CITIZENS PROTEST AT RESERVE ARMY BEING MOVED FROM ISLAND PARK

Indignation Meeting In Town Hall

TOWN COUNCIL AND BOARD OF TRADE THINK DISCRIMINATION IS BEING SHOWN

Vigorous protests regarding the cancellation of the lease for Island Park Camp by military authorities were heard on all sides at the joint meeting of the Woodstock Town Council and the Board of Trade held in the council chamber Tuesday night.

Mayor E. H. Jones read the telegram in question. The message stated that the lease of the government for Island Park terminated in November.

J. D. Winslow asked the amount of the rentals received during the period when the army were in possession. It was found that the money paid hardly made up for the amount spent, considering insurance, depreciation of buildings, cost of connecting and pumping the water, all of which expense had been borne by the town.

Mayor Jones told of talking to Brigadier Anglin who said that although the island was all through as far as the army is concerned Woodstock was the logical location for Trades Schools should they be established in New Brunswick.

It is understood Miss Trafton will do no bedside nursing in the Town of Woodstock.

Tea and Coffee Coupon Rationing Became Effective On Tuesday of This Week

THE QUOTA FOR EACH CONSUMER HAS BEEN SET AT ONE OUNCE OF TEA OR FOUR OUNCES OF COFFEE, PER WEEK BUT NOT BOTH

With coupon rationing of tea and coffee becoming effective Aug. 3rd, the Wartime Prices and Trade Board office here has issued special bulletins outlining the regulations for the guidance of wholesale and retail distributors.

The quota for each consumer has been set at one ounce of tea or four ounces of coffee per week, but not both, the Board announced.

Coupons A, B, C, D and E on top of the temporary war ration card issued on July 1, are now valid for the purchase of tea and coffee. Each of these coupons will entitle the purchaser to one ounce of tea or four ounces of coffee which is a supply for one week. Consumers may buy up to five week's supply at one time on surrender of the appropriate number of coupons.

Children under 12 years of age are not eligible to receive any allowance of tea or coffee.

The Wartime Prices and Trade Board explained recently how the rationing of tea and coffee works. In the sale of tea bags, packages of tea containing fractions of an ounce and coffee concentrates and substitutes containing coffee.

The beverages are being rationed at the rate of one ounce of tea and (Continued on Page 5.)

Child Loses Life In Tragedy

YOUNG SON OF OVERSEAS SOLDIER PERISHES IN FLAMES

A shocking tragedy occurred in Grafton on Tuesday afternoon when Billie Fortune 2 1/2 year old son of Pt. John William Fortune of the Carleton York Regt., Overseas and Mrs. Fortune, formerly Miss Ruby McLaughlin, perished in the flames which consumed the dwelling of Harry McLaughlin at five o'clock Tuesday afternoon.

Reports are conflicting regarding the fatality. Some people thought that with a McLaughlin child, he was sleeping upstairs. Others believe he was once out of the burning building and bewildered, ran in again.

Frank Colwell, town foreman, who was passing the house at the time of the fire, rushed to the scene. He was badly burned about the head and arms in a vain attempt to rescue the child.

The Woodstock fire department and members of the C. V. C. went quickly to the spot but although several attempts were made to rescue the child they were all to no avail.

It was thought the fire was started by the older child playing with matches who managed to escape. Mrs. McLaughlin was also badly burned. There was no insurance.

Mr. and Mrs. McLaughlin whose dwelling was completely destroyed have eight living children. The family has been unfortunate. One boy was drowned a few years ago and a girl died of paralysis in the last epidemic. Mr. McLaughlin is a steady worker and a good citizen and has the sympathy of the community in his misfortune.

Harry Purinton of Richmond suffered severe injuries and is in a serious condition in the Fisher Memorial Hospital to-day as a result of an accident on Saturday when he fell from a load of hay. He was taken at once to the hospital where he was found to be suffering from a broken arm, injuries to his back and shock. His condition shows little improvement.

World News In Brief

Friday July 31st.

A Russian counter blow is expected. The British government gives a hint that a second front is in the offing. R. A. F. carries out major dry sweep on the French coast. More Canadians arrive in England. Germans massacre all in 16 villages of Yugoslavia. Heavy attack of Japanese on Port Darwin is broken up.

Saturday August 1st.

The R. C. A. F. helps in hammering Dueseldorf. The Nazis break through caucasian defences as the drive for oil takes on new peril. American tank crews in Egypt join 8th Army. Cairo is bombed. The Japanese land northeast of Australia.

Monday August 3rd.

Russians smash Don River elbow attacks and rush air support to western Caucasus. Dueseldorf is the target of the most destructive raid in history of air war. Canada places tea and coffee on coupon ration-

ing list to-day. British and American bombers are busy in Cairo.

Tuesday August 4th.

Nazis threat is greatest in Western Caucasus. German fliers taunt Russians with 'and a second front?' leaflets. The R. A. F. is now using big Halifax bombers in Egypt. Australians watches extension of Japan bases to the North.

Wednesday Aug. 5th.

The whole allied cause is imperilled by additional Russian losses—Nazis are dangerously close to the Northern Caucasus oil fields. Little activity is reported on the Egyptian front. Japanese and Allies grapple in the jungles of New Guinea, where the Japs show great cunning.

Thursday Aug. 6th.

Germans start second Stalingrad drive. Cripps says Britain intends to preserve order in India until the war is ended. Britain and the United States are seeking swift means of helping the Russians.
