### THE GENTLEMEN IN KHAKI

Army Week, when Canadians everywhere will do honor to their army, is to be observed next week, June 29th to July 5th.

The Navy and Airforce have had their full share of gallant exploits. The Army, so far has had to be content to do a drab job without glamour or spotlight. Their turn will come. Each arm of the service will have its share in the glory but decisive battles in this war as in all others must in the final analysis be fought on the land.

The town of Woodstock and also the County of Carleton, which latter holds the enviable record of highest per capita enlistments in the entire Dominion have made elaborate plans for Army Week. A parade is to be held July 1st, consisting of units not only of our own forces but also from those of our gallant ally the United States of America. Sports and other events are also planned. Four bands will be in the procession. An efficient committee of prominent citizens has almost completed arrangements. They have asked the Woodstock merchants to decorate their places of business and householders their homes.

Our obligation to our boys overseas and to those training in Canada is a compelling one. Let us get behind our committee and co-operate in every way in our power. Let us put such vim and enthusiasm into our Army Week celebration that our citizens will be inspired to greater effort in the mammoth struggle in which we are engaged, and our boys in Khaki, who are willing to risk all for us will know we are behind them every step of the way.

### A WELL FED ARMY

It is claimed that the Canadian Army is the best fed army in the world. So far as the troops actually in Canada are concerned, this is probably true. Canada is noted as a country whose citizens live on the fat of the land, but in few Canadian homes is the menu as lavish as in the army camps today.

While the food is abundant in quantity and excellent in quality, economy is practiced to an extent unknown in the last war. The spectacle of sides of bacon and carcasses of beef being allowed to spoil, of muddy paths paved with tins of

bully beef and barrock fires fed with biscuits is no longer seen as it was a quarter of a century ago. Surpluses are not allowed to accumulate, and supplies are issued to the cooks only from day to day.

The army refuses to allow good food to be spoiled by indifferent cooking. It is no longer a sufficient qualification for a cook that he wants a job where he will not have to carry a rifle on parade. Canadian army cooks today are given intensive training, and must pass a thorough examination before they go to work.

The kitchens are arranged so as to provide the maximum of convenience and labor saving devices eliminate much of the drudgery of preparing meals for large numbers of men. The meals are served at small tables in large, airy, scrupulously clean mess halls. The dishes are washed by orderlies, after which they are disinfected.

The food served to the men is the equal of that served in the officers' messes, although of course some of the frills are lacking. Last war veterans of Salisbury Plain and Shorncliffe may be interested to read a menu for one day, culled at random from a camp diet sheet. These sheets are checked by an officer at every meal to ensure that they are followed rigidly.

Breakfast: — Marmalade, rolled oats, fresh milk, baked smoked fillets, grilled bacon, baked beans, toast, tea and cocoa.

Dinner: — Roast pork, savoury dressing, brown gravy, mashed turnips, pickled beets, boiled potatoes, pumpkin pie, bread and butter, tea.

Supper: — Cream of tomato soup, fried halibut and cabbage, tomato ketchup, baked jam roll, bread and butter, cheese, tea.

## NATIONAL SELECTIVE SERVICE

### CONTROL OF EMPLOYMENT

★ NO EMPLOYER HEREAFTER SHALL HIRE ANY PERSON, MALE OR FEMALE, WITHOUT THE APPROVAL OF A SELECTIVE SERVICE OFFICER IN AN EMPLOYMENT OFFICE OF THE UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE COMMISSION ★

Whenever a vacancy occurs, or additional staff is required, or a lay-off of staff is anticipated, the employer shall notify the local Employment Office. He may engage only persons referred to him by, or approved by, the local Employment Office.

A local Selective Service Officer may revoke at any time, on not less than ten days notice, any approval granted by him.

Appeal from a Selective Service Officer's decision may be made in writing within ten days to the Divisional Registrar of the National War Services Board, and the decision of the Board shall be final.

### EXCEPTIONS

This order does not include employment: (1) In agriculture, fishing, hunting or trapping; (2) Subject to the Essential Work (Scientific and Technical Personnel) Regulations, 1942; (3) In domestic service in a private home; (4) Of students after school hours or during holidays (but does include employment during Summer Vacations); (5) In part-time work which is not the principal means of livelihood; (6) Casual or irregular employment for not more than three days in any calendar week for the same employer; (7) Under the Government of any Province.

This order does not affect Re-employment: (1) Within not more than 14 consecutive days after the last day a person worked for the same employer; (2) After sickness or disability which caused the suspension of the employment; (3) On resumption of work after a stoppage caused by an industrial dispute; (4) In accordance with a collective labour agreement which provides for preference according to length of service or seniority; (5) On compulsory re-instatement after Military Service.

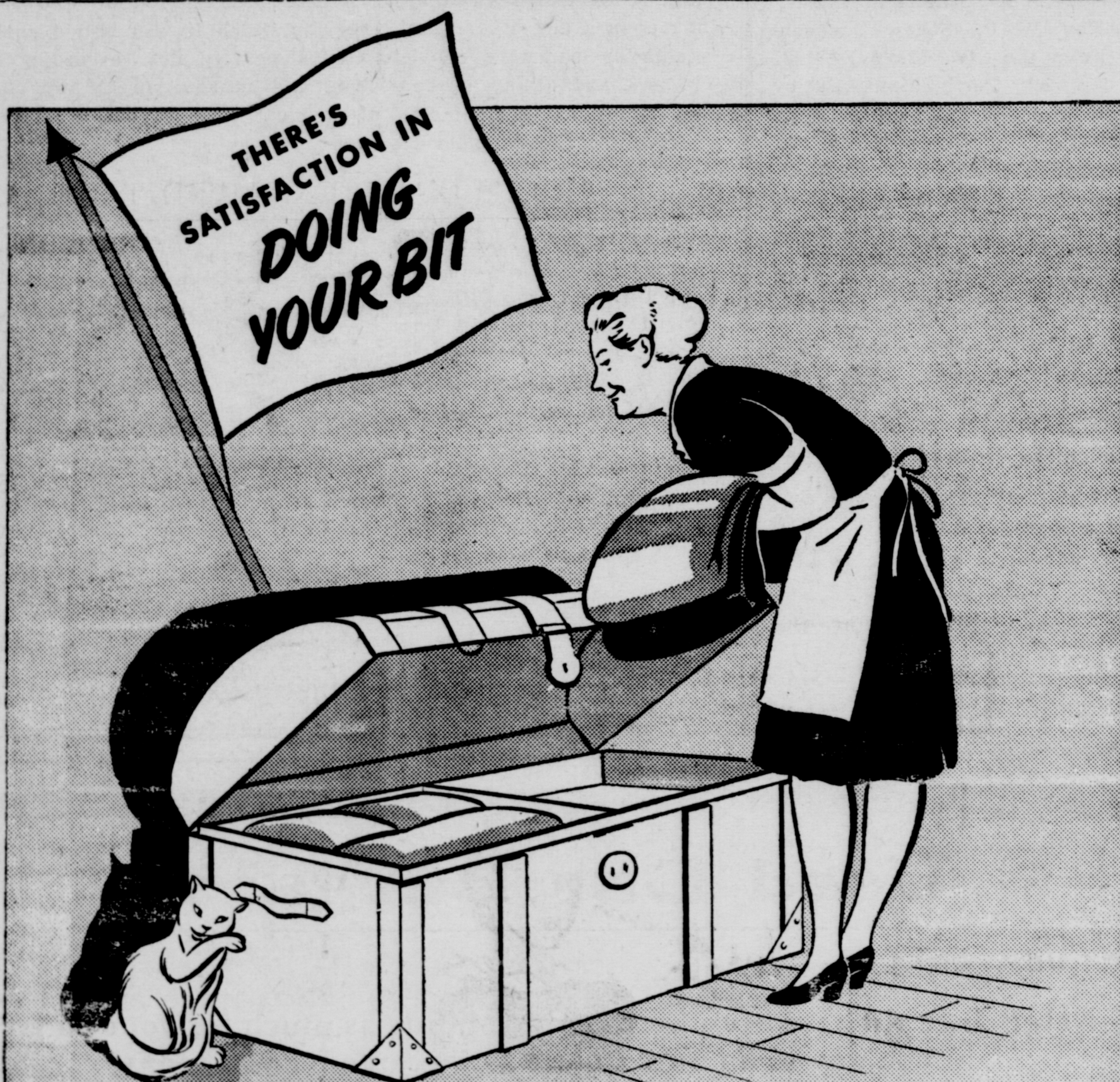
Until further notice from the Director of National Selective Service or a local National Selective Service Officer, any employer may temporarily engage any employee, if he submits within three days to a local office an application in duplicate for the approval of such engagement. Such application shall state the insurance book number, or the insurance registration number, (U.I.C. Form 413), name, address, age, sex, occupation of such employee, the name of his or her most recent employer, and the date he or she left employment with such employer.

Penalties for infringements of this order provide for a fine up to \$500.00, or imprisonment up to 12 months, or both fine and imprisonment.

★ This order supersedes previous National Selective Service Orders respecting restricted and unrestricted occupations. ★
