Forty-Five Years Ago. From the
Sentinel Files June 26th, 1897.

Queen Victoria's Diamond Jubilee
1837-1897.

We do not wish to intrude upon the Jubilee Celebration of our good queen but we would just note that this paper, now known as the Carleton Sentinel was established A. D. 1837 and that therefore was one of the first important events of Her Majesty's reign. And still we are humble and only charge \$1.50 a year in advance.

The crowd of people in town for the celebration was the largest ever seen in Woodstock. The Woodstock Cornet Band received their new uniforms just in time to don them for the procession.

The decorations were on a most lavish scale. The town had suddenly become a forest, fir trees, 12 feet apart lined both sides of Main Street from the Town Hall to the Meduxnekeag Bridge with arches spanning the sidewalks at intervals. Bunting, crowns and flags adorned the public building and many private residences were dazzlingly arrayed in holiday garb. Some making a notably attractive appearance were: H. Paxton Baird, W. P. 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N.B. CROP PROSPECTS
BRIGHT THIS YEAR

FARMERS ENJOY GOOD PLANTING SEASON; GOOD OUTLOOK
A. C. TAYLOR SAYS

Fredericton, N. B., June 16.—Crop prospects for 1942 appear bright this year. Seldom have New Brunswick farmers enjoyed a more favorable planting season, a survey by the provincial Department of Agriculture shows. Spring cropping conditions have enabled farmers to provide good seed beds and, aided by favorable weather the crops got away to a good start.

Hon. A. C. Taylor, minister of agriculture, speaking of the present year's outlook, declared: "Seldom have our crops got away to as good a start as this year. Farming operations on the average began from 10 days to two weeks earlier than usual. Cattle were turned to pasture a week or 10 days earlier, thus saving the farmers considerable feed."

Mr. Taylor's department has received encouraging word from many sections of the province. With out exception, reports from all parts of New Brunswick indicate good pasture and hay prospects. Due to the exceptionally good start, a promising hay crop seems assured. This is shown to be particularly true of hay on the better farmed fields. Not only is more clover in evidence, but new seeded hay land is of a better than average standard. A departmental statement said: "It is almost safe to say that hay quality is superior to that of last year."

Educational Campaign Results

A good dairy season also is in prospect. Reports show cattle were turned out to pasture in good condition and an abundance of early grass during the last 10 days of May and in early June gave assurance of a big flow of milk for this period. However, it was pointed out that frequent showers are urgently needed in many districts to maintain growth.

Early signs generally indicated the root acreage would be below normal, a condition brought about by a shortage of manpower on many farms in the province. The potato acreage, however, is generally assumed to be up in varying percentages.

A vigorous campaign by the department of Agriculture has stimulated interest in good seed and it is safe to assume that more discrimination as regards seed quality and suitable varieties was exercised this year than has been the custom. The educational program in support of good seed conducted by the department, consisted of extensive newspaper advertising and a series of seed fairs.

The survey deals extensively with the use of fertilizer, the department pointing out that New Brunswick farmers have been heavy buyers of fertilizer this year. This is taken as an indication of a ready willingness to co-operate in the war production program as well as more buying power and prospects of a living price for their products. A very considerable

able portion of the fertilizer increase went to pasture improvement. This is more particularly true in the better dairy districts.

Grain crops, too, received heavier applications and a greater acreage was fertilized. Reports also show that agriculture representatives estimate that from 20 to 25 per cent more limestone was used this spring.

The shortage of farm labor has created quite a problem, the crop prospects survey revealed. Tractors have been of great assistance in relieving the burden in the planting season but manpower is more essential in gathering in crops, the minister said today. He added that the labor problem was receiving thorough study by his department at the present time.
