DISCRIMINATION

It was revealed by a telegram, read by the mayor of Woodstock at a combined meeting of the Town Council and the Board of Trade that the Army had cancelled the lease for Island Park and, as far as can be learned, training there is finished at least for the present.

Naturally we are disappointed. After spending large sums of money piping the water to the Island, repairing the approach and making changes running into thousands of dollars we cannot help but feel that we have been given a raw deal. Sometimes we are inclined to think that those who do the most hollering for troops get the most troops, not necessarily those who have the best locations, who have sent the most men overseas, or given the greatest assistance in other patriotic efforts.

Woodstock has always supported a regiment and a battery, before the last war, during the last war and since the last war, when much of the rest of the country was asleep we had the nucleus of a regiment here ready to go overseas, part of the First Canadian Division. The first Canadian troops to set foot on English soil came from this county. High military officials in past visits to Island Park have praised it as a training centre. The Carleton and York Regiment and the North Shore Regiment received their early training here. We would like to know how Island Park has changed since those days.

In the past when Woodstock's claims as a centre for troops have been urged we have sometimes been given convincing reasons, why what we have asked would not be in the best interests of the war effort. That was enough for us and our claims were not pressed.

We learn, however that some communities in the province are not content with such an answer. When they cannot get satisfaction from the military authorities they go higher up, embarrassing the military, bothering the government, but sometimes gaining their end.

It is not suggested that Woodstock, or Carleton County do likewise but we do say that Woodstock is equipped to handle economically many more troops than are stationed here. It is conveniently located for movement of troops both by train and by road. We have no idea of bothering the military authorities in these critical days, but we must watch closely to see that our own legitimate claims are not lost sight of in favor of others who bring more pressure to bear.

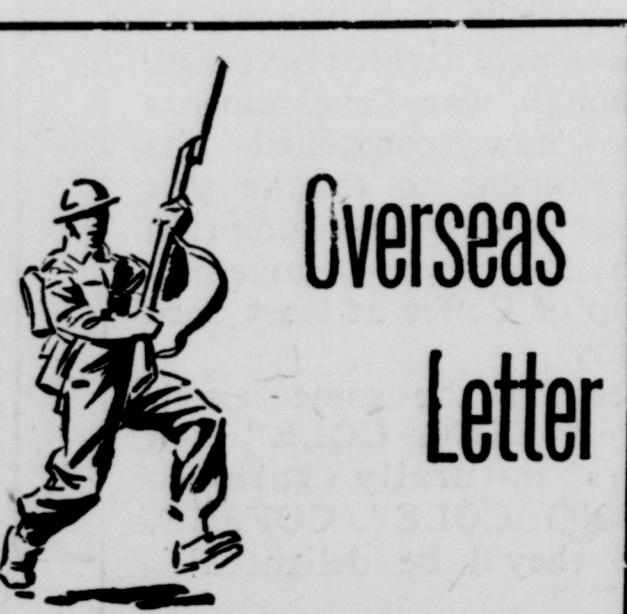

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Overseas Letter

The following letter received by Ray Power from his son PO Raymond Fewer, Somewhere in the Middle East will be of interest to many of our readers.

Somewhere near Africa, April 24th, 1942.

Dear Folks:

I'm on another boat since I wrote you last. The whole journey has been very pleasant so far but very hot. I've had time to do a great deal of thinking lately as I've been on the ocean for many weeks and I've finally decided what I'm going to do after the war. I've decided to go to college and get an Electrical Engineer's degree and then, if my money holds out, to go to the States and specialize for a year or so on Radio or Television.

I don't know where we are going yet but it's some place in the Middle East. You'll probably get a cable from me before you get this letter. You should have my address by now. I sent it three or four times.

We're going to land tomorrow so I'll finish my letter then. It's getting pretty late now and I want to go up on deck to get cooled off before turning in. Gosh, it's hot here since supper. I've wet two towels in wiping sweat off of me. Please excuse writing. I'm writing this on my bunk. You ought to see the swell revolvers they gave us when we left England. I'll have a picture taken with all my gear on as soon as I can and send it to you. Good Night.

April 25th, Well, we landed at a few days ago, and are now waiting to complete what we hope will be the last part of our journey by aeroplane. I really should cable you but I think I will wait till the whole trip is completed. I am sending this letter by the regular channels but I am also going to send you an air mail letter to-day which will reach you before this does.

The life here is swell. There are about 12 of us in a little hotel called Dunna House. Most of the boys are fellows I've been with since Trenton. There are three of us to a room and each room has its own black boy who looks after you and calls you "Massa". You sure see a lot of queer things here. I wish I had a camera. They're hard to describe. I bought a couple of note books yesterday and I'm going to write down everything interesting

This country down here is known as "white man's grave", but it's not so bad. We have to be careful of yellow fever, malaria and dysentery. We've all been inoculated for yellow fever. We also take five grains of quinine daily to prevent malaria. Thank heavens we won't be here long.
