OVER THE TOP

Canada's third war loan has gone over the top. Canadian men and women and even children responded in a smashing manner to the appeals to provide the sinews of war. In spite of heavy taxation, rising prices, and the calls that had been made previously, there were few who did not do something to roll up the huge total of around a billion dollars.

New Brunswick came through in amazing style every one of its districts going over the top. Even such counties as Carleton without big munition factories, without military camps with their big payrolls, without having hundreds of soldiers in their midst whose bonds were bought in camp, without any of these things, the objective was reached and handsomely surpassed.

Coming after more than three years of war strain it was a notable effort, one that will show our friends and enemies alike that our zeal for the common cause is not slackening and that our national effort is not becoming enfeebled.

GENERAL MONTGOMERY

The last few days have seen a great new national figure brought into the limelight. General Montgomery, the victor of El Alamein, General Montgomery has never been a really popular commander in the usual sense of the word. He is a martinet. He believes his own theories to be right. He cannot tolerate physical weakness. He is hard himself and insists that all those about him shall be hard. He neither smiles nor drinks. At his conferences and when he lectures his officers he will not permit them to smoke—or for that matter to cough. He is a tough guy, in fact just a little tougher guy than that arch tough guy, Hitler.

Well, at the present moment, there will be few other to criticize either General Montgomery or his methods. He has given us what we have demanded and longed for for these three years past, a smashing victory over a German army. He not only beat it, but he made it stay beaten. So far, no matter how badly the Germans have beaten British armies, they never made them stay beaten.

EDUCATION WEEK

November 9 to 15 is Education Week all across Canada. People in all walks of life will pause to consider education and the part it has to play in the present struggle. While all will probably agree that the most important task facing the country today is winning the war, many will not realize that education comes second. The reason for this is that while the first task is to win the war on the military fronts, the second is to win the war on the political and economic fronts. This cannot be permanently done without education of a different kind from that which we have had in the past.

If we are going to train children to be active citizens of a democracy, we have got to train them in the techniques of that type of living. Now is a good time to begin. If winning the war is the most important thing in our present life, and it is, then let the schools reflect that fact. Let us not hesitate to bring into the school anything which will make the child better able to defend his country should the need arise. The other day I was discussing the possibility of establishing a cadet corps in one of the small high schools of this province. It was noted that to complete the cadet training would require four hours a week, four hours in which the boys would get instruction in first aid, air-raft recognition, theory of flight, drill, physical education, anti-gas instruction, meteorology, navigation, map reading, and many other vital subjects. The objection of some members of the school board was: "Where will they get the time?" They seemed to feel that a program of "Education as usual" was in order. Let us, during Education Week re-examine the purpose and practice of education in the light of a war which may last for ten more years if an offensive is not launched soon. Let the people visit their schools, remembering the influences of one's surroundings on one's life. If we feel the need for a change, let us say so. It is up to us. E. B. R. — The Forum.

IS IT THE TURNING POINT?

Every time there has been a big development in the war some writers have risen up and joyfully averred that this was the turning point of the

war. It started when the Germans invaded Norway, and every time since that we won a battle, dropped a bomb or went down to defeat fighting bravely against impossible odds the same group would be up again with: "This is the turning point." They are saying it again this week, but this week there is every reason to hope that they are right.

The Allies have seized the initiative. They are on the offensive. Rommel's army has been smashed. British and American forces have strongly invaded Vichy Africa. In the Far East dishonorable Yankees are giving honorable Japs a succession of kicks in the honorable pants.

It seems impossible that only a few days ago we were waiting anxiously, impatiently, while General Montgomery slowly smashed the defenses of that mighty army led by a skillful general, which had twice defeated and once humiliated our forces in Egypt. This time no mistake was made. Montgomery followed a simple plan. It was the same plan which made Napoleon the dictator of Europe. He hammered the enemy's flanks until they collapsed. Then he breached the main line and sent his cavalry through to destroy the fleeing and defeated remnants of the opposing forces.

Following tactics which he long had preached to his subordinates, Montgomery saved his armored forces until their time arrived. Then he threw them forward intact with devastating effect. It is bad business counting even the tiniest chickens before they are hatched, but it appears to be certain that Rommel's Afrika Corps is destroyed, and that the danger to Egypt and the Suez Canal is ended. Poor Mussolini will never make his triumphant entry into Cairo now. A very non-triumphant departure from Rome looks to be more imminent.

A few hundred miles farther east we have for once done the smart thing. Even at the expense of turning a nice, if stupid, old gentleman's feeling we have grabbed off bases that will be invaluable in invading the continent of Europe from the soft side, and will, with some further development of our gains, restore the Mediterranean route, which would be the equivalent to us of 60 million tons of new shipping, so much will the route to the east be shortened.

Last, but not least, Mr. Stalin—whether he knows it or not—has finally got his second front. Hitler will have to withdraw many divisions from the Russian front to man positions at his own front door.

THEY NEED OUR HELP

According to all advice from Ottawa, and also from evidence beginning to show up on the shelves of stores throughout the country, there are a lot of business men who are going to have rather tough sledding in the weeks and months ahead.

How badly our merchant friends in Woodstock will be hit is still a matter for conjecture but there are many who have already felt the pinch. Automobile dealers, service station owners, electric appliance dealers are among those who have already suffered badly. There will be more, without doubt, and among them some of our favorite merchants with whom it has been a privilege and pleasure to trade as long as you can remember.

We can all do our part to help them out at this time, we can refrain from buying a cent's worth of merchandise of any description outside of Woodstock even if what we want is not available in town. We must give every thing that we have in the way of trade to those merchants who are our friends, our neighbors and the backbone of our community. Every cent you spend in Woodstock will return to you again. If you are a merchant you will get it in trade. If a householder in better streets, better schools, public buildings and services. And when this war is over and life returns to normal again you will have the satisfaction of knowing that you helped.

The following letter in part from Lac Orlan Leech will be of interest to many of our readers.

Dear Mum, Dad and all:

Do you remember my telling you about the Padre who visited us about a week ago? Well, he didn't forget us. He sent each of us on the station some Canadian Legion writing paper, envelopes and blotters, one hundred and ten Canadian cigarettes and a copy of "Wings Abroad" the official R. C. A. F. newspaper over here. Pretty good of him, I'll say. I also got some mail to-day, the Sentinel of September 3rd and five letters. We also got our chocolate ration to-day. I got mine this afternoon (3 bars) and ate it all before I got back to my billet for supper. I think I will arrange for someone to dole it out to me and make it last a couple of days after this.

I read the Sentinel right through. I had a great time with the Missing Letter Contest. I guess the Missing name is C. A. Poole as I have every thing but the letter "L". I will have to go over it again. I got quite a laugh over that poem "Hitler Phones for Help". The Dominion Store did kind of made me hungry, oranges, grapefruit etc.

I have never seen a country that takes so long for the fall to come. I think I told you about a week and a half ago that the leaves were beginning to turn. Well, they are still in that stage only the patches of brown are increasing in size. It is pretty here but not as pretty as Canada where we have the frost to turn the leaves all at once. The harvest isn't all in yet over here. It is much later than at home.

I found an October Readers Digest that I was able to buy in the village. It was printed in England. I didn't know it was printed on this side at all. It was nice to get that. I wish I could buy McLean's magazine.

I must close now as it is 10.30 and I am getting sleepy.
