TEACHERS TO HOLD CONFERENCE IN FISHER SCHOOL NEXT WEEK

Over 250 Will Attend Sessions

OBJECT OF CONFERENCE IS STUDY AND DISCUSSION SAYS INSPECTOR

The Curriculum Conference, which will be attended by 250 teachers from Carleton County and also some from Victoria, will begin on Monday next in the Fisher Memorial School and continue until Friday.

The object of the Curriculum Conference, A. B. Brooks, inspector stated, is to afford teachers an opportunity for study and discussion of the new "Progress of Studies" in order that more effective teaching may be done and that the schools may be better able to accomplish the task set for them, namely the training of the young for democratic citizenship.

Regional conferences were ordered by the Board of Education at their meeting May 27th for the twelve inspectorial districts. The five days spent in the conference are to be considered as part of the school year and teachers are to receive both salary from the trustees and government grant for this time.

Leaders for the conference have been selected from the teachers of the inspectorial district who have had successful experience with the present curriculum. The subjects to be considered and the leaders for each are: Language (Reading, Spelling and Composition), Miss Doris Hanson, Fisher Memorial School, Woodstock; Social Studies, Mrs. Vincent Buchanan of Centreville Superior School, who has had successful experience in both rural and graded schools; Arithmetic, Miss Hazel Harvey, East Florenceville Superior School; Conversational French, Maurice Ryan, Woodstock High School; Physical Education, Miss Kathryn Reed, Physical Education Director, Provincial Normal School; Music, Miss Marion Lin-

WAR VETERAN IS LAID TO REST

PTE. MILLAGE COSMAN OF DEBEC DIES WHILE ON DUTY

Many friends learned with regret of the death of Pte. Millage Cosman, aged 46, of Debec which occurred suddenly near Saskatchewan on Monday August 17th. A veteran of the First World War and a member of the 20th Company Veterans' Guard of Canada, 6th Platoon, at present stationed at St. Stephen, Pte. Cosman died of a heart attack while on duty with other members of his company escorting a carload of German prisoners to their destination. Born at North Lake, York County he was the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Wallace Cosman. He lived the most of his life in Debec and was highly regarded by all who knew him.

He is survived by a wife, formerly Miss Jessie Smith of Debec and ten children, the oldest son Floyd being with the Carleton and York Regiment overseas, also four brothers. (Continued on Page 8.)

AIRMAN LOSES LIFE IN ACTION OVER ENGLAND

SGT. PILOT BRUCE MCINTYRE OF THE R.C.A.F. BORN IN PLYMOUTH

Sgt. H. P. McIntyre and Mrs. McIntyre formerly of the parish of Richmond but now residing in Kamloops, B. C., received the sad news last week that their son Sgt. Pilot Bruce McIntyre had been killed in action.

Sgt. Pilot McIntyre was born at Plymouth, Carleton County in 1918. When a very young child he moved with his parents to Kamloops, B. C., where he lived until a short time before the outbreak of the war when he visited his aunts, Mrs. James Barnett, Speerville and Mrs. Ernest Haynes, Plymouth and his uncle, Woodbury McIntyre, Richmond. He enlisted in the R. C. A. F. in July 1940, received his wings in Summer April, 1941, and went overseas in May, 1941. He served for a time in the Middle East and it was there he was transferred to England that he met his death in action over England.

His father won several decorations in the last war and was made a King's Corporal. His only other brother is serving in the navy.

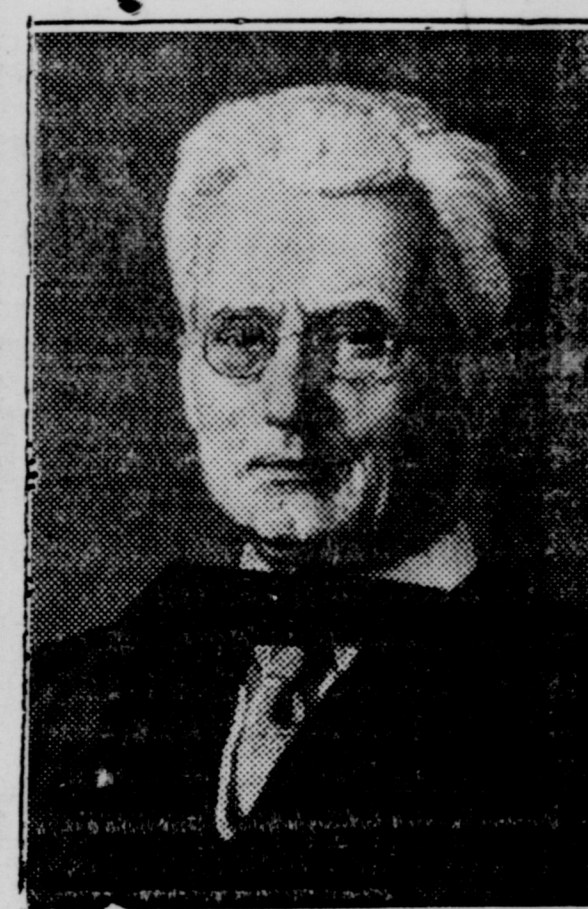
SUCCESSFUL CLINIC HELD ON MONDAY IN FISHER MEMORIAL HOSPITAL

The announcement said the Canadians are equipped with giant long-distance Catalina flying boats. (The new unit was formed recently but last week's announcement was the first official word on the formation). Members of the squadron include Navigator P.O. M. D. Seeley of Jacksville who left the University of New Brunswick to join the R. C. A. F. and had his first duty in Bermuda. Mr. Seeley is the son of Mrs. Seeley and the late Ernest A. Seeley.

World News In Brief

Friday, August 21st.

The Russians wipe out large number of Germans as they try to cross the river Don. The Canadians left Dieppe, silent, afire and in ruins after the Commando raid. Allied planes raid French Coast in biggest day offensive of the war.

Saturday, August 22nd.

The battle for Stalingrad is at a critical stage. The Germans are trying to erect bridgeheads across the Don River—mopping up plan goes on in Solomon Islands.—N. J. Ralston included in casualty list following Dieppe.

Monday, August 24th.

Brazil's declaration of war on the Axis clears the way for action. A new wedge is driven into the Russian line by the Germans. R. A. F. land springs day surprise attack on German port of Emden. Europe worries about food as winter approaches.

Forty-one Canadians from Dieppe are buried in England.

Tuesday, August 25th.

The decisive fight for Stalingrad has begun. The present lull in Egypt may end soon as increased air activity is noted on Egyptian desert. Churchill is back in England after historic meeting in Moscow. Chinese make important gains against Japanese.

Wednesday August 26th.

Duke of Kent is killed in a plane crash while on war mission to Iceland. A million Nazis smash at Stalingrad. A fierce battle rages as the Japanese try to retake the Solomons from the Americans.

Thursday, August 27th.

The Russians speed up counter-attacks to relieve the imperilled city of Stalingrad. The Japanese land ground forces in New Guinea. The Duke of Kent will be buried with full military honors in privacy.

Three Red Cross jelly kitchens are in operation in Woodstock this week. Mrs. Everett Ridley, convener for the jelly making project of the Red Cross in this area, told the Sentinel today. The United Baptist ladies began operations on Tuesday. The United Church on Wednesday and the Catholic ladies on Thursday. The objective set for the Woodstock branch is a ton and sixteen pounds of jelly. Five hundred four pound tins are required to be filled. The jelly when finished is to be shipped overseas to provide food for hospitals and bomb victims in England.

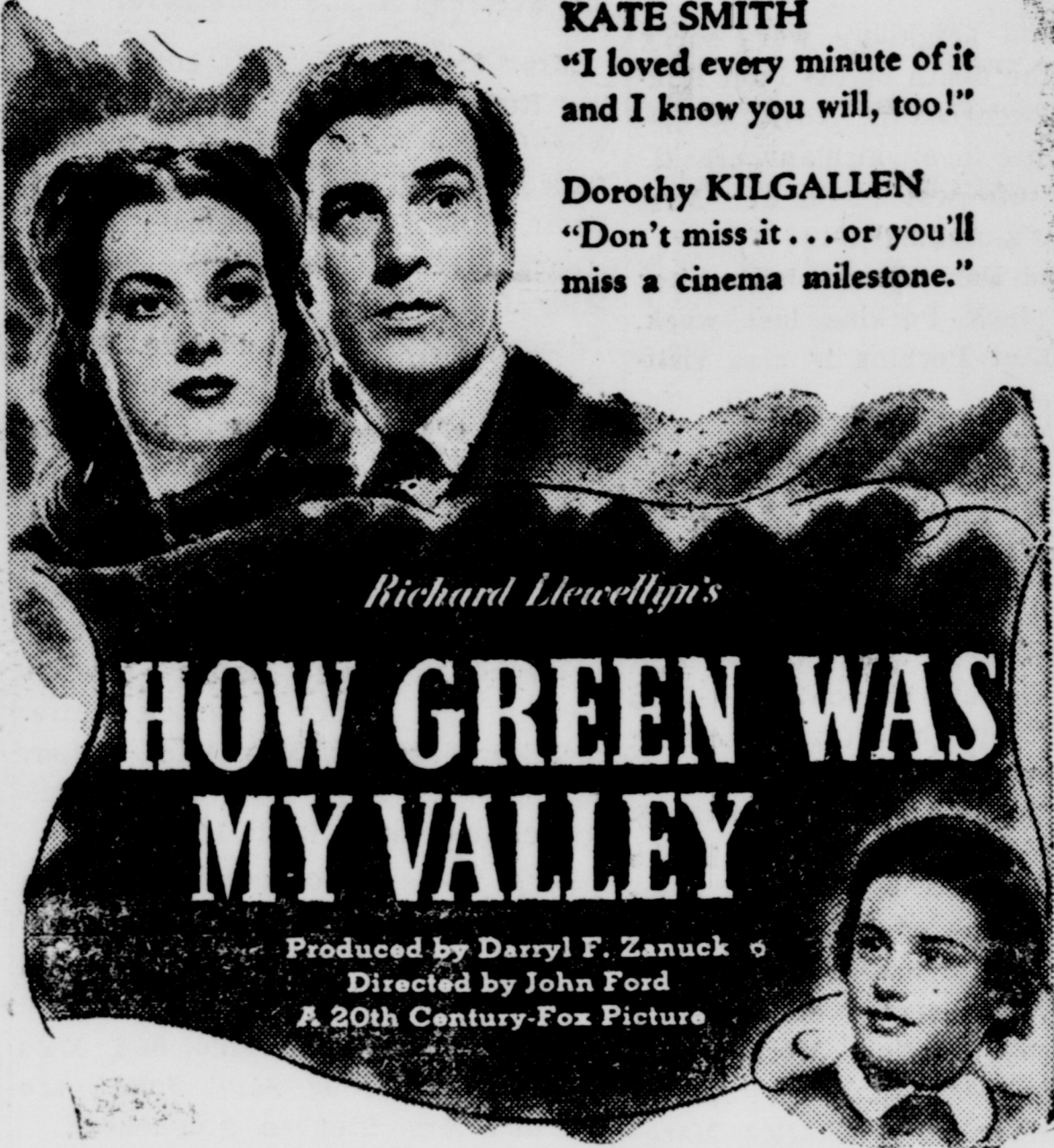
