CITIZENS URGED TO "DIG DEEP" SO RED CROSS OBJECTIVE MAY BE OBTAINED

Confidence Salvage Drive Is Huge Success In Woodstock And Vicinity Expressed As To Outcome

SEVERAL PARISHES STILL UNREPORTED; OVER HALF RAISED

Reports received Tuesday night by F. O. Creighton, Carleton County Chairman for the Red Cross Drive showed that \$4250 had already been received with several parishes still unreported. Confidence was expressed in the successful outcome of the drive by the chairman although he said citizens will have to dig deep in the next few days in order to reach the required objective of \$5500. It is planned to have a full report, published in the newspapers at the conclusion of the drive when the results from every canvasser will be printed as well as the expenses of the campaign.

Alfred Page, Woodstock Chairman said that the canvassers were working hard and expected to get around the town this week. On Tuesday night over \$1000 had already been received by Capt. C. M. V. Spence, town treasurer with about half the canvassers still unreported. The allocation for the town is \$2850 so canvassers during the next few days will exert every effort to push Woodstock over the top in the approved Carleton County way prior to the closing date of the campaign on Saturday May 23rd.

As we go to press Mr. Page announces that \$1391. has been received to date. He urges canvassers and public alike to do their utmost to secure the required amount.

World News In Brief

Friday May 15th-The Russians are advancing upon Kharkov. The Kerch peninsula; retreat continues under pressure, but the greatest Red Army offensive of the war threatens the pivot of the whole German Caucasus movement. General Gasoline shortage is serious.

Saturday May 16th-Russians are smashing a bloody path through the approaches to Kharkov. Remnants of British Army escape trap in Burma. Gasoline Coupons cut to 2 gallons in the Maritimes.

Monday May 18th: 12,000 Germans reported killed in Kharkov sector, 300 populated places recaptured by Russians in advance from 12 to 37 miles up to Saturday. Hon. J. B. McNair goes to Ottawa to protest against discrimination against Mar-

times in gasoline ration.

Tuesday, May 19th: - Russians press on Kharkov in 100 mile arc. Wednesday May 20th:-Russians are rolling ahead on Kharkov front with vital communications as their main objective. Counter offensive by Germans has started 50 miles South east. Chinese say aid is needed urgently as Japanese develop new offensive. No means of moving gasoline into Maritimes possible says Munitions minister C. D. Howe.

Thursday 21st - Russians are still advancing in the Ukraine. No oil heating anywhere in Canada by next winter says Howe. Every available tanker and tank car is now carrying oil to the Maritimes. Loss of tankers to Maritimes said "Appalling".
