CROP REPORT

and good yields are anticipated. Root crops are promising. Tobacco plants are making good progress. The outlook for apples continues good. Generally speaking, crops have made rapid progress. Moisture conditions are satisfactory, but rain would be beneficial in some districts.

LOWER ST. LAWRENCE AND LAKE ST. JOHN DISTRICT—Grains have made good progress and are well headed. Harvesting of hay has proceeded normally under favorable conditions. Yields are heavy and the quality is good. Pastures are in very good condition. Corn is making steady progress. Roots are developing satisfactorily. The outlook for small fruits continues promising. In general, crops have made good progress and prospects are favorable. Moisture conditions are satisfactory, but rain is needed in some districts.

PROVINCE OF ONTARIO

Harvesting of a good crop of fall wheat is well advanced and cutting of spring grains has commenced, with satisfactory yields generally indicated. Recent heavy thunderstorms caused further lodging in central and western sections. A better-than-average crop of canning peas has been harvested. Sugar beets and other root crops, corn and tomatoes are progressing favorably. Below-average yields are indicated for apples, pears and plums, but raspberries are plentiful and other small fruits are promising. Growth of tobacco plants remains slightly below normal and stands continue uneven due to late replantings. Pastures are in excellent condition, except in eastern sections where rain is needed.

MARITIME PROVINCES

Grains have shown rapid growth and are heading well. Unsettled weather has hampered haying operations in some districts, but the harvest is well advanced and a heavy crop of good quality is being stored. Pastures have benefited from recent rains and are in very good condition. Potatoes are making good progress and damage from disease and parasites is reported unusually small. Other root crops are promising. Apples are sizing well, but the drop has been fairly heavy. Well sprayed orchards are practically free from scab. Prospects for the remaining berry crop are promising
