

CANADA NEEDS 40 MILLION POUNDS OF FATS FOR EXPLOSIVES

Here is a day-to-day War job for you!

There is a serious shortage of Fats and Bones in Canada and the only way in which this shortage can be overcome is by the day-to-day saving of every spoonful of dripping, every piece of scrap fat and every bone, cooked, uncooked or dry. Fat makes explosives and explosives make high explosives—explosives to bomb the Axis powers—Aches, Benito, Tojo, and their U-boats, destroy their tanks. Bones produce fat. Also good for war industry.

HERE IS WHAT YOU DO

Save every kind of waste dripping. All may be used together. Strain through an ordinary metal strainer into a clean, wide-mouthed jar. Do not use a glass or paper container. Keep in a refrigerator or a cool place until you have collected a pound or more. Save all pieces of drippings and fat from your waste cooked or uncooked. Keep separate from your drippings. Keep every fat and bone in a cool place.

HERE IS HOW TO DISPOSE OF FATS AND BONES

The Meat Dealers of Canada as a patriotic effort are co-operating with the Government in this all-important war work by contributing their collection facilities. Now you can dispose of your Fats and Bones in any one of the following ways:

1 YOUR MEAT DEALERS will pay you the established price per pound for your fat dripping and your scrap fat. You can keep this money for yourself or—

2 YOU CAN TURN THE PROCEEDS over to your local Voluntary Salvage Committee and/or to a registered local War Charity.

3 YOU CAN DONATE your Fat and Bones to your local Voluntary Salvage Committee in any place where they collect them, or—

4 YOU CAN CONTINUE to place out your fat and bones for collection by your Street Cleaning Department where such a system is in existence.

Every spoonful of dripping, every piece of fat and every bone, cooked, uncooked or dry, must be saved. It's a day-to-day job. Your contribution may seem small and unimportant, but even one ounce of fat dripping per person per week will give us 30,000,000 pounds of fat each year for explosives.

CALL TO GRADUATE NURSES!



GRADUATE NURSES MUST REGISTER ON MARCH 17-18-19, 1943

This is required under NATIONAL SELECTIVE SERVICE CIVILIAN REGULATIONS

What Nurses Must Register?

Graduate nurses below the age of 66 years are required to register, whether now actively practicing or not, and regardless of the time since they last practiced. Married Women are also included.

Nurses who are members of the Armed Forces are not to register. Practical nurses and nurses in training are not to register.

Why Are Nurses Being Registered? This registration is being taken by the National Selective Service on the request of the Canadian Nurses' Association.

It will provide as up to date list of all nurses available to meet various wartime needs, as well as any emergency. It will be available as part of a complete survey of health services, now being made by

the Medical Procurement and Assignment Board.

When To Register?

Nurses must register on March 17th, 18th or 19th.

Where May Nurses Register?

They may register at any Employment and Selective Service Office. Or they may register at the nearest Post Office, if living more than 5 miles from a city or town having an Employment or Selective Service Office. Or they may register at any public hospital, where special arrangements have been made.

Is the Registration Compulsory?

This registration is compulsory. The obligation to register is placed on each graduate nurse. Penalties are provided for non-compliance.
