RED CROSS COLLECTIONS MOUNT AS CAMPAIGN ENTERS LAST WEEK

Donations Maintain 1942 Level

CHAIRMAN URGES TOWN TEAMS TO COVER THEIR TERRITORY

Woodstock passed its 1942 objective of \$2800 in the 1943 Red Cross Campaign on Tuesday, town chairman Alfred Page told the Sentinel although very few of the town teams have thoroughly completed their work. He urged all town teams to redouble their efforts and cover their territory in the remaining week of the drive. So far the work is going ahead favorably, he said. Canvassers report a warm welcome and for the most part subscriptions average about the same as in 1942. "Increased demands are already being made on the local branch of the Red Cross and we have reason to believe they will be a great deal more urgent as time goes on and the war draws nearer its climax. We must reach our objective in the town and county and the only way we shall do it is through the generosity of our people," said Mr. Page.

F. O. Creighton, County Chairman has received a subscription from Newfoundland. Robert Bell, a former county councillor now working in Newfoundland, has forwarded his subscription, asking that it be sent in from Carleton County. The chairman says that subscriptions are coming in satisfactorily although many districts have still to be canvassed due to road and weather conditions. Florenceville with Fred Perry as chairman has already exceeded its quota and Hartland also reported that they had gone over the top on Saturday.

INSTRUCTIONS FOR GAS RATION BOOKS

NEW SET-UP IS EXPLAINED FOR THE CONVENIENCE OF THE PUBLIC

We have been advised by Charles Lenehan of the local Motor Vehicle Office that many persons have not taken the trouble to read the instructions regarding the new set-up for obtaining their 1943 Gasoline Ration Books, and as a result are making twice the work at the motor vehicle office and twice the inconvenience to themselves. The instructions are outlined in a modified form as follows:

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Old and New

AN EDITORIAL

It is with mixed feelings of pride and regret that we announce that The Carleton Sentinel will no longer be published under its old name. Effective immediately The Sentinel will be merged with the Woodstock Press, and the two will henceforth be published together under the name of The Sentinel Press. We believe that this marks a step forward in the journalistic history of Woodstock and Carleton County. For many years past the town has had two politically partisan weekly papers, each giving its own side of affairs. While we believe both papers tried to be fair it was inevitable that bias and prejudice should at times creep into their columns.

We believe that this community can better be served by one non-partisan paper, and we further believe that this is the view, and has been the view for a long time, of the great majority of the readers of both papers. The new paper will of course, from time to time as we consider necessary, comment upon political matters in a constructive way. We consider that such comment will carry all the more weight because it will no longer be colored to the advantage of one side or the other.

We therefore have pride and pleasure in announcing the birth of the new paper. At the same time we feel we cannot be accused of undue sentimentality in regretting the passing of The Carleton Sentinel as such. It has been for many years New Brunswick's oldest weekly newspaper, and it has for several generations striven to serve this town and county. Mercantile enterprises have arisen and flourished and passed away. Manufacturing firms have been founded, prospered for a time, and gone out of existence. Few if any of the business houses which served the public when The Sentinel was founded have survived until today. Wars have been fought, and to at least two of them we have seen the best of our youth march away.

This paper has seen the stage coach and the river steamer succeeded by the railroad and the automobile and the airplane. It has seen winding trails opened through the wilderness, has seen those trails become in turn gravelled roads and broad paved highways. It has seen prosperity and depression; fat years and lean years; rejoicing and sorrow. It was born when the community was young and has grown up with it.

Through it all this paper has gone its way. It has rejoiced as many sons and daughters of this grand old county inscribed their names among the great of this and of other countries. It has sorrowed with those who mourned, for it is one of the attributes of a country newspaper that it is small enough to be touched by the daily lives of those who are its friends and its patrons.

In size The Sentinel has never rivalled the great urban papers, nor has it desired to do so. It was founded to serve the needs of the great grand children of that people, the same sturdy agricultural stock which has peopled the Saint John river valley since its settlement.

The first aim of any newspaper that desires to endure must be service to its community. It has been our aim in the past, it will continue to be so in the future. In announcing the merger of two old papers into one new one we take this opportunity of thanking our friends for past co-operation and support, and asking that the same operation and support be extended in the days to come.

47 Persons Cared For By Nurse

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HOUSE IS SAVED WHEN BARN BURNS

EFFECTIVE USE OF SNOW STOPS SPREAD OF FLAMES

A fire which broke out at 6 o'clock Saturday morning burned a shed at the rear of the property owned by Herbert Jones on the Connell Road. Members of the fire department went to the scene of the blaze but it was thought inadvisable to take out the fire truck due to the icy condition of Kelly hill. The effective use of snow and what water was available prevented the flames from spreading to the adjacent house.

The shed which was a large well finished building was stored with goods such as chests of clothing, tools, mattresses and furniture which Mr. Jones valued at \$200. There was no insurance on the contents. Ashes stored in the rear of the premises are thought to be the cause of the fire.
