CONGRATULATIONS IN ORDER IN THE EDITOR'S MAIL BAG

Major-General H. N. Ganong is receiving congratulations on his recent promotion and his appointment to command the Eighth Canadian Division. General Ganong is one of Eastern Canada's best known soldiers and while records are not immediately available we believe he is the first New Brunswicker ever to command a division on active service.

A resident of St. Stephen, General Ganong was well known before the war in business and sports circles. He has had a long and distinguished military career. He first joined the York Regiment before the last war, and was commissioned in 1915. After the war he retained his connection with the militia and after the amalgamation of the Carleton Light Infantry and the York Regiment in 1936 he became second in command of the new regiment, the Carleton-Yorks. A year later he assumed the command.

He was still in command when the war broke out and directed the mobilization and early training of the unit at the Island Park camp here. In December 1939 the regiment proceeded overseas with Lieut. Col. Ganong, as he then was, in command. He remained at the head of the regiment during the stirring days when the First Canadian Division was hourly expecting to see action, and after Dunkirk through the trying times of the Battle of Britain, when a German invasion was expected at any time.

Following the appointment of Major-General C. B. Price to command the Third Canadian Division during the winter of 1941, Colonel Ganong went to the Third Brigade with the rank of Brigadier. His present promotion, which will be most popular both in military and civil circles, comes after eighteen months of hard and profitable work at the head of his brigade.

THERE IS DANGER

We have heard it prophesied that in the event of the collapse of the Russians the Germans will turn their attention to Great Britain and to this continent. Many persons well qualified to judge say our country is in real danger.

Few people take the threat seriously, however, comforting themselves with the belief that since we have not yet been the victim of a bombing raid we never will be.

Nothing could be farther from the truth. We are told that a bomber can fly all the way from Germany unload its bombs of death and destruction and return to its base without refueling. The sooner we awaken to the truth that we are vulnerable to air attack the sooner we will be able to withstand the raid when it comes.

There are those who regard the activities of our civilian volunteer corps with an indulgent smile. The humour will be removed, however, when the first bomb falls.

It is not our desire to alarm people. We earnestly hope and pray that the nightmare of a bombing raid will never be experienced here but we do feel that there is a very real danger and also that the Civilian Volunteer Corps should receive the hearty support and co-operation it deserves.

PROTECT THE FORESTS

So far New Brunswick has escaped very well from forest fires this year. Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island, however, have suffered heavily. Perhaps this is not entirely due to chance. The people of this province have been educated over a long period of years to exercise great care in the woods, and the long campaign of education is paying big dividends now in forest conservation.

Nevertheless there are still many people using the woods, and a moment's carelessness on the part of any one of them may lead to a disastrous conflagration. Every person who enters forest land must be on his guard every minute, especially with cigarettes, pipe ashes and matches and with camp fires.

Prevention of forest fires is of vital importance in any year. This year, with every ounce of our energy and every dollar of our resources needed for the war effort it becomes more important than ever. It is the duty of every man, woman and child to exercise the utmost vigilance to prevent outbreaks.

AIR LETTER FORMS

TO EXPEDITE DELIVERY OF LETTERS TO FIGHTING SERVICES

Taking advantage of Canada's Air Mail network and air connections, a new method of communication being introduced by the Hon. W. P. Mulock, K. C., M. P., Postmaster General, which will cut to a minimum the time taken by letters under wartime conditions to reach the Boys Overseas.

The new forms will be available at any Post Office and the postage rate will be only 10c a letter — no matter to what part of the World the Air letter is addressed. For this 10c fee the Post Office Department will have the letter transmitted to its destination by the most expeditious method of transit. The low 10c rate applies. Postal Authorities emphasize, only on letters written on the special Air Letter forms provided and addressed to members of the Canadian, British or Allied Armed Forces Overseas.

The new Armed Forces Air Letter form is of light-weight paper, blue in colour, measures about 10 1/2" x
