CARLETON COUNTY COUNCIL CONCLUDES ITS JANUARY MEETING

Important Business Is Transacted In Late Hours Of Semi-Annual Session

COUNCILLORS APPOINT A COUNTY ASSESSOR, AUTHORIZE THE PURCHASE OF \$10,000 IN VICTORY BONDS AND PASS IMPORTANT RESOLUTIONS

Important business marked the closing sessions of the Carleton County Council Thursday, Friday and Saturday of last week. The appointment of a county assessor, discussion on the budget and arrangement to buy \$10,000 worth of Victory Bonds as well as important resolutions were among the matters considered.

F. O. Creighton, chairman of the finance committee in introducing the budget referred particularly to the importance of having good tax collectors pointing out that during these years when at least fair prices can be obtained for farm produce the time was opportune for Carleton County to build up a back log of Victory Bonds against the time of reaction which was bound to follow the present war.

The budget for the present year was passed at \$47,430. The total is \$70 less than last year. The items are as follows: Contingencies, \$3500; Administration of Justice, \$5500; Schools, \$13,160; Buildings, \$3500; Salaries, \$8,270; Health, \$1500; Vocational School, \$2500; Salvation Army, \$200; Institute for the Blind, \$200; Children's Aid Society, \$200; Russian Relief Fund, \$200; Tuberculosis and Industrial Home, \$4500; Provincial Hospital and Infirmary, \$7000.

The matter of remuneration to Cedar Hill school District Number 4 for loss of the taxation on the Municipal Home property was discussed and on motion of Coun. London, seconded by Coun. Thomas it was voted to allow the district \$25 a year.

On motion of Coun. Baker seconded by Coun. Tracey the secretary was asked to reply to a question regarding the matter of the Municipal Home.

Baptist Ministers Of Carleton and Victoria Met In Hartland Monday

IMPORTANT MATTERS INCLUDING THE TEMPERANCE SITUATION AND RESTRICTIONS ON THE SALE OF INTOXICATING LIQUOR ARE DISCUSSED

The Baptist Ministers' Institute of Carleton and Victoria Counties held their January meeting at the United Baptist parsonage, Hartland, on Monday, January 25, with the following clergymen in attendance: Rev. N. W. MacKenzie, Plaster Rock; Rev. W. G. Petchey, Tracey Mills; Rev. I. W. Carpenter, Centerville; Rev. S. H. Haslam, Florenceville; Rev. G. Taylor, Hartland.

Rev. H. W. Carpenter, president, opened the meeting with a short devotional service, assisted by Rev. N. W. MacKenzie. Various items of business were discussed, including the temperance situation and the restrictions in the sale of intoxicating liquor announced in a recent broadcast by the Prime Minister of Canada. It was planned to hold the next meeting at Bath on February 22 with Rev. N. W. MacKenzie as speaker.

The speaker for the meeting was Rev. W. G. Petchey who brought to the institute a thoughtful paper on "Access to the Inaccessible." He pointed out that those things in the work of the Kingdom that we call inaccessible are, for the most part, merely beyond our faith. He urged for greater courage, faith and perseverance in meeting the hard tasks that confront us. A short meeting of the District Executive was held to prepare the program for the next District Meeting which was planned to be held at Hartland on March 25 and 26. After the service delicious refreshments were served by Mrs. H. G. Taylor.

WARDEN URGES MORE WAR EFFORT

WARDEN C. GORDON SHARP REVIEWS YEAR AT COUNTY COUNCIL

It is my privilege to welcome the Members of the Council. The turn in the fortunes of war, such as gives us new hope that possibly sooner than we had expected Victory for our great cause may be final and complete. The splendid work of General Montgomery's Army of our Russian Allies and the allied cause right around the map has cheered us all and filled the Christmas season and the New Year with cheer and good hope. But the war is not yet won and it is up to everyone of us to continue to put forth our very best effort in every possible way so that this struggle may not be prolonged one needless day and that not one life may be needlessly sacrificed.

The loss by fire of all the buildings of the Municipal Home which necessitated the calling of a special session of this Council to purchase a new property and the work of getting established in the new home has thrown a very heavy burden on the Municipal Home Committee. Had we secured temporary winter quarters instead of purchasing a new property, we would have incurred heavy initial expenses with the prospects of buying next spring in a stiffer market. I feel that this Council should be commended for their prompt business action in securing this property and the Municipal Home Committee have the thanks of this Council for the way they have handled matters in connection with getting established in the new quarters.

Of course, the big news today is the fact that Carleton County is out of debt for the first time, I believe.

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Water Main Subject Of Discussion

INCREASED GRANT IS MADE TO LIBRARY; COMMITTEES ARE FORMED

Discussion concerning the break in the water main under the Modunakeag bridge, during the recent cold spell, an increase in the grant to the Fisher Memorial Library and appointment of town officials and standing committees were the highlights of the first session of the Town Council held in the council chamber Monday evening. The new Mayor E. A. Neal presided for the first time and the newly elected councillors, A. L. Kelley and C. D. DeWitt were in their places.

Town Manager George B. Kilpatrick stated that the water situation as it exists at present was a fire menace and that it was being repaired as quickly as possible. He hoped that in two or three days the damaged pipe would be working again. Some materials were on hand and others might be procured from Saint John. There had been breaks, he said, at both ends but both he and Frank Pickle, fire chief, who was in charge of the repair job, hoped the middle was intact.

He had been blamed by some he said for the mishap, but no employee of the town had ever said to him that the packing in the main was defective nor had he heard it mentioned at a council meeting. Mr. Kilpatrick attributed the break to a combination of extreme cold and wind. It was decided to get expert advice and have the pipe properly insulated as soon as the weather improved.

R. C. M. P. OFFICER IS LAID TO REST

FUNERAL OF CPL RYDER IS LARGELY ATTENDED AT MCADAM

Funeral service for the late Cpl. Lawrence P. Ryder, R. C. M. P., of Woodstock, was held on Saturday afternoon from the home of his father-in-law, B. B. Hurd, McAdam, with prayers at the house at 2 P. M., followed by service in St. George's Anglican Church at 2.30 o'clock by the rector, Rev. E. R. McCordick, who gave a very fitting message to the people from 2nd Peter, Chapter 2, Verse 17, "Honor all men, love the brotherhood, fear God, honor the King." He said the life of the Royal Mounted Police is one of service to his fellowmen, to the honor of God and King.

The choir of the church sang "O Come, Ye Disconsolate" and "Forever With the Lord," also a favorite hymn of the deceased, "The Old Rugged Cross." As the procession left the church the choir sang "Nunc Dimittis."

When it became known that the government would supply a fire engine and hose a meeting of citizens was called and it was decided to erect a suitable fire station.

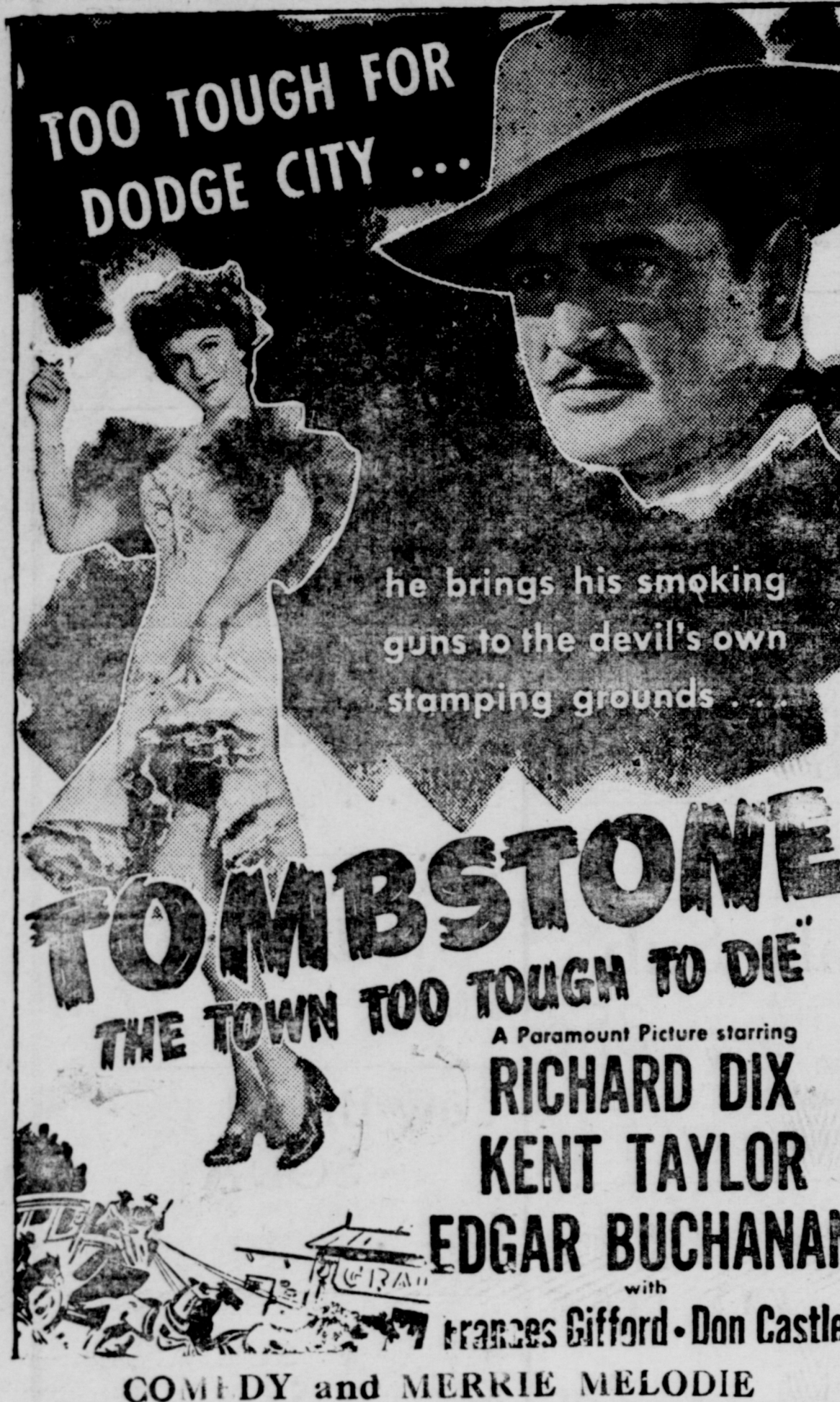
