FILL UP YOUR COAL BIN

Fill up your coal bin now, otherwise it may not be possible to do so later in the season. This is the advice given by officials of the War Time Prices and Trade Board who point out that a shortage of fuel threatens owing to transportation and labor problems.

In order to assist consumers to make early fuel purchases, the Board has devised a special credit plan so that money can be borrowed with which to buy coal.

Under this plan the chartered banks will discount notes given by customers whom their coal dealer can recommend as satisfactory credit risks. No amounts less than \$50, or more than \$250, will be advanced for such purposes. The money borrowed will be repaid in equal monthly installments and the last payment must be made by May 15, 1943.

All coal purchased under this credit plan must be delivered by August 31, although a dealer who is unable to fill his orders by that date will be given another two weeks, extension.

LOCAL MEMBER RECEIVES ANSWERS

RETURN TO AN ORDER OF THE HOUSE OF COMMONS BY H. H. Hatfield, M. P. (Victoria-Carleton), dated July 9, 1942, showing:—

1. Will the subsidy on butter apply to dairy as well as creamery butter?
2. What percentage of the total Canadian butter is manufactured on the farm (dairy) and in the factory (creamery)?
3. How does the Government propose to compensate the farmers who produce dairy butter if they do not come under the butter-fat subsidy?

1. The butter subsidy is payable only on creamery butter as defined in Section 2 of Part 1 of the Dairy Industry Act.

2. 24.3 per cent on the farm and 75.2 per cent in the factory in 1941.

3. It is not possible to subsidize the production of dairy butter. Most people who make dairy butter can send cream to plants which are capable of producing creamery butter as defined in Section 2 of Part 1 of the Dairy Industry Act, and if they do so they will thereby become eligible for a subsidy of six cents per pound butterfat.

be the efficiency of manufacturing and shipping operations in plants where labour problems are acute and the rush season imposes a heavy strain on resources. In one plant on the east coast the problem of labour became so desperate that men of the Canadian Armed forces had to be called in to solve it.

A reduction in number of fertilizers grades will work no hardship on the farmer. The abbreviated list will cover adequately the needs of the crops insofar as anyone is competent to predict them. Crop response to fertilizing is influenced by several factors, including the uncontrollable and unpredictable one of seasonal condition. It is estimated that of the fertilizer applied for a given crop only approximately half its phosphate and potash is utilized by that crop, the residue remaining for the benefit of those following in the rotation.

Some of the fine distinctions made in adapting fertilizer formulae have amounted to hair-splitting, and the crops certainly gave no indication that they knew the difference. Many of the popular fertilizer grades are based on no definite experimental evidence, and the present seems opportune to apply the precepts evolved from an accumulation of reliable data now available. The Fertilizers Administrator, having in mind the visible and perhaps limited supplies of fer

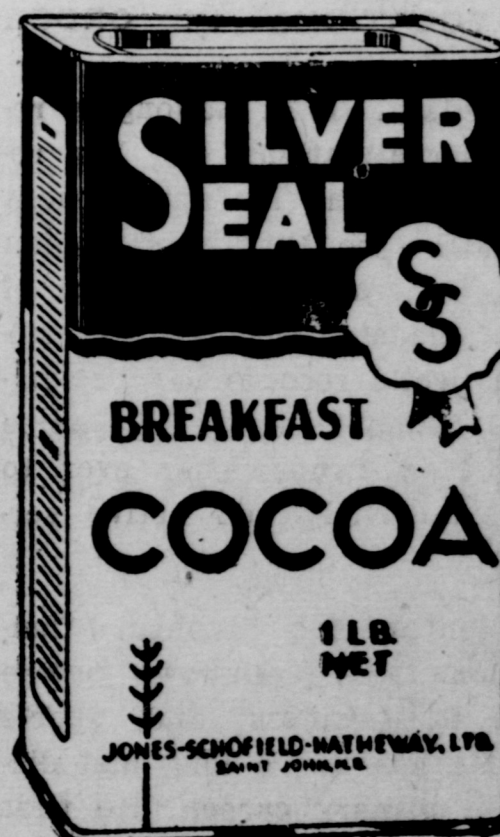

FOREST FIRES SLOW NATION'S WAR EFFORT

Who starts forest fires? With the exception of lightning, says the Canadian Forestry Association, the entire blame sits on the doorstep of the people who use the woodland for their play or their livelihood.

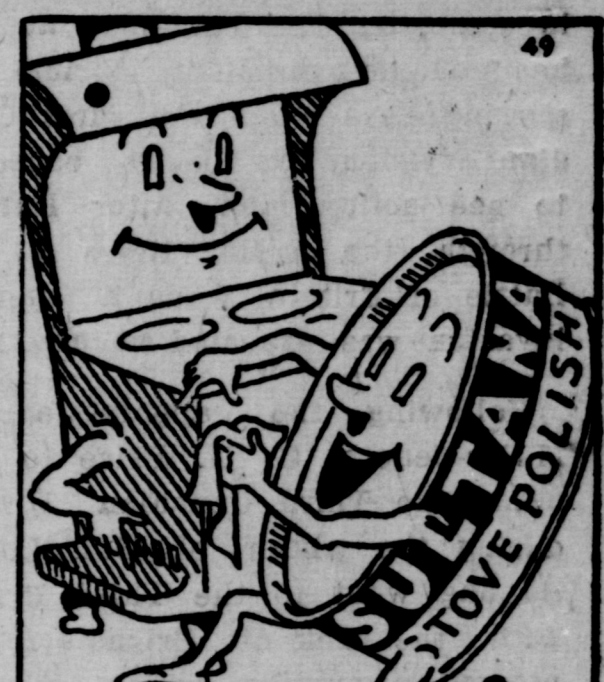
Twenty percent are directly caused by campers and fifteen percent by smokers, making more than a third of all the forest fires in Canada. Settlers clearing their land and burning their slash make up an other sixteen percent, much higher in certain districts of new colonization. Incendiaries are serious in some areas and a minor matter in others, but coupled with the forest fires started by forest workers, road builders, and a small contribution by the railways add nineteen percent to the fire bill. Lightning starts sixteen percent and a category called "unknown and miscellaneous" but mostly of a suspiciously human origin completes the remaining fourteen percent.

All governments throughout Canada are aware that the forest resources are one of the mightiest assets in pressing the war to victory, and have made repeated appeals to the public to apply their patriotism to forest fire prevention.
