New Brigade To Include 2nd Battalion C. Y. Regt. And 2nd 89th Battery

MEN ARE NEEDED FOR ADVANCED TRAINING IN MODERN WEAPONS; LEARN TO DEFEND YOUR HOME!

Formation of the Brigade offers an active part in the war to men over the age of thirty-five (and those under that age who are not able to get in the Active Forces). Weekend manoeuvres will add to the interest of the training period.

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HUB LANDLORD SUED BY WARTIME PRICES & TRADE BD.

BOARD IS IN EARNEST IN
CARRYING OUT ITS
REGULATIONS

That the Wartime Price and Trade Board is in earnest in carrying out its regulations is evidenced by the following cases which were heard in the Moncton Police Court last Friday:

Alphonse Belliveau, a Moncton landlord, was ordered by Magistrate W. F. Lane in the city police court here this morning to restore the sum of \$125 to two of his tenants whom he had illegally charged higher rents since Oct. 1 last, under the rental regulations of the Wartime Prices and Trade Board. The accused pleaded guilty and was also fined \$19 and costs in each case.

These two cases involved the first rental convictions, in the province under the new regulations. In passing sentence Magistrate Lane stated that as this was the first rental prosecution in Moncton, and as he felt Belliveau had obviously misunderstood the rental regulations, he would impose a fine of only \$10 and costs in each case.

The first case involved a flat rented by Stokes Howland 110 High Street on Oct. 1 at a rental of \$30. per month. The basic rent for this flat was \$20. The court found that the tenant had been illegally charged \$50.00 in excess of that permitted by the law.

In the second case the court ordered Belliveau to restore the sum of \$75 to Mrs. Harold Woodman, to whom he had rented a flat at 112 High Street on Oct. 1 at a rental of \$35 a month. The basic period for rentals in the Moncton area is taken as Jan. 2, 1941, and the amount of rent being paid on that date becomes the maximum rent that may be charged by a landlord to any tenant unless the landlord successfully applies to a rentals committee for permission to increase the amount of such rent because of the existence of special circumstances that may apply to exceptional cases. If there is no lease on Jan. 2, 1941, covering the particular house.

The heavens still have their home under the ice of the Meduxnakeag River within three minutes walk of Main Street. The animals are quite tame and have been seen by residents of Water Street during the cold weather sunning themselves on the banks of the creek.

So far no wild geese have been reported.

A WRONG IMPRESSION

The General Impression of citizens, that if their cars have not been licensed by the First of April they cannot procure ration cards is a wrong one, Charles Lenehan, of the Local Motor Vehicle Office disclosed to-day. The ration cards can be procured at any time after April 1st, if the person first buys his driving license and plates. A person must obtain his plates, etc., before the ration book can be obtained. There is no specified time and date on which to buy the necessary license.

This year, fire trucks and ambulances have to procure licenses. There is no license fee connected with the transaction, but under the new law now enforced they must be licensed before they are eligible for ration cards.

World News in Brief

Friday March 20—Nazis are said to be destroying supplies in Kharkov, Russia, prior to evacuating the city. The arrival of an American Air Force in India is announced—Guided by Nazi "missionaries", a strong Jap force is advancing towards Port Moresby Australia.

Saturday March 21st—Russians increase pressure on trapped Germans. Canadian Bakery deliveries are limited and products curtailed. General Douglas MacArthur arrived in Australia and is enthusiastically greeted.

Monday March 23rd—Allied forces smashed 23 Jap planes. Russians inflict heavy losses on the Nazis. A big air battle is fought in Burma. Sir Stafford Cripps arrives in India.

Tuesday March 24th—United States submarines destroy Japanese ships in their own waters. British submarines sink 11 Axis ships near Italy. Munitions Minister Howe appeals to motorists to conserve gas and rubber.

Wednesday March 25th—Ottawa restricts civilian jobs; Compulsory Military Service now up to 30 years of age with lottery draft; Farm workers must remain on farms, except for seasonal work in primary industries.

Thursday March 26th—Japs, reaching for India, occupy the Andamans. British light squadron defeated overwhelming Italian fleet in Mediterranean. Southeastern English coast is raided again.
