loss from damping-off will be les-

ened.

Some varieties may require a sec-

ond transplanting before setting out

to their permanent places. At this

transplanting a little commercial

fertilizer may be used, if well mixed

with the soil.

limited by the bacon board to 75 per

cent of their average weekly kill for

the home market in 1941.

These new restrictions, first of all,

apply to every person who slaught-

ers hogs for sale in the home mar-

ket in what is known as "Old Ontar-

io." Secondly they apply to those who

slaughter hogs for sale to serve com-

munities of 5,000 population or more

in Quebec, the maritimes, and in the

prairie provinces. Thirdly, they apply

to the area known as greater Vanco-

uver.

These restrictions are not enforced

in Northern Ontario, nor to any part

of British Columbia outside the great-

er Vancouver area.
