WE NEED SAND

Woodstock streets have been very slippery during recent weeks. They are liable to become even more so now that spring is near at hand. Falls have been frequent with damage to the person, the clothes and the dignity. Elderly persons have often stayed indoors because they have no cars to drive and they don't dare walk.

A little more sand would go a long way toward solving the problem. So far the sand has been confined pretty well to Main street, and there has not been any too much of it there.

It should not be either very costly or very difficult to sprinkle sand on the principal streets every time they require it.

Conditions under foot at this time of year are, unfortunately, unpleasant and uncomfortable enough, no matter what we do about it. But at least we can have a reasonable hope of walking about town and remaining in a vertical position if the authorities will only loosen up a little with the sand, and thereby provide safer footing.

Serious injury can result from falls on the icy streets, especially to older people. In these war-time days we can't afford unnecessary injuries. We must eliminate them as far as possible.

AN INTERESTING BILL

Carleton County people read with interest recently that Premier McNair is to sponsor a bill which, if it becomes law, will put New Brunswick on the same time as Quebec and Ontario. In other words

it will do away with war time daylight saving.

For many years now daylight saving has been in vogue in various parts of the world and it has achieved a greater or a less degree of popularity, varying with the problems of the communities concerned. In rural portions of New Brunswick it has never been very popular. The chief reason for this is that the farmers find they do not get daylight as early as they need it in the mornings, and they have daylight when they no longer need it in the evenings. Several communities legally or otherwise, have gone back to the old time on their own initiative.

On the other hand those who should be in a position to know tell us that the saving in electricity is a very real aid to the war effort.

No doubt Premier McNair's bill will be thoroughly considered from every angle before it becomes law. It goes without saying that the contents will be scrutinized most closely. The legislators of course will take care to see that no unwanted results follow. It would not do, for example, to find ourselves on Eastern Standard time after the war.

through the enterprise and initiative of New Brunswick business men.

Orders for the manufacture of munition boxes would carry all available plants for months.

New legislation would be brought in soon, marking the inauguration of an expanding and modern educational program. Establishment of the county unit as the basis of financial administration of rural schools is contemplated, said the premier, in addition to the assistance now being given, the province would in any counties adopting the plan, assume ten per cent of the operation costs now borne by local school districts as well as the cost of bringing the rural schools up to a proper minimum standard. Establishment of a million dollar fund to be used to assist in the construction and equipping of rural composite high schools, building and enlarging of rural elementary schools and providing modern facilities for them is another measure planned.

Some measure of relief would be provided motorists through the bill now before the House making provision for a rebate of license fees for non-operation of trucks or cars during the winter and through additional regulations adopted by the government which call for new reduction or discounts on license plates issued at certain fixed periods during the registration year. Previously, reductions have been granted to trucks, but only to a limited extent to passenger cars, new arrangements, effective April 1, will apply to commercial vehicles and passengers automobiles uniformly.

Declaring social security an important question, the premier reviewed what was being done at Ottawa in this connection and said New Brunswick could be counted on to cooperate if constitutional changes were needed for the implementation of the legitimate elements of a social insurance program. It was his view that for any general program of this nature "we must look primarily to the Dominion for direction and financial responsibility" he said the question where jurisdiction rested would depend on the nature of any proposals developed.

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WARNING

CANADA FACES A WOOD-FUEL FAMINE NEXT WINTER

ARE YOU one of the Canadian householders who burned fences, doors, and even flooring to keep warm in this winter's sub-zero weather? Or perhaps you are one of the lucky ones who just managed to scrape through?

In either case, you will want to be prepared for next winter when greater hardships loom unless you take immediate action.

The shortage already has affected many communities... total stocks of dry wood are nearly exhausted... in some places the small supply of green wood cut for next winter is being used now to meet the present emergency.

Throughout most of Canada, fuel-wood is obtained not far from where it is consumed. Its production and distribution are the business of local citizens.

The Dominion Government recognizes that the wood-fuel shortage is so serious that even with the full co-operation of everyone in affected communities an adequate supply is not assured. Accordingly, it has been decided to stimulate the output of wood-fuel by assisting those normally engaged in its production and distribution. To this end, the following measures will be adopted:

- 1 A subsidy of \$1.00 per cord will be paid to dealers on all commercial fuel-wood contracted for and cut on or before June 30, 1943, and held to dealers' account on that date.
- 2 The Coal Controller has been authorized to arrange in his discretion for the payment of such portion of the transportation costs as he considers proper in respect of fuel-wood, particularly in cases where dealers, to procure supplies, find it necessary to contract for fuel-wood at locations outside the area from which they normally derive their supplies. In order to obtain any such reimbursement, dealers must obtain a permit from the Coal Controller before contracting for such supplies.
- 3 The Coal Controller will repurchase from dealers at dealer's cost all commercial grades of fuel-wood on which a subsidy of \$1 per cord has been paid and which are still in dealers' hands as at May 31, 1944.
- 4 Assistance will be given in providing priorities for necessary equipment.
- 5 Farmers now on the farm, and who leave the farm temporarily in response to this appeal to engage in fuel-wood cutting, will be deemed by National Selective Service to be carrying out their regular occupation as farmers and will be given all the rights of deferment of military service which such an occupation now carries. Such temporary absence should not, however, interfere with agricultural production.

Municipal councils, farmers, fuel dealers, individual citizens, service clubs, and all other groups in communities where wood-fuel is burned, are urged to begin at once a rapid survey of their local situation, and to take immediate action to relieve the shortage.
