Further, under the creep feeding system the pigs will gradually become so independent of the sow that when weaning does occur they will not suffer any serious setback.

school years may make the difference between a poor scholar and a good one — poor health or good health in later life. The contents of the school lunch box should be carefully planned to meet the standards of good nutrition, and be varied from day to day.
If facilities are available at school for the heating of food brought from home, or for the serving of one hot dish prepared at the school, the mother's work is simplified. Creamed eggs, meat, fish, vegetables, stew, or meat and vegetable broth or a cream soup can be carried from home to be heated at school and served as the main lunch dish; this together with whole wheat bread and butter, a generous serving of fruit, cookie for dessert and milk to drink, makes a lunch which is acceptable alike to its small consumer and to the exacting standards of the nutritionists.

When the whole lunch has to be supplied from home, a thermos bottle is an essential, as some hot food should be included each day. Sandwiches from the basis of this type of lunch and they should be made from either whole-wheat or Canada approved white bread and there should be two types — one made from eggs, meat, cheese or fish to supply the building or protein requirements of the child, and the other containing raw vegetables as lettuce, tomato, chopped celery or something to satisfy the sweet tooth. The rest of the lunch can be satisfactorily rounded out with a simple dessert — fresh fruit, peaches, grapes, oranges, apples or perhaps a cup-custard, blanc mange, or fruit jelly. Stewed fruit will carry well in small screw-top jars, and milk, cocoa or a cream soup in the thermos, with a cookie, bran or wheat germ muffin to top off with will complete the menu.

In districts where no facilities are yet available for the serving of a simple hot dish at school, Women's Institutes and Home and School Clubs have a ready-made project for fall work. It is surprising how little is needed in the way of equipment,

Premier Protests Gas Rationing

Premier J. B. McNair has made new representations to Hon. C. D. Howe, federal minister of munitions and supply, in further efforts to bring about a more satisfactory gasoline rationing situation insofar as New Brunswick is concerned.

It is understood the premier has urged the federal minister that, in view of pending changes in the gasoline regulations announced last week at Ottawa, the time is now opportune to make an adjustment in the value of gasoline ration coupons in New Brunswick and the other Maritime Provinces so as to bring their purchasing power in line with Ontario and Quebec.

It is further understood that the premier's representations suggested that immediate remedial action be taken to place car owners in this province on the same plane as those in other parts of Canada.

While no reply has been received to Mr. McNair's message, it is understood that the situation is being closely followed.

Early this summer, the premier took a strong stand against reduction of the value of the gas coupon, charging tactics employed in the central provinces were discriminating against the Maritimes. Later the coupon in the lower provinces was raised in value from the two-gallon level to three gallons of gasoline per unit.

The premier also answered certain criticisms made in the Ontario press which were unfavorable towards the people of the Maritime Provinces, pointing to the excellent wartime record of the Maritimes.

"None could be more patriotic in their endeavors at this time than the man or woman or child of the Maritimes," the premier reminded critics.

Canadian Forestry Association

"If the needs of the future as well as of the present are to be adequately safeguarded, the pulp and paper industry will require the backing of every citizen of Canada," stated R. L. Weldon, president of the Canadian Pulp and Paper Association, in an interview here today. "Pulp and paper is Canada's greatest industry. It is making a significant contribution to the war effort and will, we hope, play no less an important part in creating jobs when Canadian boys return from overseas," Mr. Weldon continued. "But the public can help us substantially. It can reduce forest fires which often so needlessly deplete our great natural resources to the detriment of every person in the Dominion."

In discussing the wartime role of the industry, Mr. Weldon mentioned how it is supplying pulps for the manufacture of explosives; containers for munitions and food, and wall-board for housing the armed forces and building war plants. "Its products go into every shell that is loaded into a gun, into land and naval mines, gaskets for the motors of mechanized equipment, into the manufacture of airplanes and into radio and radio-locator equipment. It machine shops blazed the trail to wider subcontracting."

"But," continued Mr. Weldon, "though the products of our forests are so vital in peace and war, roughly four hundred million cubic feet of timber is lost each year by fire and the greater part of this could with reasonable precautions be avoided. Each year the industry spends huge sums on the prevention, detection and fighting of forest fires but there is so much still to be done. The people of Canada can remedy the situation. By exercising ordinary care, they can not only save the forest for the immediate needs of the present

School Children To Gather Crops

New Brunswick school children are going to participate further in the war effort this fall, it was revealed here today. This will be brought about through an agricultural assistance program.

Pupils 11 years of age and over will be excused from attendance at school in New Brunswick for a period of six weeks if they are required to assist with harvesting. In making this announcement today, Hon. Dr. C. H. Blakeny, minister of education, pointed out that gathering in the crops is an essential part of the war effort.

The Department of Education desires to co-operate at this time in view of what Dr. Blakeny termed "the acute shortage of labor on farms." He said that under Section 6 of the School Attendance Act a school teacher officer or inspector may excuse students whose services are urgently needed in husbandry, etc.

"Any students, therefore, 11 years of age and up, who present a certificate from their parents stating that they are needed in connection with harvest work, will be released from the schools of the province for a period of not more than six weeks for such work," the minister continued.

The possibility of allowing school children to assist in gathering in the crops on New Brunswick farms has been under consideration for some time and Hon. A. C. Taylor, minister of agriculture, and Education Minister Blakeny conferred on the question several times.

While no line was drawn, it is presumed that the arrangement will apply for the most part to pupils residing in the rural areas of the province rather than to city school children. Many of the latter would have to be taught farm work where as those going to school in the country already are well acquainted with harvesting operations.

A similar scheme is to be carried out in Nova Scotia, provision having been made to permit students to be freed from school attendance during September and October in order to assist with the wartime harvest.
