ALL PREVIOUS VICTORY LOAN RECORDS ARE SHATTERED

\$560,000 Remembrance Day Fittingly Observed Here by Militia and Citizens
Is Invested
In County

OVER A MILLION DOLLARS ARE
SUBSCRIBED IN LESS
THAN A YEAR

The County of Carleton ended the Third Victory Loan Campaign on Saturday with a record-shattering total of \$560,000 worth of bonds subscribed. Citizens joyfully noted the large commando dagger in front of the Post Office plunged to the hilt in the Nazi heart.

This total eclipsed the former record of \$557,000 subscribed in the second victory loan. In other words over a million dollars have been subscribed in this county in less than a year, a matter for congratulation in this county which has no big war industries, and no military camps with their big payrolls.

Organizer for the county J. F. Kirk, expressed himself as well pleased with the result and paid a high tribute to the organization and canvassers for their untiring efforts. While the average subscription had dropped from \$350 in the March Campaign to \$275 in the present, there were 435 more subscriptions in the Third Victory Loan.

Woodstock had the honor of holding first place in the drive buying \$193,710 bonds.

SPECIAL MEETING OF TOWN COUNCIL

IS HELD TO CONSIDER REPAIRS
TO FISHER MEMORIAL
LIBRARY

Bills incurred recently amounting to \$111.55 in repairs made to the Fisher Memorial Library were ordered paid at a special meeting of the Town Council held last Thursday evening Mayor E. R. Jones presiding.

G. C. Campbell of the Library Commission explained the nature of the repairs made to the heating system which proved much more extensive than was first anticipated involving tearing up some of the flooring before the leak was located.

E. A. Neal suggested that the library rent their lower floor to the town for an office and council chamber. He pointed out that the town might pay enough rent to support the library and in that way the commission would be independent.

The commissioners of the library stated that the rooms were being used for records and pamphlets, some of them quite valuable which were stored in the rooms in question.

Many Hear Service At Monument

KEEPING FAITH WITH FIRST
GREAT WAR HEROES IS
THEME

The address of Rev. M. O. Brinson, pastor of Woodstock United Baptist Church when he challenged all to keep faith with the sacrifices of First Great War heroes, to win the war, and to press on to the goal of a better world after it is won, climaxed an impressive memorial service marked by one of the largest turnouts of war veterans and citizens in recent years.

The parade which formed in the town square consisted of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, whose bright red uniforms gave a pleasing note of color to the somber November landscape; The Carleton and York Band, The Canadian Legion, B.E. S. L. Number 7 Vocational Wing, 2nd 89th Battery, The 2nd Carleton and York Regiment, The Girl Cadets, the Cadet Band, the Boy Cadets, and the Girl Guides. The Girl Cadets, and the Guides were newcomers this year and their marching evoked much favourable comment among onlookers. The route was along Connell, Green, Elm and Main Streets to the monument, where the legion took up the position on the sidewalk facing the monument with the active and reserve units directed.

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BULLETINS FROM THE WAR FRONTS FOR THE WEEK

Friday, Nov. 6th:—The Germans outstrip the Italians in their disordered flight leaving their partners to their fate on the Libyan sands. A hundred thousand Nazis have been killed in the Stalingrad drive to date, the Russians say.

Saturday, Nov. 7th:—Stalin says the weakened enemy will soon feel the force of new blows from the Russian Army. Gibraltar ship movements are worrying the Axis. Fleeing German units are pinned against the coastline in Egypt.

Monday, November 9th:—Algiers surrenders as United States forces, guarded by the British Navy and the R. A. F., meet French opposition. Their main goals are Casablanca on the Atlantic and Oran on the Mediterranean. Genoa is twice smashed by British, Canadian and American planes.

Tuesday, November 10th:—A fast United States move into Libya is possible as Allied operations in North Africa proceed swiftly. It is thought that an American Blitzkrieg across Tunisia is planned to meet Marshall Erwin Rommel's fleeing army. The Dieppe assault is now believed part of a gigantic Allied smoke screen for Africa.
