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FREDERICTON LADIES COME HERE TO ORGANIZE VOLUNTEER CORPS

Capital Group Learns Fire Fighting Squad Drill, Map Reading and First Aid

MRS. T. C. BARKER, CAPTAIN, OUTLINES ACCOMPLISHMENTS OF CORPS SINCE ITS ORGANIZATION

Representation of the various Woodstock women's organizations as well as members of the local Civilian Volunteer Corps were present Tuesday evening in the town hall to hear Mrs. T. C. Barker, captain of the Fredericton Women's Volunteer Corps assisted by C. M. S. (Mrs.) F. T. B. Young and Lieut. Miss Barbara Nolan, liaison officer of the Fredericton group tell of their corps and what had been learned by them since their organization.

The ladies meet two evenings a week, Mrs. Barker stated, and in that time are given squad drill, lectures in passive Air Defence, Anti-gas Fire Fighting, Incendiary Bombs, Decontamination, Map reading and First Aid.

Mrs. Barker said: "To-day we have a great opportunity. We may never be able to join the active service forces as some of our girls have but we can learn how to keep the home fires from burning and how to assist in a practical way those in authority over us."

Mrs. Barker urged the formation of a corps in Woodstock pointing out that in this way young women may be trained to be a real help to their country.

Karl Walker, Chief of the Fredericton Fire Department, spoke briefly. He told of attending a school of Civilian defence at Amherst, Mass., which concentrated on gas attacks and gas decontamination. He told of instructing the F. W. V. C. in fire fighting and expressed his willingness to assist Woodstock along these lines in any way in his power.

Mayor E. R. Jones and Aubrey Hetherington, chairman of the C. V. C. and Mrs. J. D. Winslow spoke briefly.

NATIVE POTATOES COME ON MARKET

The first native potatoes made their appearance in the local stores this week, selling at 75 cents a peck. Strawberries are about done. Raspberries which are really plentiful are for the most part being shipped to the American markets where better prices are being obtained, consequently they are scarce in the local stores. Other new vegetables are plentiful and are bringing good prices. Peas are 50 cents a peck, beans, onions and carrots are ten cents a bunch and lettuce ten cents a head. Eggs and butter are 30 and 28 respectively.

PROVINCE WIDE BLACKOUT TO BE HELD THIS WEEK

TO TAKE PLACE BETWEEN THURSDAY AND SATURDAY SAYS DIRECTOR

D. L. MacLaren, Saint John, director of Air Raid Precautions for New Brunswick, announced today that a province-wide test blackout will be held some time during the last three days of the present week.

An announcement of this kind, with no further warning, other than additional press or radio reminders, being given until the actual alarm signal, is in accordance with a decision reached when Civilian Volunteer Corps and A. R. F. commandants and vice-commandants of New Brunswick conferred in Fredericton last month.

At that time civilian defence leaders resolved it would be in the best interests of determining true test results, with citizens expecting a rehearsal blackout but not knowing at what hour it would come, if this system of advance warning was carried out. It had been learned that when the actual time of the test operation was known beforehand the element of surprise entirely disappeared and householders waited at home for the signal they knew was coming and then calmly proceeded to extinguish their lights. A. R. P. and C. V. C. wardens were at their posts ahead of time too, ready to go into action before the alarm was given.

As pointed out at the provincial conference by Dr. J. Miles Gibson, Fredericton, provincial A. R. P. officer, Zone A includes all coastal areas of New Brunswick within about 50 miles of the Atlantic and Zone B covers the remainder of the province — the inland districts. The blackout which will be called at some hour July 23, 24 or 25 will extend to all parts of Zones A and B. The zone definitions, said Dr. Gibson, are based on the expectancy or liability of enemy attack. (Continued on Page 8.)

Holes Are Repaired And Filled

A SEAL COAT WILL BE APPLIED IF ASPHALT CAN BE HAD

The work on the pavement on the south side of the Meduxnekeag bridge is progressing satisfactorily, Town Manager George B. Kilpatrick said this morning. The holes are all filled up and it is hoped to put a seal coat over King Street and that part of Lower Main Street between the Broadway Hill and the Meduxnekeag bridge.

The difficulty at present is the scarcity of asphalt. A load arrived on Wednesday and the town crew went to work and spread it at once. If it is impossible to secure a sufficient quantity of material from the asphalt controller, then the remaining repair work will have to be done with Colas, Councillor Douglas McBride stated.

Many inquiries have been received from citizens concerning the repairs to be made to Connell and Chapel Streets. Mr. Carrithie of the Coastal Asphalt Products, Saint John who laid the pavements promised to be in Woodstock in three weeks when the streets will be repaired. The delay has been caused, it is stated by the fact that the company have been busy at airports and about the Port of Saint John.

PURE BRED STOCK MAY BE IMPORTED

MANY INQUIRIES ARE BEING RECEIVED FOR PUREBRED HEIFERS AND CALVES

The secretary of the Maritime Shorthorn Association advises that many inquiries are being received for purebred heifers and calves of this breed. The supply of these in the Maritimes is not nearly equal to the demand. He further states that good pure bred calves might be located in Ontario at a cost ranging from \$60.00 to \$75.00 a head. It is possible that, if enough interest were shown, an importation might be arranged, with the Maritime Association assisting in transportation. Any farmers in this district who would be interested in such an importation are advised to communicate with A. E. Raymond, Assistant District Representative, Woodstock, N. B.

News of the Day

World News In Brief

Friday July 17th.
British troops, holding newly won advance positions in Egypt have been fighting off violent attacks in a great tank battle which is still going on. Nazi submarine yards are bombed by the R. A. F. Moscow claims that the losses of the German invaders are twice those of the Russians.
Saturday July 18th.
The Russians recross the Don but the Nazis are still progressing towards Stalingrad goal at south end of long front. Two Axis counter attacks were beaten off to-day on Egyptian front.
Monday July 20th.
The Russians block the Stalingrad drive, British forces make small gains in Egypt. Many new tanks and guns are arriving in Egypt.
Tuesday July 21st.
The Russians seize the initiative in the Upper Don and force the Nazis back. In the south the Germans are still advancing to the Caucasus defences. R. A. F. and U. S. airforces bomb Axis ports of supply in Egypt.
Wednesday July 22nd.
Nazis in deadly peril near Voronezh. British and U. S. leaders discuss a limited division for second front. Japanese have now been removed from British Columbia areas.
Thursday, July 23rd.
The Russians have fallen back to a finish fight before Rostov. The situation in Russia is very grave. The clamour in Britain grows louder for a second front.
Egypt. The Germans have renamed Tobruk "Rommel".
