SCHOOL OPENS

On Tuesday the younger generation made their way back to school. Although some few may have like Shakespeare's schoolboy "crept like a snail unwillingly to school" for the most part the boys and girls of Carleton county were eager to get back to their studies after the long vacation.

In the country sections some older pupils are to be allowed to stay home in order to help harvest the potato and other crops, the gathering of which is a serious problem to the farmers of the county these days when most of our young men are on active service. These boys and girls will be assisting in providing the food so essential for victory.

Our Carleton County teachers have just finished a Curriculum Conference in Woodstock. There they discussed the various problems relating to their work and are back at their desks with renewed vigor and enthusiasm. We would remind them that in dealing with children that the old axiom, "hope of reward is better than fear of punishment", still holds good; that children love to work if approached in the right way and that there is nothing they will not do for one whom they love and respect.

We would also advise the boys and girls to apply themselves to their studies. Methods of instruction may have been made more interesting but we still firmly believe that "There is no royal road to learning" and that good hard work is necessary to attain the goal. A mighty task is before them, that of reconstructing a war torn world, and they will need all the education they can get.

And to the parents we would suggest: co-operate with the teacher of your child. Think what a job she has managing forty when you have your hands full with one. Go to see her, not to complain, but to find out how parent and teacher working together can make Johnny the kind of boy you want him to be.

The true function of education is the building of character and the moulding of young lives into the best

type of Canadian citizenship. With teachers, parents and pupils working together, we should be able to build up the kind of nation that we and the rest of the world requires to-day.
