VICTORY LOAN QUOTA FOR CARLETON COUNTY IS SET AT \$460,000

Town Is Asked To Subscribe

TOWN FATHERS VOTE ANOTHER \$50 FOR CIGARETTES TO GO OVERSEAS

J. F. VanBuskirk waited on the Town Council at their regular meeting in the town hall Tuesday evening with a view to obtaining an investment from them in the forthcoming Victory Loan. The quota for the county Mr. VanBuskirk said was \$460,000, \$10,000 in advance of the allocation for the 2nd Victory Loan. He urged the town to buy bonds, but if they were forced to sell them immediately, he said, he would rather they did not buy as it was only additional expense for the government. It was decided by the council to postpone the decision on the matter until the next meeting.

An additional fifty dollars was voted for cigarettes for local soldiers overseas. Mr. Neal in making the motion said it was the fourth Christmas that many Carleton County boys would spend away from home and he thought they should be remembered. \$10 was received from F. G. Spencer and \$2 each from Mr. Neal and R. W. Maxwell for the fund. It was pointed out that contributions would gladly be received from citizens and that names and addresses of those serving overseas were requested, from their relatives.

The mayor read a letter from Brigadier G. G. Anglin stating that a cash settlement was desired by the military regarding repairs to Island Park property. It was necessary to dismantle the property the letter stated as the equipment was needed elsewhere. On motion of Coun. McBride, seconded by Coun. Neal it was decided that a valuator be appointed to estimate the damage done to Property at Island Park during the occupation of the department of National Defence.

BUY VICTORY BONDS

Red Cross Has Busy Summer As Reports Are Received Of the Various Activities

OVER \$1290 IS REALIZED FROM DANCES, DRAWING AND CANTEN BLOOD DONORS' CLINICS ARE OPERATING SATISFACTORILY

Mrs. A. E. Raymond, convener of the Ways and Means committee of the Red Cross Society reported a busy July, August and September at the regular meeting of the Red Cross held in the Court House on Thursday afternoon.

Mrs. Raymond reported \$1290 cleared. The amount was realized from a drawing on a permanent won by Miss Laura Shaw and donated by Mrs. Croft of the Evangeline Beauty Shop, and dances, but principally from a hot dog canteen and cold drink stands held on Main Street during the summer. The canteen is still being operated and will continue until the weather is too cold, Mrs. Raymond said.

Mrs. Frank Hanson reported from the blood donors' clinic held in September when 41 donors had contributed 29 pints of blood. Four had received buttons for giving three donations. Perry Potter, Walter VanWart, Howard Leech and Willis Shaw. She reported the usual dressings made by the surgical committee during the month.

Mrs. Alfred Page reported 361 articles made in the branch during the month and 489 sent to Saint John. She said there was need in the Red Cross room for a cupboard with doors to hold refugee garments and asked if anyone would lend one.

Mrs. R. W. Maxwell reported that visits had been made to the hospital at Island Park while the troops were there. Since their departure the equipment was stored, she said.

Mrs. Lynott treasurer reported a satisfactory balance on hand and Mrs. B. H. Smith of the purchasing committee report \$140 worth of goods purchased.

ROTARIANS HEAR TIMELY ADDRESS

CHAIRMAN OF VICTORY LOAN DRIVE URGES ALL TO SUBSCRIBE

E. W. Mair, chairman of the third Victory Loan drive was the speaker at the Rotary Club luncheon Monday. Mr. Mair pointed out that in 1939 the outlay for the war needs in the Dominion was 34 millions as compared with 3,330 millions estimated expenditure for 1943, which represents an amount a hundred times greater.

In March of this year the Second Victory Loan was offered for 600 million dollars and almost a billion was raised. On October 19th just six months later, the speaker went on we are being asked to lend 750 millions or 25 per cent more. We have had two loans within nine months of one another. In the two loans we raised approximately one million dollars in Carleton County. We are asked this time for a minimum of \$460,000 in this county, and it seems at first a difficult task.

Victory Loan workers will find support in the fact that figures show more money in the banks than at the same time last year. Another encouraging feature, Mr. Mair stated is that prices of farm produce are better. There is more money in the (Continued on Page Eight.)

Average Yield Is Expected

DEMAND SO FAR HAS BEEN SATISFACTORY, DEALERS STATE

Contrary to prophecies of a few weeks ago, the potato crop in Carleton County this year is a good one, both as regards quantity and quality. Fears that the crop would be curtailed to below normal by disease were found to be unfounded once digging was started. While in a few instances low yields have been reported, the fields are averaging 80 to 100 barrels to the acre and some are running as high as 125 barrels.

Demand so far has been satisfactory and it is expected that the season will be a good one. To date most of the shipments have been to Quebec but a brisk demand from Ontario is expected to start before long. In addition with the dehydrated plant about to begin operations. (Continued on Page 5.)
