GIVE GENEROUSLY

A nationwide appeal, beginning on Feb. 1st is being made by the Red Cross Society for funds to assist them in their war effort. A campaign is being organized in Carleton County by citizens who are giving of their time and talents to this work, knowing that the Red Cross over a long period of years has stood for all that is best and noblest in human endeavour. It still continues to do so.

We are entering what many people believe is the most critical phase of the war. The demands on the resources and the supplies of the Red Cross will be stepped up this year. That means a supreme effort and all out support from every man woman and child in the Dominion.

It is right and fitting that we, who are privileged to enjoy conditions of peace in the midst of war, should do our part to lighten the burden of those who will soon be called upon to bear the full weight of the conflict. So far Carleton County has stood squarely in the forefront of those who have supported the war aims of the Allied Nations. Never have we had to apologize for the numbers of our men who were enlisted for the endeavours of our civilian population to stand behind those who have gone before; or for the way in which those, who had been forced through circumstances to remain at home, had contributed of their substance to maintain our men in the field.

We feel confident that the forthcoming appeal of the Red Cross for funds, coming as it does to those who have been called upon to give many times before, will not fall upon deaf ears. We feel sure that this community will continue to show as it has in the past the way for the rest of Canada. Once again we say: Come On Carleton County.

AND NOW WHAT?

The Allies have taken the initiative in the war of nerves. In past years as spring approached it was the Axis powers who thundered threats of what the warm weather would bring to their enemies, and in past years they generally made good their threats. Now it is our side which is making threats of widespread and heavy attacks while the German and Italian radios are playing funeral dirges for their slaughtered armies in Russia.

Naturally speculation is rife as to where the blow or blows will fall. People are wondering if France will be invaded from the north. British and American armies operating along the northern coast would have the advantage of very short supply lines and shipping would have only a short trip from English ports to French bases. Given normal weather the ground in northern France will be dry enough for tanks and heavy transports to operate in another month or so. Doubtless we shall then know if the attack will begin there.

There is also much speculation as to whether an attack will be launched on Sicily and Italy from North Africa, where the final battle for Tunisia is expected to begin at any time. There is further speculation as to whether a blow will be launched against the Balkans.

Whether the attack will take place in one or more of these sectors, or in all of them, is very much the secret of the higher command and we must wait with what patience we can until their intentions are announced.

In the meantime the Russian steam roller rolls on. Rostov and Voroshilovgrad have fallen. Kharkov is about to fall if it has not already fallen. Even Uniepropetrovsk is threatened and the Crimea itself is none too safe. As far as can be judged the German generals are now running the campaign and doing so on more orthodox lines than were employed by Der Fuehrer. Doubtless we shall see a considerable withdrawal, followed by a consolidation of the line and heavy stubborn fighting.

But between the attacks which the Axis are carrying out and the attacks which the British and Americans have promised to carry out, things look very black for Messrs. Hitler & Co. in 1943.
