WOODSTOCK HAS MOST SATISFACTORY BLACKOUT LAST FRIDAY

Province Wide Blackout Goes Over Without A Hitch; Few Irregularities

ALL LIGHTS WERE OUT WITHIN THE SPACE OF THREE MINUTES

The first province wide blackout held last Friday was a complete success, at least as far as Woodstock was concerned, Aubrey Hetherington, chairman of the Woodstock Civilian Volunteer Corps said today. All key men arrived at their posts within nine minutes and all lights were out within three minutes.

The protective committee under George Y. Jones turned out in force. The Billeting committee with R. W. Maxwell in charge and the Transport group under K. L. Everett stood by for instructions.

The Medical Committee, directed by Mr. and Mrs. Fred Dunham had all their First Aid Stations manned with full crews.

A few irregularities were noticed. Some instances of lighting matches were reported by wardens both in dwellings and on the streets. Several moving also reported. These cases are being checked up. It was noted that telephone

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2nd 89th Battery Returns To Woodstock After Two Weeks At Camp Tracadie

INTENSIVE TRAINING WITH GUNS AND TRACTORS IS GIVEN

MEETING CALLED TO ORGANIZE W.V.C.

A meeting is called for Friday night July 31st in the Town Hall, when it is hoped that members of the Eastern Stars, the Catholic Women's League, the Rebekahs, The Carleton Soldiers' Memorial Chapter I. O. O. E., the Red Cross, The True Blues, The Pythian Sisters, The Women's Institute, the King's Daughters and any other organizations and all interested in forming a Women's Auxiliary Volunteer Corps in Woodstock will attend. The corps, if it is formed will have the support of and will work with the local Civilian Volunteer Corps. All women and girls who would like to learn how further to serve their country are urged to attend.

The 2nd 89th Battery which has been encamped at Tracadie with other similar New Brunswick units, for the past two weeks returned to Woodstock on Monday after undergoing the most intensive training nearest to wartime conditions yet experienced. Five officers and 54 other ranks were at the camp.

The boys worked hard and had little time off and both officers and men got a great deal out of the training. Major J. D. Winslow O. C. told the Sentinel today. Field artillery in the present war use the new 25 pounder guns but for the purposes of training 18 pounders were used at Camp Tracadie.

Training went on not only during daylight but also at night. One evening the batteries left with guns, and tractors driven by their own men qualified as drivers. They took up battery positions and laid out lines of fire after dark. The Carleton County boys took up positions allotted to them according to operational orders. After laying out their lines of communications, posting sentries and completing telephone communication lines the several batteries camped in the open. Just before daybreak, on receipt of new orders the men were awakened took on new targets and later returned to camp. On another occasion the batteries had manoeuvres, made out lines of fire and engaged targets with live ammunition.

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DISASTROUS FIRE AT JACKSONVILLE FRIDAY NIGHT

GIBSON HOME AND BARN AND HAMMOND PROPERTY BURNED

A disastrous fire in Jacksonville Friday night destroyed the property owned by Mrs. W. A. Gibson and her son, Howard, as well as the house and barn owned by Mrs. Guilford Hammond. The blaze, loss from which is placed in the vicinity of \$15,000, originated in the hay loft of a barn on the Gibson property and spread across the road to the Hammond buildings. Mrs. Hammond's mother, Mrs. Flora Carey, occupied the upper flat of the destroyed home and Mr. and Mrs. Hamilton lived in the lower flat. The Hamiltons were absent from their home when it was destroyed.

Howard Gibson, who operates a milk route, had just installed an up-to-date electric water system and milking machine in his barn. Some of the other machinery in the barn was saved and the cattle were rescued from the burning structure. A nearby piggery was destroyed as well as a number of pigs.

Some of the furniture in the Gibson home was carried to safety.

Woodstock Sends Aid

The Woodstock fire department was called and succeeded in saving houses owned by Mrs. H. W. Havens and S. H. Havens. The Gibson garage escaped the flames also.

A brook near the scene of the outbreak was dammed, which supplied water for the Woodstock pumper which continued to pour water on the burning debris until early Saturday morning.

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World News In Brief

Friday July 24th.

The British consolidate their positions in Egypt, with the enemy using more planes. The Russians in the lower Don are in last ditch defence of North Caucasus. The House of Commons passes conscription bill on the third reading.

Saturday July 25th.

Fighter-Bombers continue attacks on enemy bases in Egypt. German tanks are storming Rostov's outer defences. The industrial Ruhr and Rhineland are heavily bombed.

Monday, July 27th.

The Germans bridge the Lower Don at two points and capture Rostov. R. A. F. flattens Duisburg, German railway and shipping centre. New restrictions on instalment buying are ordered. A lull is reported in Egypt.

Tuesday July 28th.

Both Germans and British are building up forces in Egypt. Over 600 bombers blast the city of Hamburg. Russian defences in Don area appear tottering. Japanese raiders attacked Darwin in northern Australia yesterday.

Wednesday July 29.

Nazis force Don river on wide front. Rommel is said to be digging in for defence of an indefinite duration in Egypt. Germans are warned by B. B. C. that the Reich will be scourged from end to end.

Thursday July 30th.

Hamburg, Germany's greatest port got another pounding from R.A.F. last night. Germans report that they have taken a town a hundred miles east of Rostov. Allied patrols drive Japanese back in New Guinea.
