PLANS UNDER WAY FOR RED CROSS CAMPAIGN IN CARLETON COUNTY

COUNTY QUOTA NOT ANNOUNCED AT PRESENT

F. O. CREIGHTON, CHAIRMAN ASKS ALL TO LEND THEIR SUPPORT

The 1943 Red Cross Campaign, with a national objective of \$10,000,000 opens on March First. The Carleton County quota has not yet been set by the provincial executive but it is not likely to be less than last year's objective of \$8500.

F. O. Creighton, chairman for the county and W. J. Dibblee, secretary are already at work at Campaign Headquarters which have been set up in the Grand Jury room of the County Court House. These gentlemen are at work with the organization with a view to having the set-up for the entire county finalized by the opening date of the campaign.

The county executive will include: the chairmen of the various town, parish and district committees, the Country Warden, the mayors and town and county councillors, the presidents of Red Cross branches and all other societies in the county doing "cross work."

Among the county campaign officials and members of the general organization committee are R. W. Maxwell, chairman of publicity, C. R. Allen and Mrs. K. E. MacLaughlin who will act with him on his committee.

Although weather and road conditions are unfavorable for a campaign at this season of the year, the committee in charge feel confident that a sympathetic response and generous patriotic co-operation will be given them and the required objective will once again be achieved.

GASOLINE FOR FARM TRUCKS WILL BE RATIONED IT IS ANNOUNCED

FARMER WITHOUT TRUCKS TO BE GIVEN EXTRA ALLOWANCE FOR HIS PASSENGER CAR ACCORDING TO HIS PROVED NEEDS

Gasoline for farm trucks will be rationed, but a farmer who does not own a truck will be given an extra allowance for his passenger car according to his proved individual needs, the Munitions and Supply Department has announced.

Under a new rationing system, which becomes effective on April 1, every non-commercial vehicle will be granted a basic Category "AA" ration book containing 40 coupons, which will permit each such vehicle, on the basis of 18 miles to the gallon, and at the present unit value, a basic 2,160 miles of driving between April 1, 1943, and March 31, 1944.

Those who are eligible, and can prove their need of a preferred category, will be allotted a fixed number of extra coupons for their vocational needs during the year ending March 31, 1944. These extra coupons will come in books labelled "Special," which will contain a maximum of 60 coupons each. Only one such "Special" book, or portion of a book, will be (Continued on Page Eight)

DELEGATE REPORTS ON RED CROSS ANNUAL MEETING

MEMBERS ARE URGED TO GREATER EFFORT IN 1943

Mrs. Alfred Page, war worker, gave her report as delegate to the Provincial Annual meeting recently held in Saint John at the regular monthly meeting of the Woodstock Red Cross, in the Court House Thursday afternoon. Mrs. Page told of the work accomplished nationally by the Red Cross Society. In speaking of the Blood Donors' Clinic she stated that the 1943 objective was set at 15,000 donations a week and those in charge wanted the objective to be reached as speedily as possible. The delegate urged the members to support their local branch, the divisional and the national executive stating that the united work of all was necessary to achieve victory.

Mrs. Page reported that 219 articles had been completed in January and 124 donations received. Ten pairs of pyjamas had been given to Military Hospitals.

Mrs. E. R. Jones of the surgical department who also attended the annual meeting, gave her report. She said the importance of the nursing classes was stressed, two of which were already functioning in Woodstock at present with Mrs. Ted Hamilton as teacher. More would be organized as the demand arose, she said.

F. O. Creighton, chairman of the 1943 Red Cross campaign was present and addressed the members briefly, soliciting their support in the coming drive which would begin March First.

Mrs. R. W. Maxwell of the visiting committee told of visiting soldiers in the hospital. Mrs. B. H. Smith gave the report of the purchasing committee and Mrs. S. L. Lynott read the financial statement.

Brock B. Vail, Well Known Farmer of Jacksonville, Passes

Many residents of Woodstock and Carleton County learned with deep regret of the death of Brock B. Vail which occurred at his home in Jacksonville at 1 o'clock Wednesday morning, February 17, after an illness of two months.

One of this district's most prominent farmers he was a highly respected member of the community. He had been in illhealth for about a year and confined to his bed since the middle of December. Of a kindly disposition he made and retained many friends and his passing is a distinct loss to his community.

Mr. Vail was born at Washbrook Lake, Queen's County, 31 years ago. He was the son of Benjamin and Emily Broad Vail and came to Jacksonville with his parents when he was seven years old. His entire life since that time was spent here. His wife, formerly Miss Hannah Mallory, Jacksonville, died morning, February 17, after an illness of two months.

He is survived by one sister, Mrs. E. D. Williams, Los Angeles, California; one son John Vail, Jacksonville; and two grandchildren Rankin Vail, Jacksonville and Mrs. Allen Savage, Williamstown. One great grandchild also survives.

The funeral will be held Friday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock from his home in Jacksonville. Rev. W. P. Styles will conduct the service. The pall bearers will be Owen Graham, Norman Palmer, Austin Turner and George Young. Burial will be in the Jacksonville cemetery.

PUBLIC HEALTH CONDITIONS ARE DISCUSSED

LOCAL V. O. N. REPORTS JANUARY A BUSY MONTH

Miss Winnifred Lawson, supervisor of the Eastern Division of the Victorian Order addressed the local board Tuesday evening in the Vocational School. Miss Lawson spoke of new problems caused by wartime conditions and a moving population, but thought an opportunity was opened for more people to be educated to public health and a better way of living. She spoke of the great difficulty experienced by the Dominion Board in getting nurses with public health training and congratulated the Woodstock board on securing the services of Miss Curry. Four new branches had been formed, two in Ontario and two in the west.

Later Miss Lawson led a discussion by members of the board on the cause of the increase of tuberculosis. The supervisor told the members that in Saskatchewan where the government gives free treatment for tuberculosis there is a much lower death rate from that disease.

Miss Carolyn Curry, local V. O. N. stated that 27 new patients had been admitted for care in January and 24 patients carried over from the previous month, making a total of 51 persons receiving care. It was necessary to make 279 home visits to give care to these persons. 3 confinements were (Continued on Page eight)
