CANCELLATION OF ISLAND PARK LEASE BY MILITARY RECEIVED BY COUNCIL

Willing To Fix Property As In 1939

COUNCIL ASKS DEPARTMENT TO DEFER EXPENSE UNTIL AFTER WAR

The cancellation of the lease for Island Park by the Military authorities was placed before the council at their meeting Tuesday evening. In the absence of Mayor E. R. Jones, Coun. E. A. Neal presided. The Manager stated that the military authorities were willing to tear down the buildings which they had placed on Island Park during their tenure, and restore the property as it was in 1939. The delegation from the council who were discussing the matter with the army officials, asked that the department defer that unnecessary expense until after the war. The Town Manager went on to say that the Brigadier had expressed himself as pleased with this arrangement.

Several councillors felt however that the military buildings on the island were an added insurance risk, particularly since they were empty. Consequently it was moved by Coun. Maxwell, seconded by Coun. Hay that the Department of National Defense be approached with regard to obtaining assistance with the insurance on the property and that the matter of effecting such an arrangement be left with the Finance Committee and the Town Manager.

Mr. Kilpatrick also reported that the sidewalk on Grover Street was begun Tuesday afternoon. It is to be 300 feet by 4 1/2 feet and will add to the usefulness and appearance of Grover Street.

REGISTRATION OF WOMEN NEXT WEEK

EXPLANATIONS GIVEN REGARDING AGE CLASSES

Because registration of Canadian women will be compulsory under National Selective Service regulations, with the first group registering between September 14 to September 19, Mrs. Rex Eaton, assistant director of National Selective Service has issued clear-out explanations of who must register so that no women will break the law unintentionally.

The first group to register will be the age classes born between January 1, 1918 and December 31, 1922—in other words, women between the ages of 20 to 24 inclusive. All women must register, with one exception and that group is made up of the women who are employed and in possession of Unemployment Insurance Registration cards 411 and 413 and who are still working for wages or salaries and paying unemployment insurance. Inmates of institutions such as hospitals, mental hospitals and members of religious institutions need not register.

Any women, however, who did register for unemployment insurance last April and are not now working for wages and salaries must register again. Women who were registered in April but have now left jobs in the city are also required to register.

For example, a girl working in a factory in April, might have left now to take farm work or domestic service, both noninsurable industries. She would still have her unemployment insurance card as required but must re-register because she is not working in an insurable industry so that the National Selective Service offices would not have an up-to-date

HOME FOR WOMEN IS SUBJECT SUNDAY

SPEAKER TELLS OF INTER-PROVINCIAL HOME AT COVERDALE

Rev. F. E. Barrett, D. D., who is Field Secretary for the Interprovincial Home for Women at Coverdale, N. B., was the preacher at St. Paul's Presbyterian Church on Sunday morning and at United Church Sunday evening Sept. 6th.

The Interprovincial Home is a reformatory institution owned and conducted by the Protestant churches of the Maritime (Anglican, Baptist, Presbyterian and United). It receives into its custody and care young women who have been found guilty of some criminal offence and incurred the penalty of the law. Magistrates may commit Protestant women to this Home instead of sending them to jail. The usual term is two years. During that time they are placed under Christian influence and given every possible opportunity to fit themselves to go out to be worthy citizens, capable of making an honest living for themselves. Arrangements make it possible for inmates to obtain a certificate in Household Service while detained in this Home.

SCRAP METAL MUST BE SAVED

NEEDED FOR WAR INDUSTRIES; TO BE GATHERED HERE BEFORE WINTER

Scrap metal is now needed by our war industries in unprecedented quantities. There are tons and tons of it rusting on our farms, in stores, around dwellings, in shops and factories and garages. This scrap must be quickly turned in or we shall endanger the flow of weapons and supplies to our armed forces. The movement of scrap to central collecting points must be accelerated during the relatively short time we still have before winter sets in.

The farmer will have two crops of harvest this year. The first of these is the regular one, while the other is for agriculturists an unusual one, scrap metal, old bits of iron and steel, broken tools and obsolete machinery.

The best of steel is made from a mixture of pig iron made from raw ore and scrap metal. We have adequate supplies of ore but there is a potential shortage of scrap. Unless half a million tons of this scrap is added to Canada's stock piles before winter sets in, some units of Canada's steel mills may have to be closed. We should not allow this to happen at all costs. Everyone must contribute his share, farmer, industrialist, garageman and householder, else the harvest we shall reap may not be to our liking.

The tremendous tonnage of scrap materials which have accumulated through the years, discarded and unwanted, is now a precious store which must be made available for our war industries. DON'T DEPEND ON THE OTHER FELLOW TO GET IT IF YOU know where some of it lies dormant right now. He does not. It is up to you, and don't wait until it is too late. Act now.

After September 15th, 1942, it will be illegal for any person to have more than 500 lbs of scrap in their possession or on their property without a proper permit from the Steel Controller. Get rid of your scrap before then by turning it over to your local salvage committee or selling it to a local junk dealer.

The Boy Scout Salvage Committee will have an iron drive very soon so if you cannot bring it in to our warehouse just gather it up and have it handy for our drive. For Local Salvage Headquarters call 212.

A BUSY WEEK IN POLICE COURT

In the Fisher Memorial School 484 pupils are enrolled, Grade 7, 8, 9, and 10 are heavy. Miss Phyllis Menzies, Fredericton replaces Miss Vesta Minto in the High School and Miss Doris Hunter takes Miss Edith Grant's place in Grade 5.

In Broadway 223 pupils are enrolled with more expected, William Miller principal, stated.
