TEACHERS' CURRICULUM CONFERENCE

A Curriculum Conference for the teachers of Inspectorial District No. 8, comprising Carleton County and the Parishes of Andover and Perth in Victoria County, and for the teachers of the Parishes of Denmark, Gordon and Lorne in Inspectorial District No. 10, will be held in the Fisher Memorial School, Woodstock, N. B., beginning at 10.45 a. m. on Monday, August 31st, 1942, and ending on Friday, September 4th.

Teachers from the Parish of Grand Falls may attend either the Edmundston Conference or the Woodstock Conference.

The five Conference days will be added to the number of teaching days in the school year for the purpose of computing the teacher's salary from the trustees and the teacher's Government Grant. The public schools of the Province will open on TUESDAY, SEPTEMBER 8TH.

The Conference will deal with Language (Reading, Composition and Spelling), Conversational French, Social Studies, Arithmetic, Physical Education and Music. Teachers are asked to bring with them the prescribed texts in these subjects.

Teachers arriving in Woodstock on Saturday, August 29th, and desiring boarding places, should communicate with the Inspector.

R. P. officer. "The entire province is a territory subject to possible invasion while the shore areas offer still greater danger if any light spark or glare visible from a distance of 300 feet or more is shown."

Dr. Gibson said that while Air Raid Precautions wardens and the Royal Canadian Mounted Police had been kept busy checking fires and lights shown by beach parties on the coastal shores, it was essential that citizens refrain from breaking this regulation further inland as well.

Many summer cottages and camps are located in districts beyond reach of the hydro lighting system and beyond the sound of the air raid sirens, the chief A. R. P. O. said. In addition, sites selected for bonfires were usually out of sound of the signal. For this reason, campers should observe closely the request to permit no lights or glare to be seen.

There is the possibility of enemy planes being over the province, either flown across the Atlantic or from a carrier, warship or submarine, or even from a hidden base on this side of the ocean. It has been pointed out. In the event of air activity of this nature, lights or bonfires could serve the enemy as beacons. Seacraft also could utilize such guides if showing on the land, the authorities warn.

The co-operation of the people of New Brunswick is being sought by Civilian Volunteer Corps and A. R. P. officials in an effort to take full precautions against the threat of invasion or attack.
