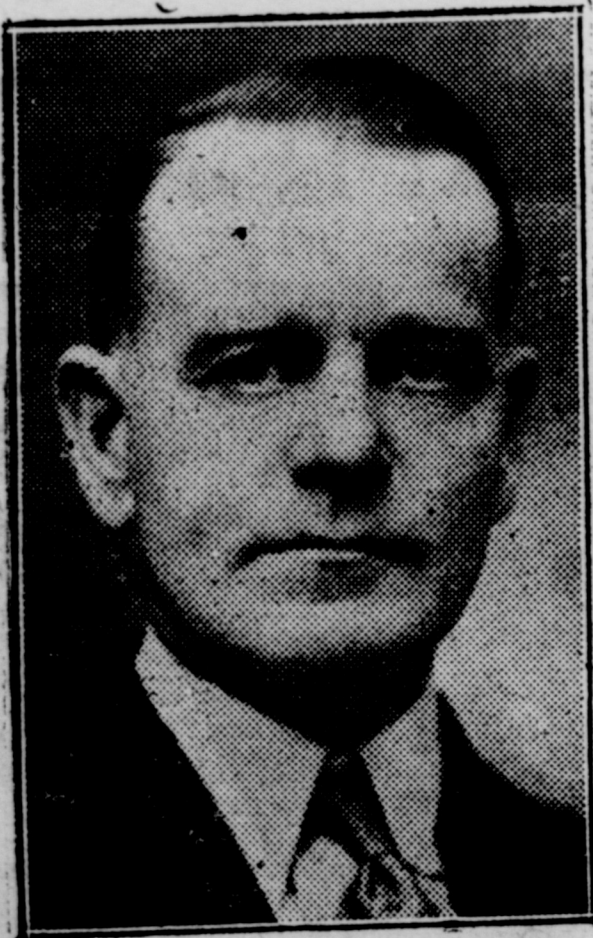

20-YEAR OLD BRITISH V.C. WHO DIED TO SAVE AIR CREW

Pilot Officer Leslie Thomas Manser, who was awarded the 50th V. C. of this war, posthumously. He was the Captain-pilot of an R.A.F. "Manchester" bomber taking part in the 1,000-bomber raid on Cologne. His bomber was hit by anti-aircraft fire while approaching the target he nevertheless held on his course, enabling the crew to bomb heavily and accurately. Hit again and again on the home journey, he carried on until his port engine on fire the plane was almost impossible to handle. Then refusing his own parachute, he gave orders to the crew to abandon the aircraft, keeping it steady in order that they might do so safely, and then crashing. The crew are now ascertained to be prisoners of war.

at a distance of about twenty inches from the outside rim of the hover. Inside this circle should be placed fountains filled with water from which the chick has been removed, hoppers filled with chick starter mash on which has been lightly sprinkled a little chick grit.

When the chicks have been received the house is ready they should be taken immediately from their boxes and put in the brooder house spread in a circle on the floor outside the canopy and they are well started.

If for the first few days the chicks to not appear readily to find the hoppers these may be placed on newspapers placed on top of the litter round the hover and a little feed scattered on the papers round the feeders until the chicks learn the source of supply. Remove the top sheet of paper each day or often-er.

When the chicks have learned to go to the hoppers the papers should be removed and frames 2 or 3 inches high and about 4 feet long and covered with wire mesh should be placed on the litter and the hoppers and water fountains placed on these which raises them sufficiently high to prevent the litter from being scratched into them.

Hoppers of chick size grit oyster shell and charcoal should be hung at a convenient height on the walls or placed on the wire frames. The circle enclosed by the chick guard should be enlarged each day until it can be removed as soon as the chicks become fully familiar with the source of heat. The enclosed circle should be large enough so that the chicks are not kept too close to the source of heat.

Feed chick starter for six weeks when a gradual change is made to grower and grain feed.

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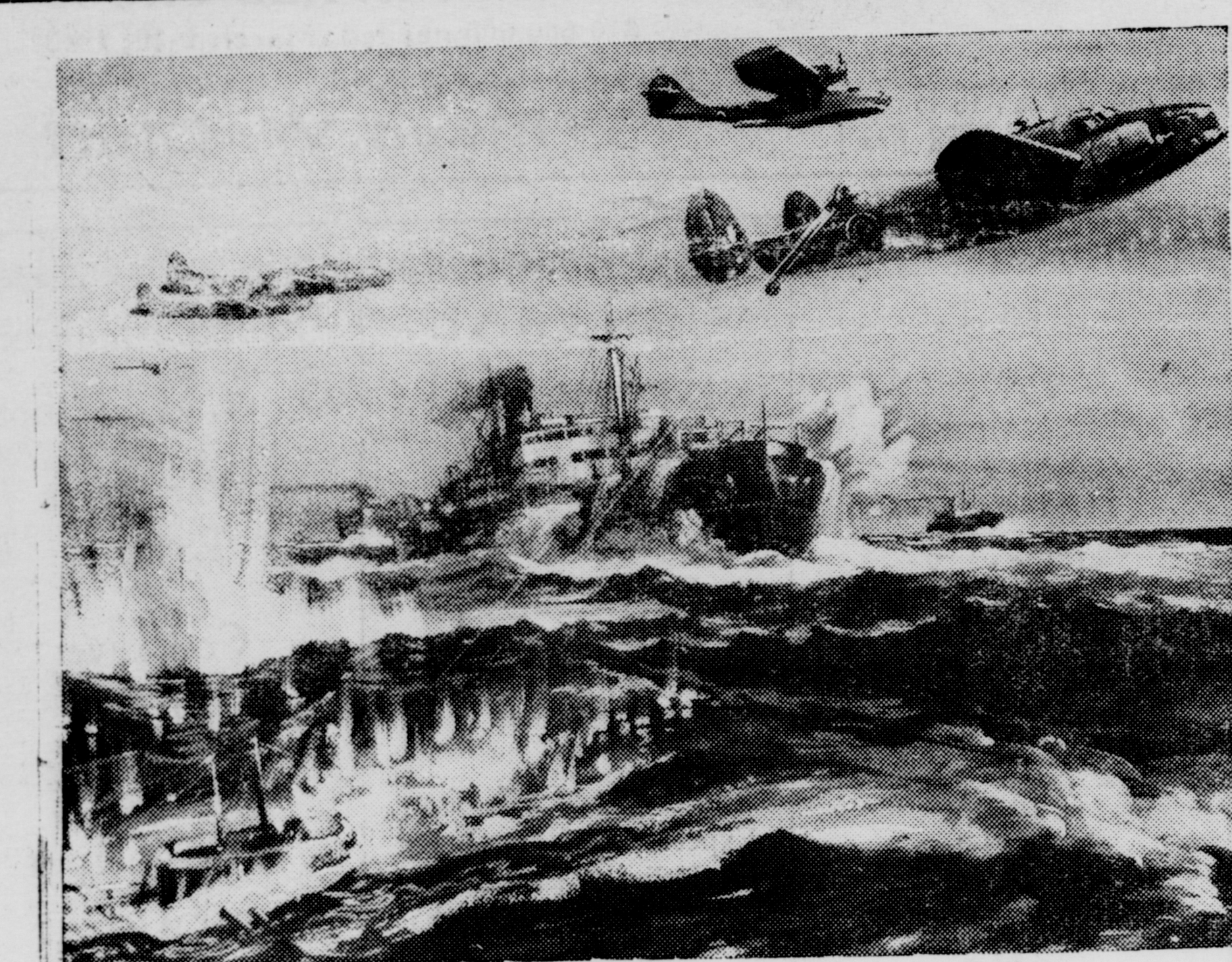

R.A.F. NAVY AND U. S. NAVY PLAN CO-OPERATE TO BRING BIG NORTH ATLANTIC CONVOYS TO SAFETY

A formidable air "umbrella" is now given to big convoys using the North Atlantic route to Britain. Patrol planes based on Britain, Iceland and America keep vigilant watch for U-boats which are ruthlessly attacked when sighted. The masterly co-operation of the British Navy, the R. A. F. and U. S. Navy planes brought a very large convoy to Britain in safety although it was shadowed for 4 days by a pack of U-boats. U. S. Catalinas from Iceland, British Coastal Command Flying Fortresses, Liberators, Hudsons, Catalinas, Norwegian Squadron of Coastal Command gave the U-boats no rest and more than one tell-tale patch of oil on the surface of water resulted. A recent announcement by Mr. A. V. Alexander, British First Lord of the Admiralty, stated that over 530 Axis submarines had been destroyed or damaged since the war began.
