baking powder

Cream butter well, add sugar gradually and cream thoroughly. Add unbeaten eggs one at a time beating well between each addition. Dredge the prepared fruits with part of the flour. Sift salt and baking powder with the rest of the flour and add to the creamed mixture. Add fruit. Line a 9 x 9 inch fruit cake tin or two 4 pound honey pails with two thickness of greased brown paper, bake in a slow oven 50 degrees for approximately 2 hours.

Orange Bread

2 orange skins, put through the food chopper
1 cup water
1 cup sugar
1 tablespoon butter
1 egg
1 cup milk
3 cups flour
1 teaspoon salt
6 teaspoons baking powder
Cook ground orange skins, sugar and water together till syrupy, 15-20 minutes. Add butter and let cool. Add half the dry ingredients to the egg and milk mixture, then add the orange mixture and the rest of the dry ingredients and mix thoroughly. Bake in greased loaf tins or lined honey pails or coffee tins in a slow oven 325 degrees about 45 minutes. This recipe makes 2 standard sized loaves. If making for home use, let stand one or two days before using. Be sure the bread is perfectly cool before packing for overseas shipping.

Fuel saving is asked of Canadians everywhere. Problems of labor and transportation make fuel administrators fearful of a shortage in the cold weather, unless every consumer co-operates now to use as little fuel as possible.

In Ontario and Quebec where electric power must be conserved for war industries people are being asked to use little electrical heating equipment—and to turn off their stoves and their lights, as well as to save coal and wood.
