DIRECTOR FOR PROVINCE GIVES RESUME OF WORK

Area Commandant, D. D. Trotter of Perth, presided and welcomed all C. V. C. branches of Carleton County. The Mayors of Hartland and Woodstock and County Councillors at a meeting of the C. V. C. held in the Town Hall Tuesday evening. Mr. Trotter introduced H. M. Armstrong, Acting director of A. R. P. in the Province, during the absence of D. L. 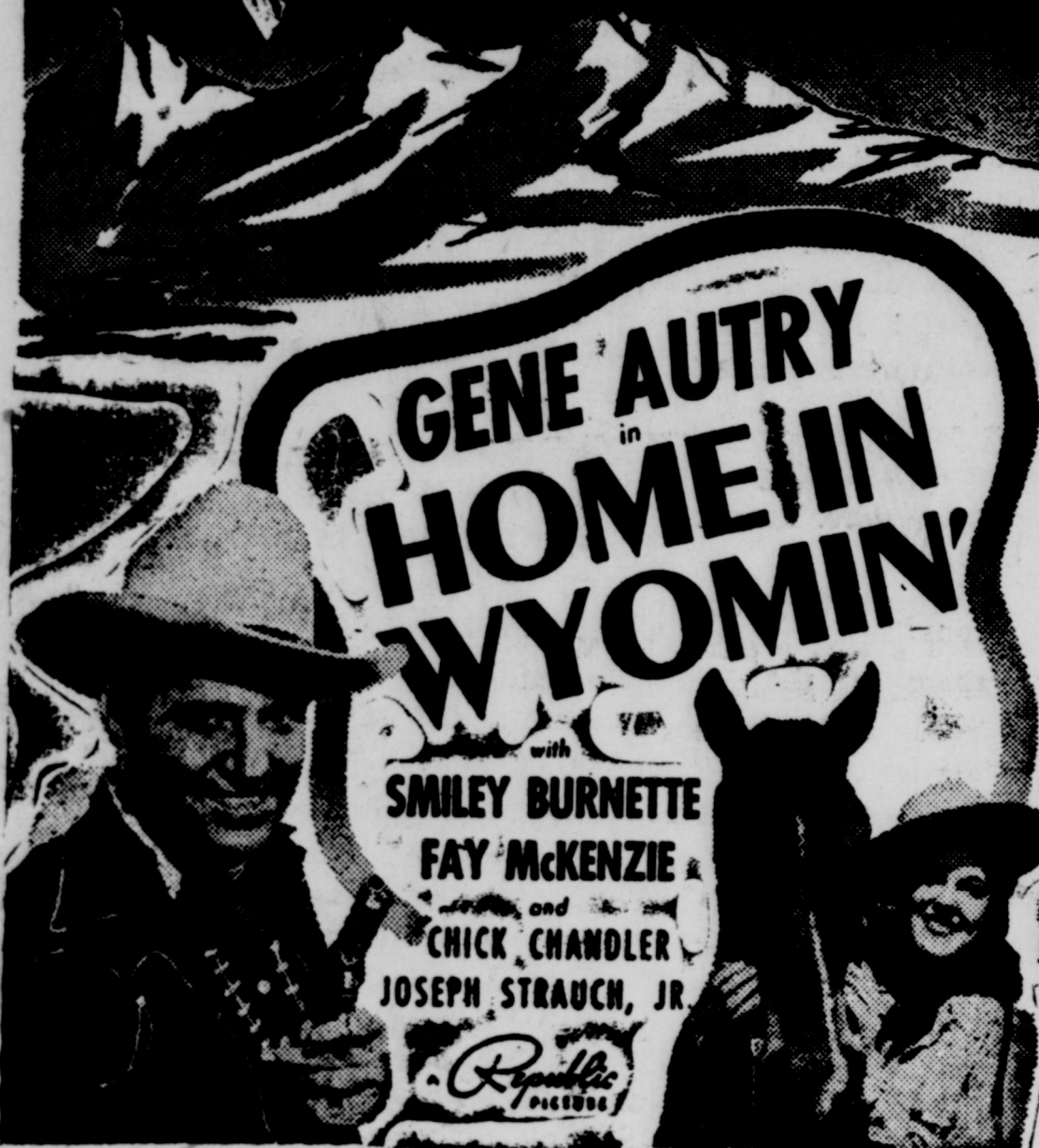

World News In Brief

Friday, Sept. 18th. - Stalingrad battle is nearing climax. Balloons trail explosives over Hungary. Germans wait in vain for announcement of Stalingrad's fall. Gasoline ration in Canada reduced by half for "AA" category.

Saturday, Sept. 19th. - Hard-pressed Stalingrad gains a day. The garrison with their backs to the wall have regained some positions. Dieppe casualties are computed as 67 per cent of 5000 Canadians.

Monday, Sept. 21st. - Stalingrad's defenders are still unshaken. R.A.F. blasts Munich. A Japanese fleet is turned in the Solomons by American Flying Fortresses. Beet rationing may be necessary.

Tuesday, Sept. 22nd. - Nazis are now explaining Stalingrad delays. A hundred thirteen Canadians are lost with destroyer "Ottawa".

Wednesday, Sept. 24. Tremendous losses are sustained by Germans in struggle for Stalingrad, with the Russians still in possession. The United States navy expects strong counter attack by Japs. Americans in Solomon Islands are preparing for assaults.

Thursday, Sept. 24th. - Stalingrad defence stiffens as Nazi are beaten back in several sections. Desert points in Egypt are raided by British. Netherlands are alive with Anti-Nazi sabotage.
