PLANS ARE MADE TO INSULATE WATER MAIN OVER MEDUXNAKEAG STREAM

Cost To Be Local Red Cross Canvassers Have Begun Campaign For \$8500 In Vicinity Of \$610

WORK WILL BEGIN AT ONCE
WHILE ICE IS STILL
SOLID

It was decided to insulate the water main under the Meduxnaqueag bridge which supplies water to the south end of town, insulation to cost approximately \$610, at the regular meeting of the town council held in the council chamber Tuesday evening. The town manager read a letter from the Canadian John Manville company who suggested hair felt with waterproof covering as a suitable material. On motion of Coun. Maxwell seconded by Coun. McBride plans were made to get the material and go ahead with the insulation at once, while the ice is still solid.

Mayor Neal read two letters, one from Mr. Craig of Debec and the other from H. B. Scott of Meductic offering suggestions for names of a ship of H. M. C. Navy to commemorate Woodstock. Since there was already a ship named for Woodstock, Ont., in the opinion of the council Meduxnaqueag was the best choice with Woolastock (Indian name for the Saint John River), as a second choice.

The town manager reported that \$3,813.15 had been collected in tax arrears in February as compared with \$1,945.53 in 1942, with \$32,927.00 outstanding at the end of the month compared with \$40,825.43 outstanding for the corresponding period last year.

He reported that 13 fire alarms had been answered. Ten were for chimney fires with damage at \$58.40; two were for hot pipes and one small fire at the pumping station.

The Red Raiders of W. H. S. took the U. N. B. Junior quintette into camp 54-30 at the Armoury Saturday evening in one of the fastest and most thrilling games of the season. This game marked the last appearance of the 1943 squad in local basketball, and was a tune-up for the N. B. interscholastic tournament to be held at Fredericton this weekend.

This was the second defeat of the season that U. N. B. Junior Varsity has suffered at the hands of the Red Raiders W. H. S. had previously won at Fredericton 31-21.

PROVINCE'S 4th WAR SESSION OPENED THIS WEEK

LACK OF POMP AND CEREMONIAL IS NOTED

New Brunswick's fourth legislative session of the war opened Tuesday with the usual lack of pomp and ceremonial befitting a wartime parliament.

There was a guard of honor inspected by the Lt. Governor. An escort of military officers accompanied His Honor into the Legislative Chamber. Specially invited guests were seated on the floors of the chamber and the galleries were packed.

The proceedings of the opening day were carried out as the fourth session of the 39th Legislative Assembly was launched. Following the Speech from the Throne by Lt. Governor Clarke, R. J. Gill, M.L.A., Northumberland moved the address in reply. E. S. Moores, Campbellton was the seconder.

Premier J. B. McNair, K. C., will be supported by 24 members which with himself makes 25. Against this the Opposition has 17 of its nineteen members still available for duty. The death of A. J. McEvoy, Mayor of Devon, and E. W. Melville, Peel, Carleton County reduces the Opposition by two.
